BE IT RESOLVED that the best interests of the County require the passage by the State Legislature of a special act making all expense incurred in connection with contagious diseases in Delta County, payable by the city, village or township in which those afflicted with such contagious disease reside; and

Resolved further that the Chairman appoint a committee of three to confer with the representatives of Delta County in the State Legislature looking to the drafting and passage of such a bill.

There are varying and conflicting reports regarding the cause of the arrests and the attempts to destroy property by fire. Every one of the warrants was sworn out by John Tait, who resides at McMillan. Mr. Tait is clerk of Luce county. Within the last two months his dwelling has been fired no less than three times; the plant of the Northern Coöperage Co. was also visited on the same night. On the night of June 1st the D. S. S. & A. railroad depot was reduced to ashes. Detectives have been on the watch in the neighborhood for several weeks and the arrests of Thursday were the result of their investigations.

Some of the suspects are men prominent in local township political circles. Locke has served on the county board.

## JUST FOR THE BOY'S SAKE.

Father Begins Study of Science to Keep Pace with Son's Lessons.

A sedate merchant residing in West Philadelphia has purchased a "First Lesson in Electricity" and reads it so constantly that until he recently explained his friends were wondering whether he was thinking of giving up commerce and going in for a scientific career, or what, says the Philadelphia Record.

"No, it's my boy," he said when asked this question. "I had a fairly good education in the rudiments of all the sciences that figured when I went to school, and I've been able generally to meet the boy's questions with fair success. When he went in for saw, hammer and nails I was able to show him a few things about the grain of wood, right angles, bevels and other points in carpentry; then when he became interested in steam engines, I managed to face his conundrums about condensation, expansion and what not. It was the same through his studies of windmills, the properties of liquids and similar interesting fields, and he came to think that I was a pretty good sort of an assistant.

"About a month ago, however, he struck electricity—or, rather, electricity struck him—and he is rapidly losing faith in me as his guide, philosopher and friend. My school studies in electricity concerned only the basic principles of the mysterious force so far as they were known, but the boy wants to know now how to make armatures, induction coils, buzzers, relays and a lot of more things I can't even remember the name of. And when he gets 'em he wants to know how and why they operate as they do—a curiosity I have always encouraged and helped him to fill out how to satisfy. But I'm up against it now and that's why you see me poring over 'First Lessons in Electricity.'"

## FIRST COSSACKS OVER HERE

Daring Voyages in Crude Boats Cost Many Lives Crossing the Behring Sea.

Long before Peter the Great had sent Vitus Bering to America, in 1741, Russian voyagers had launched out east and north with a daredevil recklessness that would have done honor to prehistoric man. That part of their adventures is a record that exceeds the wildest darlings of fiction, says a writer in Harper's Magazine. Their boats were called koches. They were some 60 feet long, flat-bottomed, planked with green timber. Not a nail was used. Where were nails to come from 6,000 miles across the frozen tundras? Indeed, iron was so scarce that at a later day, when ships with nails ventured on these seas, natives were detected diving below to pull the nails from the timbers with their teeth. Instead of nails the Cossacks used reindeer thongs to bind the planking together. Instead of tar, moss and clay and the tallow of sea animals calked the seams. Needless to say, there was neither canvas nor rope. Reindeer thongs supplied the cordage, reindeer hides the sails. On such rickety craft, "with the help of God and a little powder," the Russian voyagers hoisted sail and put to sea. On just such vessels did Deshneff and Staduch in attempt to round Asia from the Arctic into Behring sea (1647-50).

To be sure, the first bang of the ice floes against the prow of the rickety boats knocked them into kindling wood. Two-thirds of the Cossack voyagers were lost every year; and often all news that came of the crew was a mast pole washed in by the tide with a dead man lashed to the cross-trees. Small stores of fresh water could be carried. Pine needles were the only antidote for scurvy, and many a time the boat came tumbling back in the home port; not a man well enough to stand before the mast.

## STRANGE MEXICAN LEGEND

Terrible Doings of a Rich Man Who Had the Habit of Killing People.

Thomas A. Janvier relates in Harper's magazine a number of folk-legends of the city of Mexico; among them is the legend of Don Juan Manuel, told as it came to him from a Mexican peasant:

"This Don Juan Manuel, senior, was a rich and worthy gentleman, who had the bad vice of killing people. Every night at 11 o'clock, when the palace clock was striking, he went out from his magnificent house—as you know, senior, it still is standing in the street that has been named after him—all muffled in his cloak and under it his dagger in his hand

"Then he would meet one in the dark street and would ask him politely, 'What is the hour of night?' And that person, having heard the striking of the clock, would answer, 'It is eleven hours of the night.' And Don Manuel would say to him, 'Senior, you are fortunate above all men, because you know precisely the hour at which you die!' Then he would thrust with his dagger—and then, leaving the dead gentleman lying in the street, he would come back again into his own house. And this bad vice of Don Juan Manuel's of killing people went on, senior, for a great many years."
