SEVERAL CITIES TSITED

Also Recommend That City Construct its own Plant if Legally in a Position to do so.

The installation of artisian water service in Escanaba was one of the principal recommendations of the special in-Vestigating committee of the city council Tuesday night.

Two members of the committee, Mayor Perron and Alderman E. M. St. Jacques made a tour of a number of cities in Wisconsin and Michigan and obtained considerable information concerning water plants.

Following is the complete report submitted by the members of the sperial committee:

To the common council of the city Erranabe.

Gentlemen: Your council to whom was referred the application of the Es canaba Water company for a new fran chise for 30 years to fornish filtered water from Little Bay de Noc. and also the application of Harry Lucas for a tranch se for 30 years to furnish artesian water to the people of the city of Escanaba, beg leave to submit the following report and recom nendation:

Fir-t: We recommend that a new franchise be not granted to the E canaba Water company for the following reasons: Your . council has ca e'ully investigated the question of a proper supply for fire and domestic purposes in the city, and for that purpose two members of the committee, Mr. Perran and Mr St Ja ques, have spent four days investigating water companies and water supplies in eight cities of the state of Michigan and Wisconsin. to wit: Menominee, Mich., Marinette Green Bay, Kaukauna, Appleton. Menasha, O-bkosh and Food du Lac, Tes, three of which cities, to wir:

Green Bay, Kaukauna and Fund du Lac are supplied by artesian water and three of the cities to wit: Marinet'e, Appleton and Oshkosh, are supplied by water taken from rivers or lakes and filtered by a style of filt :r +imilar to the one purposed to be established in this city by the Escanaba Water company:

After such investigation we are satisfied that the filtration of water at hast as it is done in the places above named and as it is proposed to be done in Escanaba; by the Escanaba Water company will not make the water of Little Bay de Noc pure and wholeso ne and such as our people have a right to demand and we are convinced that it is advisable for the city of Escaraba to procure its water supply from artesian wells if possible

We ther fore recommend that proper steps be taken by the common council of the city of Escanaba to procure a water supply for all fire and domestic purposes from artesian wells . As to bow and by whom such water supply shall be furnished we submit t at there are two methods which should b considered.

First, by the granting of a franchise to some person or company for that purpose and second by the construc tion and operation of a plant by the

MASS MEEING WAS HELD

Citizens Take Steps to Get Good Locations to offer for New Government Building.

CENTRAL LOCATION SOUGHT

Sentiment at Meeting Favored North west Corner of Mary Street and Wells Avenue.

A mass meeting of citizens was held Wednesday night at the city hall for the purpose of discussing favorable locations for a site for the new government building.

While the meeting was called for all business men and citizens to attend, it was a very noticable fact that only business men west of Georgia street were present, and there was consequently little difference of opinion as to what part of the city would be the best for the location.

In opening the meeting Atty. Judd Yelland said in part. "I believe the location of this building, to be of considerable importance and something in which the business men should interest themselves, when once located the government building is permanent and will probably behere longer than any of us.

I believe the business men should agree on some favorable site and then secure donations and offer the property to the government at as low a figure as possible, in order to permit the bulk of the appropriation to be used on the building.'

Ex-Mayor A. J. Valentine was elected chairman of the meeting and invited those present to express their opinions. Nearly every business man who was present favored the idea of united action and soliciting of funds to reduce the cost to the government. NOT TO INVESTIGATE

City Council Upholds Action of Board of Public Works

The action of the Board of Public works in declining to act on Mayor Perron's request that the lighting plant be given a thorough investigation was upheld by the city council Tuesday night, when the mayor brought the matter before the council. Some of the aldermen were in favor of having the investigation ordered as the mayor recommend while the majority believed the matter should be left entirely with the Board of Public works, In view of the fact that the Lighting plant is in a fairly good condition, a number of the aldermen did not believe the city should be put to the expense of such an investigation as the mayor asked for.

The mayor's desire to improve the plant and light service and installation of machinery that will reduce the operating expenses is a worthy one however and we feel sure the Board of Public Works would be willing to expend the amount of money necessary to make these improvements at the present time. The plant is being constantly improved and extensions are made as fast as the profits admit.

Following is a portion of the letter submitted to the board by Mayor Perron and upon which they declined to act. .

"To the board of public works: Gentlemen: Since becoming mayor of this city there has been lodged with me considerable complaint about the Jeansen operation of our present electric and gas lighting plant, both on account of Riopelle poor service, delayed service and ve.y poor street lighting It also being Scanlon | charged that the plant is in poor physi-Lefebre cal conditions and steadily running Cannon behind. That there is practically no gas plant to give such servi e as we should give-pur citizens and as mayor of the city and being desirous of doing my full duty by the citizens of Escanaha, it is my desire to have made a thorough investigation, by outside, competent engineers and accountants to determine, exactly, the pre-ent physical condition of the plant, the value as it now stands. also whether through its operation it is earning or losing money. Further to learn what amount of money it would be neceseary for the city to expend to put the plant in the best physical and econom ical condition, and to increase it large enough to serve all demands made upon it for both electricity and gas and the proper and thorough lighting of the streets.

To obtain the information it will be necessary to employ competent engineers and accountants and I would ask your body to authorize the common council of the city to employ such engineers and accountants





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

Father Begins Study of Science t Keep Pace with Son's

A sedate merchant residing in West Philadelphia has purchased a "First Lesson in Electricity" and reads it so constantly that until he recently explained his friends were wondering whether he was thinking of giving up commerce and going in for a scientific career, or what, says the Philadelphia Record.

"No, it's my boy," he said when asked this question. "I had a fainly good education in the rudiments of all the sciences that figured when I went to sahool, and I've been able generally to meet the boy's questions with fair success. When he went in for saw, hammer and nails I was able to show him a few things about the grain of wood, right angles, bevels and other points in carpentry; then when he became interested in steam engines. I managed to face his conundrums about condensation, expansion and what not It was the same through his studies of windmills, the properties of liquids and similar interesting fields, and he came to think that I was a pretty good sort of an assistant.

Daring Voyages in Crude Boats Cost Many Lives Orossing the Behring Sea.
