

Merchants To Hold War Bond Rally

For the purpose of stimulating interest Upper Peninsula merchants and their employes in the sale of war bonds and stamps, George G. Whitney, Detroit, executive director of the Michigan retailers war savings committee, accompanied by Nelson D. Rupp, Marquette, U. P. chairman, will make a two-week tour of the Peninsula, starting next Monday.

A retailers' rally will be held in the Nordic theater in Marquette next Wednesday morning from 9 to 10, during which time most stores will be closed to permit merchants and employes to attend. A special motion picture will be shown; there will be musical entertainment and Whitney will give an informative address on the progress of the campaign and the need

for additional effort for the duration of the war.

Whitney Here All Day

S. C. Stern, Marquette county chairman in the retailers' war savings campaign, yesterday stressed the importance of the meeting and requested wholehearted cooperation of all merchants and their employes. Merchants in this county have made a splendid record, he said, expressing hope the good work will continue.

Every month since the campaign started Marquette county merchants have exceeded their quotas, an effort which represents a direct contribution to the war effort and toward the fight on the home front against inflation.

Whitney will remain in Marquette after the meeting to confer with any merchant or employe desiring information on the campaign and to assist in its progress in this community.

He is scheduled to speak at similar merchants' rallies in Negaunee Thursday morning, October 22, beginning at 8:45 and in Ishpeming the same day, beginning at 9:45.

U. P. Itinerary

"All persons having anything to do with the sale of war bonds and

stamps should attend these meetings," Rupp said yesterday.

The itinerary of the tour follows: Sault Ste. Marie, Monday morning; Tuesday morning, Newberry; Tuesday evening, Munising; Wednesday morning, Marquette; Thursday morning, Ishpeming and Negaunee; Friday and Saturday in the Cooper Country and possibly Ontonagon.

Monday and Tuesday, October 26 and 27, Ironwood and Bessemer district; Wednesday, October 28, Iron Mountain and surrounding territory; Thursday, October 29, Menominee; Friday, October 30, Escanaba, and Saturday, October 31, Manistique and St. Ignace.

District chairmen in the Upper Peninsula are J. B. Seamans, Ironwood; P. B. Spear, Jr., Marquette, and J. P. Rahilly, Newberry.

Rupp has mailed letters to all county chairmen in the Upper Peninsula advising them of the tour and urging them to make necessary arrangements.

U. P. Firms Must Use New Priority Plan

The production requirements plan, used by the War Production Board to obtain priority assistance for materials used in war and civilian production, as well as for maintenance, repair and operating supplies, will be used beginning the first of the year by many Upper Peninsula firms. The plan is mandatory on all producers using \$5,000 worth of metals a quarter, but may be used by other processors and manufacturers.

Forms PD-25-A, used in conjunction with the production requirements plan, may be obtained from the War Production Board, Iron Mountain. These forms must be filed with the War Production Board at Washington, October 25, 1942.

TO BUILD ROAD LINK

LANSING, Oct. 13—P—The state highway department was authorized by the administrative board today to employ a firm of New York consulting engineers to plan the construction of a mile of depressed highway as a link in the Detroit industrial roadway to Wil-

low Run. Commissioner G. Donald Kennedy said the strip would be located at the Ford River Rouge plant and was necessitated because of lack of critical materials and a soft soil condition. The road will be sunk eight to 20 feet below the surface.

NEGAUNEE, Oct. 13—A smaller than average number of applications for Federal jobs was received today by representatives of the U. S. civil service and U. S. Army Signal corps, city officials stated this afternoon. It was disappointing because Negaunee had more advance publicity on the visit of the Federal agents than any other community they have visited in the Upper Peninsula to date.

Camp To Be Closed

IRON RIVER, Oct. 13— Camp Bonitas, near Watersmeet, where 204 soldiers have been stationed for two months, studying motor transport mechanics, will be closed Thursday. Orders to close the camp, formerly used by a CCC unit, were received from the Army command. Col. Edward H. Besse, commandant of ordnance at Fort Sheridan, visited it last week, and confirmed the view that, because of lack of facilities and equipment, it should be abandoned.

Gets War Contract

HOUGHTON, Oct. 13—The Copper Motor Machinery company, Houghton, will shortly begin work on a large Government war contract and is making plans to hire additional skilled men. Negotiations for the new contract were completed several days ago in Detroit by E. O. Sarregret, owner of the Copper Motor Machinery company, and C. Parker Shields, production engineer for the local concern. The local firm will manufacture an important part of the sights for Army tanks. The part carries an AA-1 priority through the Ordnance division of the War department, and getting the necessary materials for its manufacture thus is given special consideration by the War Production Board.
