

Department of Agriculture.

Washington, Dec. 6, - President Rootevelt, in his annual message to congress, discusses many subjects of vital interest to the nation and makes several recommendations regarding needed legislation. He declares the people have emphatically expressed their approval of the policies at present in force, which, he says, have been an important factor in our continued and important factor in our continues prosperity. The principles underlying, these policies are to be kept substan-tially unchanged. The document in full comprises about 18,000 words, but con-siderable of this space is devoted to a resume of the various departments.

Caution Against Extravagance.

In opening, the president cautions against extravagance and says the cost of doing government business should be regulated with the same rigid scrutiny as the cost of doing a private business. "The period of propperity." he says, "through which the ountry is passing justifies expenditures for permanent improvements far greater than would be wise in hard times. Battleships and forts, public buildings, and improved waterways are investments which should be made when we have the money; but abundant revenues and a large surplus always invite extravagance, and constant care should be taken to guard against unnecessary increase of the ordinary expenses of government."

Capital and Labor.

Considerable attention is paid to, the question of capital and labor and their relations, and particularly to organized cap-ital and organized labor. He says our pe-culiar form of government, with its sharp division of authority between the nation and the several states, has been respon-sible for much of the difficulty of meeting with adequate legislation the new problems presented by the change in industrial conditions during the last half-century. "As long as the states retain the primary control of the police pow-er," he says, "the circumstances must be altogether extreme which reguire interference by the federal author-ities, whether in the way of safeguard-ing the rights of labor or in the way of seeing that wrong is not done by un-ruly persons who shield themselves be-hind the name of labor. If there is re-sistance to the federal courts, interference with the mails, or interstate commerce, or molestation of federal proper-ty, or if the state authorities in some crisis which they are unable to face call

for help, then the federal government may interfere; but though such interfer-ence may be caused by a condition of

It is not merely unwise, it is contemptible, for a nation, as for an in-dividual, te use high-sounding language. to proclaim its purposes, or to take posi-tions which are ridiculous if unsupported by potential force, and then to refuse to provide this force. If there is no inten-tion of providing and of keeping the force necessary to back up a streng at-titude, then it is far better not to assume such an attitude. "Yet we must never rorget the determin-ing factor in every kind of work, of head or hand, must be the man's own good sense, courage and kindliness. It is proposed to found a historical museum of medicine, and a special seminary for training persons in medico-historical research and in historiography.

AN INVITING PROSPECT.

Will Canada in the next quarter of a century take the place of the United States as the great wheat exporting section of the western hemisphere? Everything points that way. In the opinion of experts the United States has reached high water mark as a wheat exporting country. The increasing population over there has reached the point when home consumption is becoming annually greater in proportion than the increase in wheat production. As a matter of fact wheat production is decreasing over there as the land becomes more valuable and by reason of the demand for other forms of produce for home consumption. It is said that the wheat crop this year is not more than 70 per cent, of the crop of 1901 and much below the crops of 1902 and 1903. It is estimated that this year the United States surplus for export will not be over 100,000,000, which is less than any year since 1878 with two exceptions. Not only is this the case, but a considerable quantity of the best Canadian wheat is being imported into Minnesota and also Chicago.

All this tends to keep the price of wheat near the dollar mark, and "dollar wheat" is the loadstone that will attract farmers to the Canadian Northwest, where land is cheap and can be farmed on a wholesale basis, particulars of which may be had from any agent of the Canadian Government. The re-

Two million bricks will be used in the new Rockefeller building in Cleveland; 40,000 square feet of glass will be put into windows and the steel alone will cost \$130,000.

things arising out of trouble connected with some question of labor, the interfer-ence itself simply takes the form of restoring order without regard to the quesions which have caused the breach duty and in a time of disorder and vio-lence all other questions sink into abeyuntil order has been restored. In the District of Columbia and in the ter-ritories the federal law covers the entire field of government; but the labor, question is only acute in populous centers of commerce, manufactures or mining. Nevertheless, both in the enactment and in the enforcement of law the federal government within its restricted sphere should set an example to the state governments, especially in a matter so vital as this affecting labor. I believe that under modern industrial conditions it is often necessary, and even where not necessary it is yet often wise, that there should be organization of labor in order better to secure the rights of the individ-ual wage-worker. All encouragement should be given to any such organization, so long as it is conducted with a due and decent regard for the rights of others. There are in this country some labor unions which have habitually, and other labor unions which have often, been among the most effective agents in working for good citizenship and for uplifting the condition of those whose welfare should be closest to our hearts. But when any labor union speks improper ends, or seeks to achieve proper ends by improper means, all good citizens and more especially all honorable public serv-ants must oppose the wrongdoing as resolutely as they would oppose the wrongdoing of any great corporation. Of wrongdoing of any great corporation. Of ourse any violence, brutality or corruption should not for one moment be toler ated. Wage-workers have an entire right to organize and by all peaceful and honor able means to endeavor to persuade their fellows to join with them in organizations. They have a legal right, which, according to circumstances, may or may not be a moral right, to refuse to work in company with men who decline to join their organizations. They have under no circumstances the right to commit vio-ience upon those, whether capitalists or wage-workers, who refuse to support their organizations, or who side with those with whom they are at odds; for mob rule is intoicrable in any form "

mob rule is intolerable in any form."

Railroad Accidents.

The increasing casualty list on American roads is commented upon and action by congress is called for. He earnestly corcurs in the law proposed to congress, re-quiring the adoption of the block system and points out the need of legisla-tion in the interest of the public safely limiting the hours of labor for railroad employes in train service upon rallroads engaged in interstate commerce, and providing that only trained and experienced persons be employed in positions of re-sponsibility connected with the operation of trains. The law of 1901, requiring inter-state railroads to make monthly reports of all accidents to passengers and employees on duty, should also be amended," he says, "so as to empower the government to make personal investigation, through proper neers, of all accidents involving loss of life which seem to require investigation, with a requirement that the results of such investigation be made public.

Corporations.

"When we come to deal with great cor-portions the need for the government to the directly is farigreater than in the case bet directly is far greater than in the case of labor, because great corporations can become such only by engaging in interstate commerce, and interstate commerce is pe-culiarly the field of the general govern-ment. It is an absurdity to expect to elim-mate the abuses in great corporations by state action. It is difficult to by patient with an argument that such matters should be left to the states, because more than one state pursues the policy of creating on easy terms corporations which are never operated within that state at all, but in other states where laws they more. The

The congress appropriates, directly and indi-rectly, \$6,000,000 annually to carry on this work. It reaches every state and territory in the union and the islands of the sea late-ly come under our flag. Cooperation is had with the state experiment stations, and with many other institutions and individuals. The world is carefully searched for varieties of grains, fruits, grasses, new vegetables, trees and shrubs, suitable to various localities in our country; and marked benefit to our producers has resulted.

Irrigation.

"During the two and a half years that have elapsed since the passage of the reclamation act rapid progress has been made in the surveys and examinations o the opportunities for reclamation in the 13 states and three territories of the arid west. Construction has already been be-gun on the largest and most important of the irrigation works, and plans are being completed for works which will util-ize the funds now available.

Forests and Forest Reserves.

"It is the cardinal principle of the forest-reserve policy of this administration that the reserves are for use. Whatever in-terferes with the use of their resources is to be avoided by every possible means. But these resources must be used in such a way as to make them permanent.

"Forest reserves are created for two principal purposes," he says, "to preserve the water supply and to preserve the timber supply for various classes of wood users," and he recommends that "all the forest work of the government should be oncentrated in the department of agriculture, where the larger part of that work is already done, where practically all of the trained foresters of the government are employed, where chiefty in Washington there is comprehensive first-hand knowl-edge of the problems of the reserves acquired on the ground, where all problems relating to growth from the soil are al-ready gathered, and where all the sciences auxillary to forestry are at hand for prompt and effective cooperation.

The Postal Service,

"In the post office department the service has increased in efficiency, and conditions as to revenue and expenditure continue satisfactory. The increase of revenue during the year was \$5,558,181.10, or \$5 per cent., the total receipts amounting to \$143,382,-624.34. The expenditures were \$152,562,116.70, an increase of about nine per cent, over the previous year, being thus \$8,979,492.36 in excess of the current revenue. Included in these expenditures was a total appropriation of \$12,956,637.35 for the continuation and extension of the rural free delivery service, which was an increase of \$4,902,237.35 over the amount expended for this purpose in the preceding fiscal year.

Currency.

"The attention of the congress should be especially given to the currency question, and that the standing committees on the matter in the two houses charged with the duty, take up the matter of our currency and see whether it is not possible to secure an agreement in the business world for bettering the system; the committees about consider the question of the retire-ment of the greenbacks and the problem of securing in our currency such elasticity as is consistent with safety. Every silver dollar should be made by law redeemable in gold at the option of the holder.

Merchant Marine.

"I especially commend to your immediate attention the encouragement of our mer-chant marine by appropriate legislation

"There is no danger of having too many immigrants of the right kinds. It makes no difference from what country they come. If they are sound in body and in mind, and, above all, if they are of good character, so that we can test assured that their chilmal government alone can deal ader low citizens of our children and grand. test may should be continued

The Philippines.

"In the Philippine islands there has been during the past year a continuation of the steady progress which has obtained

ever since our troops definitely got the upper hand of the insurgents. The Phil-ippine people, or, to speak more accur-ately, the many tribes, and even races. sundered from one another more or less harply, who go to make up the people of the Philippine islands, contain many elements of good, and some elements which we have a right to hope stand for progress. At present they are utterly incapable of existing in independence at all or of building up a civilization of their own. I firmly believe that we can

help them to rise higher and higher in the scale of civilization and of capacity for self-government, and I most carnest ly hope that in the end they will be able to stand, if not entirely alone, yet in some such relation to the United States as Cuba now stands. This end is not yet in sight, and it may be indefinitely postponed if our people are foolish enough to turn the attention of the Filipinos away from the problems of achieving moral and material prosperity, of working for a stable, orderly and just government, and toward foolish and dangerous in-

trigues for a complete independence for which they are as yet totally unfit. "On the other hand our people must keep steadily before their minds the fact that the justification for our stay in the Philippines must ultimately rest chiefly upon the good we are able to do in the Islands. I do not overlook the fact that islands. I do not overlook the fact that in the development of our interests in the Pacific ocean and along its coasts, the Philippines have played and will play an important part, and that our interests have been served in more than one way by the possession of the islands. But our

chief reason for continuing to hold them must be that we ought in good faith to try to do our share of the world's work, and this particular piece of work has been imposed upon us by the results of the war with Spain.

Every measure taken concerning the islands should be taken primarily with a view to their advantage. We should cer-tainly give them lower tariff rates on tainly give them lower tariff rates on their exports to the United States; if this is not done it will be a wrong to ex-tend our shipping laws to them. I earn-estly hope for the immediate enactment into law of the legislation now pending to encourage American capital to seek investment in the islands in railroads, in factories, in plantations, and in lumber-ing and mining.
