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## Erickson is nominated

The stalemate over nominating someone to represent the City on the City/County Department of Public Works Board was resolved at the City Council's regular meeting Tuesday night. Newly appointed councilperson Doug "Hawk" Erickson, not only was able to provide the tie-breaking vote, he was the nominee.

The five person council had been unable to reach a decision due to the absence of councilperson George Danko. This resulted in a 2-2 tie vote on the re-appointment of Mike Dougovito to the board. Danko's resignation due to illness had been accepted and Erickson appointed at the Dec. 13 meeting.

Prior to Erickson's nomination, Mayor John Stewart again recommended Dougovito for the position.

In other action, the council tabled a proposed two-use fee schedule for the ski hill. Rates ranged from \$1 per person per day to \$20 for a family season lift pass. City Manager Alan Houliher said the fees would help to defray the cost of operation.

Erickson learned the outdoor ice rink at the multi-purpose facility should be open for daylight only skating beginning Friday. There is no fee and the rink is unsurprised.

Set the 1994 regular meeting dates of second and fourth Mondays at 7 p.m. at the city hall.

Set the second meeting in January for a discussion of the ambulance fund deficit and other budget/audit items. Housler said it is "critical for us to solve the ambulance fund problem to get

out of our budget problem." Options mentioned were increasing rates and a countywide millage.

Learned that Pamela had submitted plans for the store that is proposed for a site on US-2. Housler said that construction is tentatively planned to start in the spring.

Appointed Stewart to take Danko's place on the ambulance board and Housler to serve in his place of the solid waste planning committee.

Discussed a letter received from Bresnan Communications about the renewal of their cable television franchise that expires on Dec. 12, 1996. Housler said the history of the franchise is being researched and that it would be available at a future meeting.

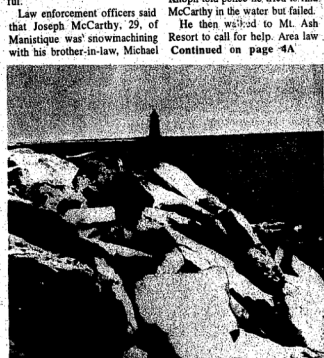

Weber said college basketball is much more competitive than high school hoops.

"The competition is intense," he said. "Everyone that plays was the highest scorer on their high school team."

After high school, Weber went to Ironwood Junior College. He transferred to Olivet last year, but since

Olivet is a small, private school there are no athletic scholarships available.

"When I got to Olivet, they had just lost their six top players," he said. "So the starting spots were up for grabs."

"I got the starting position during the sixth or seventh game."

Weber said he has done some traveling with the team, including a trip to Pennsylvania for a tournament, where he was named the tournament's most valuable player.

"Weber is a big part of Olivet's turn around in basketball. Weber said the tournament in Pennsylvania was the first tournament the school has won in years."

Olivet is off to a 6-3 start this season and the Detroit Free Press calls Olivet the MIAA's biggest surprise of the season.

## Harbor clean up is top area issue of 1993

The environment was the top issue for the majority of the year and January saw the first indications of the severity of PCB contamination in the harbor.

Manistique Papers President and General Manager Leif Christensen said in January the company looked forward to discussion of the studies.

"We welcome meeting on a non-adversarial basis with the DNR and the EPA for a reasonable discussion on the situation," he said. "I don't think we will consider defaulting on the issue at this meeting. I think the situation will evolve."

The lakefront was also an issue with regard to a multi-family dwelling that was proposed during the month.

Bill Giles approached the Manistique City Council with a proposal to build the multi-family dwelling.

Mayor John Stewart said, "At this point, we'll go to the Downtown Development Authority. Then we'll have the option to look at all proposals and ask questions. The city and DDA will be a partnership in the decision making process."

January also saw the city council hear their first complaints about the snow problem on city sidewalks as several permits addressed the council about the problem.

January brought change to the Manistique business community as Ted Henschell Sr. passed over the keys of the Top 'O' Lake Sportshop to his son Ted Henschell III.

Trash was again the main issue for the month of February. The month started off with three public hearings held by the CCDPW on the county's solid waste hauling agreement.

Residents attending the meeting said free enterprise was the best approach to the problem.

Harder's Manager Chris Kieffer said, "Loyalty stops me from checking. I like the right to choose the best value for the money. That is my responsibility as a business owner - to check on prices and go with the better cost. It's foolish not to make that move."

Later in the month, the CCDPW decided to invite proposals for the implementation of a county wide recycling program. Manistique Rentals was awarded the recycling program later in the month.

The Manistique City Council voted to put the garbage issue in the hands of the voters. The CCDPW considered putting the trash issue to vote in the entire county.

Volunteer firefighters and Manistique Public Safety officers responded to four separate fires in the area at the beginning of the month of February, with three of the fires occurring during the same hour on the same day.

The City of Manistique outlined the area proposed for development at a meeting in February.

The area is best described as part of US-2, west of Range Street, and adjacent to what's often

## Tuimala beats the odds

Lisa Tuimala is the new fifth grade teacher at Big Bay de Noc School. She overcomes tremendous odds to become a teacher.

Lisa Tuimala, 30, of Garden Corners, has stood up to the odds.

Tuimala is divorced, has a 12-year-old daughter, Ashley, who has a learning disability. With the help of her family, she has fought the odds and taught it out to become the new fifth grade teacher at Big Bay de Noc School.

Tuimala decided after separating from her husband Mike Tuimala in December of 1989 that she would not just sit home and cry about being alone.

"Ashley had just turned a year old," she said. "I was alone with her and if I hadn't been for the support of my mom and dad, my sister Lori and my brother Mike, I would never have been able to make it."

"I knew I had to get back to college. I had to make a future for myself and for Ashley."

While Tuimala went to Big Bay de Noc Community College for three semesters and then later traveled to Northern Michigan University, she was also running Ashley to the Mayo Clinic in Minn. and the Ann Arbor Children's Hospital to help Ashley with her learning disability.

"Ashley didn't walk or talk as soon as other children," Tuimala said. "She was 19 months old before she walked and she still cannot talk very well."

"The odds piled up against Tuimala, but she fought the loneliness and loss to see Ashley grow and learn."

"I remember my lowest point was when Ashley started Head Start in Manistique and I dropped her off to go to college at NMU," she said. "I remember leaving her go and then getting in the car and driv-

ing to NMU crying at my last time with Ashley."

"I cried and cried and I wound up crying all the way to Marquette."

"I knew it was going to all be worth it though. I had to put my priority on college to make a future for Ashley and I."

"I knew I had to get done," she said. "I took 19 and 20 credits some semesters and I promised myself I would not mess around."

"I stuck it out and now I'm glad I did."

Tuimala graduated from NMU in May of 1993 with a bachelor of science degree in elementary education.

Last summer, Tuimala applied for a position at Big Bay de Noc School, the school she had grown up in and graduated from in 1981.

"She was hired as one of the fifth grade teachers."

"It's been a little strange coming back to the school graduated from," she said. "Some of my co-workers are teachers that taught me when I was in school."

"Now I have to relate to them on a different level."

"Also, some of my students are children of schoolmates from when I was in school."

"Tuimala said it is strange to have the children of her former classmates in her class, but said it also makes for an easier teacher-parent relationship."

"The parents that know me know they can come in any time they want and talk to me," she said. "I sent home letters at the beginning of the year to let parents know they are more than welcome anytime they

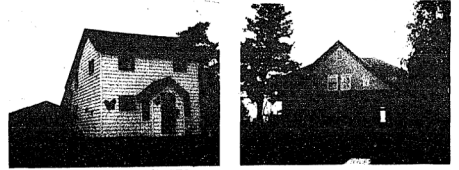

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**SNOW REMOVAL ORDINANCE**

Ordinance No. 229 of 1993

- Section 1. Sidewalks to be Cleared.** The occupant of every lot or premises adjoining any street, or the owner of such lot or premises, if the same are not occupied, shall clear all ice and snow from sidewalks adjoining such lot or premises within the time herein required. When any snow or ice shall cease to fall, such snow or ice shall be cleared from the sidewalks within twenty-four (24) hours after such cessation.
- Section 2. Failure to Clear.** If any occupant or owner shall neglect or fail to clear ice or snow from the sidewalk adjoining his or her premises within the time provided in the previous section, or shall otherwise permit ice or snow to accumulate on such sidewalk, said person shall be guilty of a violation of this Ordinance and in addition, the City Manager or his or her designee may cause the same to be cleared and the expense of removal shall become a debt to the City from the occupant or owner of such premises, and shall constitute a lien on the property served; and, if not, paid by March 1, the official or officials in charge of the collection shall, prior to April 1 of each year, certify to the City Assessor the facts of such delinquency, where upon the City Assessor shall enter such delinquent charge upon the next general city tax roll as a charge against said premises, and the lien thereof shall be enforced in the same manner as provided by law for unoccupied and unpaid taxes. This indebtedness may also be collected by the City by suit or otherwise.
- Section 3. Depositing Snow in Right-of-Way.** No persons shall take any snow or ice from any property and deposit or place the same upon any street, alley or sidewalk within the City of Manistiquette where such street, alley or sidewalk is usually plowed or cleared for travel, except that snow or ice accumulating on sidewalks which abut the curb of a public street may be removed from the sidewalk and deposited on the public street provided that said snow or ice shall be deposited no further than three feet into the street as measured from the curb.
- Section 4. Penalty.** Violation of this ordinance shall be punishable by fine of not more than \$100.00 and/or imprisonment in the County Jail not to exceed 90 days.
- Section 5. Exemption.** Any person who is physically unable to clear their sidewalks pursuant to Section 1 because of age or physical disability shall apply to the City Manager or his or her designee for an exemption from Section 1 of this ordinance. Before granting an exemption, the City Manager or his or her designee shall determine whether there are other household members who can remove the ice or snow and whether or not a service, civil or governmental agency, will assist the person seeking an exemption in removing ice or snow pursuant to Section 1.
- Section 6. Appeal.** To the extent, any ordinance heretofore adopted is inconsistent, herewith, same is hereby repealed to the extent of said inconsistency and the balance of said ordinance shall be preserved and remain enforceable.
- Section 7. ### At home with Sarah

Crisp vegetables along with substantial pasta, add meat and cheese and you have a super salad. A salad can complement a main course or make a satisfying meal by itself. No matter what meat you served for your Christmas dinner, you can use the leftovers in this salad. It is especially delicious with either ham or turkey.

#### MACARONI AND CHEESE SALAD

- 1 cup elbow macaroni, cooked, drained and cooled
- 1-2 cups leftover ham or turkey, cut into strips or cubes
- 1 cup cubed cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup bias-cut celery slices
- 1/3 cup chopped green pepper
- 1/4 cup sliced green onion
- 2 tbl. chopped canned pimiento
- 1/4 cup drained pickle relish
- 1 tbl. prepared mustard
- 1/2 cup (or more) salad dressing
- 1/2 teas. salt
- 1/4 teas. celery salt
- 1 tbl. vinegar and 1 teas. sugar

Prepare all ingredients and combine together, except salad dressing, mustard, vinegar, and seasonings. Blend remaining ingredients together and add to salad. Toss lightly. Chill. Serves 6.

Use some of your leftover meat to make turkey or ham salad sandwiches.

- 2 cups leftover meat, chopped in food processor.
- 1/2 small onion, chopped fine
- cup pickle relish
- cup mayonnaise

The third step is screening for minimum requirements. Applicants who do not pass the agility and strength test will be screened to establish if they meet all minimum requirements. Every applicant must meet all minimum requirements. Fingerprinting may be done on the same day the applicant passes the agility test. Candidates not meeting the established minimum requirements will be removed from the employment process.  
The fourth is drug screening. All candidates are subject to mandatory participation in a drug screening test through urine samples at any time prior to graduation from recruit school. Applicants get tested at different times and are given less than 92 hours prior notification. All applicants must submit to the drug screening without exception. A refusal to participate in drug testing or failure to test negative results in immediate removal of the applicant from the employment process for a period of two years.  
The fifth hurdle is a background investigation. Applicants who successfully pass the physical agility test and screening for minimum requirements are given an experiential and education questionnaire packet.

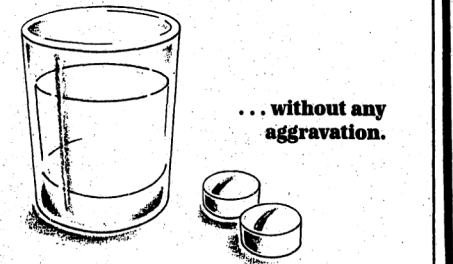

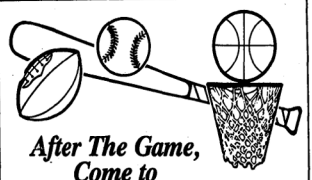

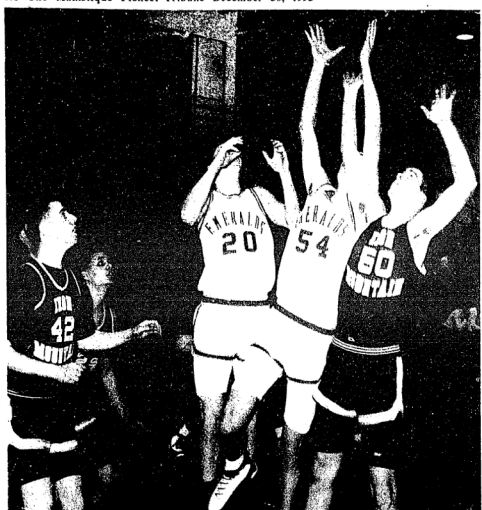
