City to continue lakeshore improvements with grants

The City of Manistique will be receiving federal and state grant money to continue the improvements started in the lakeshore area. City Manager Alan Housler said two grants, one a federal coastal management grant administered by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and another DNR grant from the DNR for recreational development are on their way to the community.

"We have nothing in writing yet," said Housler, "but I've been told we will receive the grants."

The \$50,000 coastal management grant will fund Phase IV of the boardwalk project and will be used to refurbish Lakeside Park. The money will be used to construct vault restrooms, lighting for the area, paving of the drives and well repairs," Housler said.

ISD to manage Clear Lake

The U.S. Forest Service signed a 10-year special use permit Monday with the Delta-Schoolcraft Intermediate School District giving the ISD control of the 20-acre Clear Lake Education Center located in northern Schoolcraft County.

The center was designated an official state multi-use center in 1992 and became eligible for funding.

The camp, which was a Civilian Conservation Corps camp in the 1930s, last year hosted 605 area students and 62 teachers for science and math camps.

The camp includes eight student cabins, an infirmary, administrative building, dining hall, director's cabin, male and female bath houses, garage, outdoor amphitheater, softball and volleyball fields and a dock.

The camp is expected to be open year-round by the fall of 1995. Currently, visitors only use the camp from May through September.

Under the federal Granger-Thye special use permit, the Forest Service still retains ownership of the property, but the ISD handles management and operations.

County budget cuts may affect mental health services

Cuts in the 1994 Schoolcraft County budget may force Schoolcraft County Community Mental Health Services (CMH) to lose \$300,000 in state funding, causing layoffs and loss of services for the 195 citizens of the county who depend on CMH for their programs.

County budget cuts may affect mental health services

CMH Director Sam Harma said during Tuesday's County Commission meeting that because the funds are used as matching funds for state dollars on a 90 percent to 10 percent basis, the department must find more than \$200,000 in savings from their budget.

"For every \$1 cut, I have to send \$10 back to the state," he said. "We will have to cancel our contract with Public Transit for \$40,000 because we will have to close Harbor Enterprises Partial Day Program."

"We will have to lay off at least 12 CMH county employees and several seasonal job coaches." Under the state funding program, the county must match 10 percent of the entire state amount. For example, if the state allotted \$100,000 to the program, the county would have to put in \$10,000. If only \$5,000 was put in, the state would only fund up to \$50,000.

"We just don't have anymore revenue coming in," said County Board Chairperson Louis Lauson. "We're not trying to do this to be mean."

Harma said, "We understand that the county is in poor financial condition and have worked with you over the years to reduce the amount of funds that you provide for us."

"Last year, we had to return \$150,000 to the state because you could not adequately fund us." "It is clear that the county does not have the ability to adequately fund our local match requirements."

"We are requesting that you delay cuts in our allocation and restore our funding to the 1993 level."

Harma said three factors magnify the amount of the cut. The first is that CMH is almost three months into their fiscal year that began on Oct. 1. The earliest CMH could implement the cuts would be Feb. 1, 1994. This means they would have to make full year cuts in eight months, which increases the amount of cuts that would have to be made.

The second is CMH is self insured for unemployment. Layoff of staff would not save a dollar for each dollar cut. CMH would have to pay unemployment at the rate of 58 percent of gross salary for at least 26 weeks.

The third would be the elimination of positions in the agency that produce revenue, which would magnify the cuts.

In 1990, said Lauson, "we gave mental health a 95 percent funding increase from \$38,000 to \$74,000."

"I've tried to work with you people very hard. I would like to work together to get this solved."

"Last year, we ended up with \$700 in cash at the end of the year."

Harma said he does not dispute how poor the county is, but said a budget is a set of priorities the county sets.

"I realize mental health is an expensive undertaking," he said. "I'm not saying other departments should be cut. Each one is as valuable as the other."

Board member Keith Aldrich said over the past two years, the Continued on page 4A

Recycling finally begins in Garden area with drop off site on M-183

Recycling has finally come to the Garden Peninsula. A special container is located next to the Garden Township Transfer Station on M-183 where residents and business owners can drop-off their recyclable materials.

The Garden drop-off site accepts the same type of materials that is collected curbside in the Cities of Escanaba and Gladstone. Residents are to separate their recyclables and place them in the proper bin. "We're asking all the residents to separate their wastes and recyclables before coming to the transfer station," said Garden Township Supervisor Darrell Eppen.

Even though margarine and butter tubs and other containers are marked "2 HDPE," only plastic bottles and jugs are accepted. "Everyone in Delta County is reminded to properly prepare their

recyclables," said Delta County Recycling Coordinator Jim Vicenti. The cardboard should be clean, with no food scraps or cooking grease on them. Only corrugated cardboard is recyclable, so no cereal boxes or prepared food boxes are to be included. The glass containers should be rinsed out as well as the milk jugs and all cans. With food left on the containers, flies and rodents would be attracted, which makes for an unhealthy working area.

Peter Van Steen of Central Upper Peninsula Planning and Development (CUPPAD) said, "Plans are also underway for curbside pickup of recyclables for residents in the Village of Garden."

According to Van Steen, a portion of the county-wide recycling grant will be used to purchase individual bins and a recycling trailer. The trailer and bins are expected to be ordered soon.

So far this year, Delta County has recovered more than 2,300 tons of materials. With funding from the State Department of Natural Resources, Delta County was selected to serve as a model recycling community.

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At home with Sarah

I have had a request for a recipe for a pork pie that is very popular at Christmas time. In fact, it is traditional in many homes to eat pork pie on Christmas Eve or New Year's Eve. Here are three different recipes, all of which I have tried (in different years) and I enjoyed all three. These are family recipes that have been carried down from mother to daughter.

TOURTIERE (French Stacked Pies)
-Katharine LeBrasseur

2 lbs. lean ground pork, crumbled
1 lb. ground beef (can substitute venison)
1 small onion, finely chopped
1/4 cup each, chopped parsley and celery leaves
1 teas. salt
1/4 teas. each: cloves and all spice
dash cayenne
1 cup mashed potatoes

In a large frying pan over medium heat, sauté meat and onion until brown. Blend in seasonings. Simmer uncovered 25 minutes. Line a large pie pan with pastry. Spread meat mixture in pastry lined pan, mixing thoroughly the mashed potatoes. Cover with top crust, trim and flute edge; prick or slash top in several places. Bake at 425 degrees for 15 minutes, reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake 25 minutes longer or until crust is well browned.

PORK PIE - Dona Nelson

1 1/2 pounds roast pork, butt, not loin
1 medium onion, chopped
Salt and pepper, to taste

Bone and trim well the pork roast. Cut into small pieces. Sauté with onion, salt and pepper until it loses its pink color. Simmer to cook pork. Place into a pastry-lined pie pan and cover with top crust. Bake as above recipe.

MEAT PIE - Nancy White

1 1/2 pounds ground chuck (or can use ground pork)
1 teas. salt
3/4 teas. cinnamon
1/4 teas. all spice
1 medium onion, chopped
1/4-1/2 cup water
1 tbl. flour
1/2-1 cup mashed potatoes, optional

Mix meat, onion, spices, and water together and simmer until redness is gone. Mix in flour and potatoes. Place into a pastry-lined pie shell and cover with top crust and bake as above.

Sarah says If you are making a large amount of coffee in a large coffee maker and it will sit awhile, 1/4 teaspoon of real butter will keep it from becoming bitter.

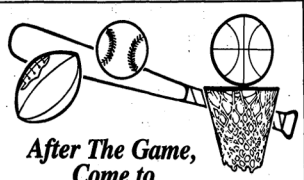

I'm convinced that each death was the direct result from their environment with cigarette smoking. For the past nine years my father, an ex-smoker, has been living with emphysema. Since smoking has played such a significant element in my family's life, or rather loss of life, I feel intimately qualified to work in this direction."

He further adds, "Related materials play a significant role in my work. Visits to local tobacco farms provide me with the actual tobacco leaves I incorporate, while tours held me to collect vast amounts of cigarette butts and ashes. Elements so repulsive, both visually and aromatically, provide great irony since they become attractive in such a deceptive way. This is not unlike the irony to smoking: A passion which some find so attractive, yet ultimately may deliver such painful sadness, not only to the smoker, but to their family and close friends as well."
