



Firemen Get \$2,474.29 Compensation

Eleven members of the Marquette fire department, two of whom are in the armed forces, will be paid \$2,474.29, in the aggregate, to compensate for loss of free time, since January 10, 1942, to which they were entitled under a state statute with which the city failed to comply.

Deputies To Get More Pay

In making a motion that the firemen be paid, the amounts due having been ascertained by the city auditor, Joseph Cone, and the fire chief, R. W. Bystrom, Commissioner John Tierney, head of the department of public health and safety, said he believed the deputy chiefs should be given similar treatment. He pointed out that the deputies received only \$5 more monthly than the other firemen and said they were entitled to free time as well as the others. He stated, also, that in his opinion the deputies' pay should be increased after January 1. Tierney's motion was supported by Commissioner McGinley and unanimously adopted.

Plans Okehed For Veterans' Center Setup

A plan to spend not to exceed \$2,275 for repair and remodeling of the Veterans' Center, formerly the Oates funeral home, recently purchased by the city, was approved last night by the city commission on recommendation of the Marquette Veterans' council. The commission also voted unanimously to pay \$60 a month to the treasurer of the Veterans' Center house committee to partially defray operating expenses of that building. In addition, the city will furnish water and lights and pay taxes and fire insurance.

### Pvt. Gauthier In Attack On Jap Pillbox

WITH AMERICAN TROOPS IN NEW GUINEA, Dec. 19—(Delayed)—Pvt. Gauthier watched a batch of Americans start out to attack a strong Japanese pillbox near a new air strip west of Cape Endiawe today—one of the hottest afternoons yet seen in this jungle warfare.

They included Sergeants Herbert J. Taylor, Harold English and Don Green; all of Coldwater, Mich.; Corporal Kenneth Hutchins, Angola, Ind., and Privates Thomas J. Ryan and Thomas D. Minougan, both of Chicago; William Gauthier, IshpeMING, Mich.; Albert Gernast, Kalamazoo, Mich., and George Hasbrouck, Elm Creek, Neb.

They sat under the trees while bombing mortars sought to soften the Japanese emplacement.

When the mortar fire halted they calmly got to their feet and started forward. Then they crawled on their stomachs through the high Kunai grass.

When the men returned, Sergeant English reported they had worked forward far enough to throw grenades inside the pillbox.

### Penstock Near McClure Plant Breaks

ISHPEMING, Dec. 21 — Cliffs Power & Light company crews have been busy since yesterday afternoon repairing a break in the penstock at a point about 1,200 feet above the McClure hydro-electric plant on Dead river and three miles below the dam.

The break, occurring about 2 p. m. yesterday at an expansion joint in the 53-inch steel penstock, put the McClure plant out of commission and it probably will be impossible to resume operations there for several days.

The cause of the break has not been determined, but officials of the company said today they were certain it was "entirely accidental."

Although the penstock has been repaired, there will be no interference with operations in the Cleveland-Cliffs mines and power service to communities served by the Cliffs Power & Light company will not be interrupted, company officials said.

### Fred Pearce To Check City Car Mileage

NEGAUNEE, Dec. 21 — Fred Pearce, superintendent of the board of public works, has been named municipal mileage administrator by Mayor George H. Russell, who is employed in a Detroit defense plant.

Under the powers set up by the Government, and as requested by Governor Murray D. Van Wagener, Mr. Pearce will be authorized to determine what mileages should be set up for municipally-owned cars. His appointment is part of a state-wide program to name an official in every city to be responsible for reducing car and truck mileage, conserving tires and lengthening the life of motor-vehicles.

Pearce's powers are broad, but there is little reason to expect material reductions can be made, as Negaunee's equipment is limited, compared to that in other communities, and efforts have been made, ever since rubber and gasoline conservation needs became apparent, to reduce operation of city equipment as much as possible.

### Nazis Being Moved From Libyan Base

(Continued From Page 1)

were trying to join Gen. Walther Nehring's Tunisian forces. There also were indications, the agency said, that part of the Italian garrison of Tripoli was moving by sea to Tunisia.

The Allied command in North Africa reported one enemy detachment in northern Tunisia had been beaten off in a raid on a forward Allied position, and that Allied planes had shot down one Axis bomber and one fighter plane in routine patrols in which no Allied planes were lost.

A spokesman said U. S. bombers had dropped more than a million pounds of explosives on Axis-held Tunisian ports in the week ending December 12, but that in ground operations "both sides are more on the defensive than the offensive now." Nazi planes still were strafing roads on which the Allies "are moving up combat equipment for a renewal of battle, he added.

Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery's eighth army was piling its way through dense mine fields in pursuit of Rommel, and tonight was reported five miles beyond Sultan, 140 miles west of El Aghella. This point is 250 miles from Tripoli. Six field companies were working night and day to clear a British path.

Rommel now has retreated more than 800 miles since he left his El Alamein positions in Egypt, or equivalent to a retreat from New York to Chicago. If he crosses into Tunisia he will have abandoned a strip of territory equivalent to the distance between New York and Kansas City.

It is these extreme distances in the desert war that cause British observers to stress repeatedly the enormous supply problems involved in the African war. As Rommel retreats he reduces his problems, which still are heavy, while General Montgomery's are pyramided.

The Axis leader lost 30 more tanks, 30 guns, and 500 prisoners beside an undetermined number of dead when Montgomery's troops caught a portion of his withdrawing forces in the Wadi Matratin sector 65 miles west of El Aghella.

Observers anticipated a stiffer rearguard action by Rommel along the 80 miles of coastal strip between Buerat El Hsun and Misurata, but only as a time-saving device preliminary to an eventual flight into Tunisia.

**Axis Targets Thinning Out**

Allied planes racing ahead of the British ground troops operated on a small scale yesterday, finding that Axis targets were thinning out.

It was disclosed tonight that British planes based on the much-bombed Mediterranean island of Malta were taking an increasingly heavy part in operations, attacking the Tunisian coast and patrolling the skies between Sicily and Tunisia. Single-motored and twin-engine fighters were operating on the enemy's air and sea supply route, while a powerful force of medium bombers was coordinating its mainland blitz with those of the American and British airmen based in Algeria.

**BLAST WRECKS GARAGE**

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Dec. 21—P—Explosion of an acetylene torch caused a fire today which destroyed a garage at nearby Eastmanville. Damage was estimated by Richard Osseward, owner of the building, at \$7,000. William Osseward, a brother of the proprietor, was treated for burns.

### Parking Cars At Night In Alleys Taboo

NEGAUNEE, Dec. 21—Negaunee motorists, finally convinced the winter parking ordinance is to be enforced, were asked today by Chief of Police Arne Pynnonen to remember that alleys are public thoroughfares, are included in winter parking legislation, and that with this warning cars parked in alleys will be tagged, the same as they were on principal streets.

"We have had an unusually large number of complaints, both in the police and other departments," said Chief Pynnonen, "about parking in alleys.

"The public has been most cooperative and understanding about parking overnight on streets, but many have left cars in alleys. It causes no end of inconvenience, because with heavy snow conditions, alleys, for the most part, accommodate only one car, and to park there means the thoroughfare is blocked."

### Hollywood Films Again Shown in North Africa
