Satisfied with Governor-ship.

There has been some talk of having Governor Fred M. Warner become a candidate for United States senator to succeed General Russell A. Alger. Governor Warner has no such ambition. He is satisfied to act as chief executive and says so frankly. There is no quibbling about it. He states that if his administration is meeting with the approval of the people he would like a renewal of the honor. In reply to a letter from Perry F. Powers, Governor Warner says:

The use of my name in the connection to which you refer as a candidate for the U. S. senate to succeed Senator Alger, has never been authorized nor encouraged by me and I only await while I believe to be the proper time to make known my position to all my friends.

It is my greatest ambition to satisfactorily redeem the promises made by my friends in my behalf, and by myself to the people of Michigan previous to my election. I realize it is not possible to meet all expectations, but it has been my earnest desire throughout my official course to be influenced by considerations of the best good to the state, its institutions and its interests.

If the course which I have pursued and which I shall continue to follow, the approval of my party and the people generally, I shall be pleased and proud to accept from their hands the renewal of the honor and obligations which go with it.

The last legislature made it possible for members of the several parties of our state to select by direct vote the candidates for the office which I now hold. It would be an added honor and pleasure to be the first candidate of the republican party for governor of Michigan upon whom this favor, direct from the entire body of our membership, should come.

I am interested, as others are and as all should be, as to who may be the choice of the Republicans of Michigan for United States senator. I greatly regret the condition of Senator Alger's health is such that he does not wish to accept another term of the high office he now holds. Should his health improve, I trust Senator Alger will change his mind in the matter, but if he does not I hope his successor will be a representative man in the best meaning of that term, representing first and always the best interest of the state and the wishes of its people.

The furnace at the school was completed this week.

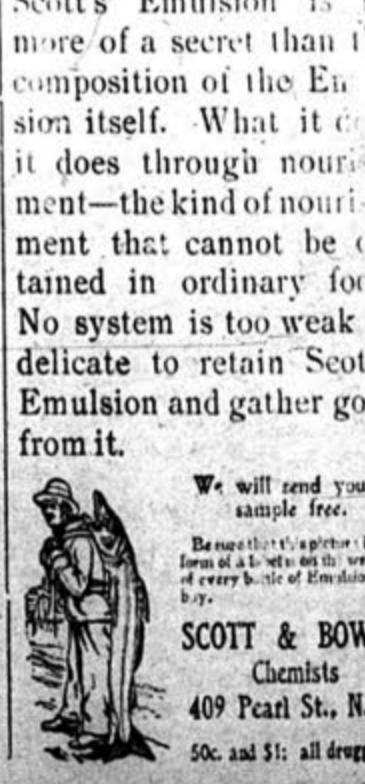

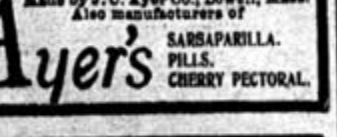
William F. King, who has been for a number of years foreman at the Journal office, left last Sunday for Milwaukee.
