INVENTOR **GREW SUSPICIOUS**

Jas. Devlin Believes Offer of \$975. 000 to be Part of Scheme to Steal Secret of His Invention

HAS MADE NO DEAL

Claims That Stranger Who Represented Himself as Attorney Walsh Refused to Prove Validity of Draft

James F. Devlin, the fireman on the Northwestern road, who it was reported early in the week had sold his patent on a reversible rotary steam engine for \$975,000 returned to Escanaba Thursday from Green Bay, to which point he had accompanied the stranger who made the offer, and now states that he has made no deal for the sale of his in-

Mr. Devlin says it was his first intention to accompany the stranger, who represented himself as Atty. W. J. Walsh and acting for the North Lloyd, the Hamburg American and the Cunard had made him the offer and suggested E. Hamilton of Rapid River officiated that they stop off at Fond du Lac as umpires. and test the validity of the \$975,000 draft at a bank.

Devlin did not press the matter and told Walsh that he did not intend to go any further until he had positive proof that the offer was genuine. -Walsh tried to induce him to go on but he! refused and returned to Escanaba Thursday morning and will now resume work at his position as fireman.

When it was first announded that for his patent, the story was received with a degree of doubt in this city as there seemed to be no definate information on the subject from Devlin hims self. The draft for \$975,000 however which several persons claimed to have seen, together with a contract by which Devlin was to receive \$50 per day, for 100 days for demonstrating his invention, seemed to be sufficient proof that the invention had been sold for that amount.

It has been known for some time by Mr. Devlin's acquaintences that he has been working on a model for a new engine, although no one except the inventor has the secret of the new discovery.

A demonstration of the invertion which is said to have been successful took place at Appleton a short time ago and Walch and others whom Devlin knew to be representative of the eastern steamship lines were present.

Devlin says that he has as yet secured no patent on his invention and does not intend to do so for fear it may be held that he has made a technical infringement on another patent and his idea

stolen from him. To put the patent through successfully would cost he believes about \$20,000 and although he could secure this amount by granting to some one a controlling interest he declines to do

Devlin claimes that by his invention the motive power for marine and land transportation will be revolutionized and that by one fifth the present coal consumption the same amount of power can be secured.

Season Opens October 1st. and closes November 30th. in Upper Penin-

The partrige season for the Upper Peninsula begins Oct. 1st. and these birds may be killed until Nov. 30th. In the lower Peninsula the season

does not begin until two weeks later. Following is the game law governing the killing of partridge in this state.

"No person shall injure, kill or destroy brattempt to kill, or destroy by any means whatever, any ruffed grouse, commonly called partrdige, or any spruce hen saye only from October fifteenth to November thirtieth, both inclusive, in each year: provided however, that in the Upper Peninsula ruffed grouse commonly called partridge, and spruce hen, may be killed from October first to November thirtieth, both inclusive in each year. And it shall be unlawful during the periods last above in this section mentioned, for any person to kill, injure, destroy or capture by any means whatever a greater number of ruffed grouse or spruce hen than twelve in one day, and it shall be unlawful for any person to have in his possession or in the possession of any firm or corporation for him at any time, more than lifty ruffed grouse or more than fifty spruce hen."

RUSSIA'S BLOOD BATH

SOLDIERS FIND VICTIMS IN THE JEWISH QUARTERS.

MASSACRE IN TWO CITIES

Siedice and Warsaw Indulge in Scenes That Betray the Brutality of Troops, Who Murder and Pillage Without Mercy.

St. Petersburg .- The predictions cf a Jewish massacre at Siedice, Russian Poland, unhappily have been justified by the fighting which broke out Saturday night, and developed Sunday into a carnival of indiscriminate slaughter and pillage in which the soldiery and the mob took part. Jews were shot and bayoneted in the streets of the town. Houses and shops were broken into and sacked. Valuables were carried off and offered for sale by soldiers to passengers on passing trains

In addition to the Jews a number of Christians and even some officers met their death in the fighting.

Siedlee.—A delegation of citizens asked the governor to order the troops to cease firing, but the governor replied that the citizens must deliver up their leaders and the revolutionists or otherwise the city would be bombarded.

The authorities assert that 15 terrorists have arrived here from Warsaw and that they must be arrested before any of the inhabitants are permitted to leave the city.

It is reported that 200 persons, most of them Jews, were killed, many in their flats. The scenes Sunday and Monday

RUSSIAN TOWN BURIED BY MUD Fifty-five Bodies Recovered Out of 255 Caught in Avalanche.

Tiflis.-Practically without warning the side of a mountain rising above the township of Kwareli broke away, and in a sea of semi-liquid mud, sand and stones swept down on the township and overwhelmed and oblit-

About 255 persons have been buried alive. Fifty-five bodies have been recovered from the mire, which is about six feet deep. An addition to the lives lost, countless-numbers of cattle per-

ished and the crops were destroyed. Kawareli township occupies an area of five kilometers in the district of Tslaw, in the Caucasus. Similar disasters are of common occurrence in Caucasian valleys.

Marblehead, Mass.-The Roosevelt cup, presented by the Eastern Yacht club to inaugurate yachting contests between Germany and America, was won Monday by the American yacht Vim, owned by Commodore T. L. Park of the American Yacht club, of New York.

By taking this race the Vim scored her third victory, which gave to her owner the cup, as well as the honor of showing that his yacht was the best all round craft of the six that started to race in the series.

MAINE ELECTION VERY CLOSE Republican Plurality Is Cut Into by the Democratic Vote.

Portland, Me .- Three hundred and fifty cities, towns and plantations out of 520 give Cobb (R.) 56,583; Davis (D.), 50,641. Republican plurality, 5,-942. This is a net Republican loss of 15,760.

Seth M. Carter, chairman of the Republican state committee, claimed the election of Gov. Cobb by a plurality of 7,000 or 8,000. He also predicted Congressman Littlefield's election by a safe but greatly reduced plurality.



The Easterbrook Case,

The mystery surrounding the reported murder of Charles Esterbrook, of Saginaw, a horseman, by an Indian in the woods near West Branch early last week, is deepened by the investigation in West Branch and Standish. Esterbrook's body has not only not been found, but no proof of the atleged

murder can be gained. Esterbrook had been in West Branen for several weeks buying and selling horses, but disappeared completely the day that word reached a Saginaw newspaper from West Branch that he

had been murdered by an Indian, Es terbrook was said to have provided the motive for the alleged murder in an insult offered to the Indian's squaw. West Branch, however, found no evidence that any such insult had been offered.

The only thing they found that gave color to the report was the mysterious disappearance of Esterbrook, The sheriff of Ogemaw county knew him. having formed his acquaintance at the instance of Saginaw authorities, who suspected him of leaving Saginaw with a woman. This suspicion is said to be entirely unfounded.

"I take no stock whatever in the report that my brother was murdered, said Will Esterbrook, of Detroit, "But what mystifies me is the origin of the various reports to that effect. It seems they reached Saginaw from West Branch first and then to Detroit, Later came a letter from Atlas telling of the alleged burial and naming the surviv ing members of the family.

"Although I have no particular reason for believing that my brother himself, spread the report for a purpose, yet I am inched to think so. It seems very strange that anyone cise would go to the pains to make up such a story out of the whole cloth, as it surely seems to be a lie from start to finish. I do not know positively of any woman with whom he was closely associated and from whom he niight have desired to escape. I do not think he had any such debts as would cause him to make such a desperate effort to obliterate himself from the reach of his creditors, and neither do I know of any crime he committed that would cause him to take this method of throwing officers off his trail."





There is, put away in an obscure but picturesque part of Germany, a little "cure" which is called the chocolate cure. Here the patients go to get stout. They study the scenery, drink chocolate and cocoa, eat it and grow just fat enough.

The beauty of the chocolate "cure" is that the fat settles in the right w place. It does not stop at the abdomen. But it settles, rather, in the arms, the hands, the neck and the shoulders. In a very little while the patients become beautiful.

The cereals will plump out the neck, but one must not take too much cream with them. Vegetables also plump the neck, but one must be careful to take them fresh and without too much butter. There are fats which seem to settle in the abdomen and other fats which go toward the shoulders and hands. It is curious to the student of beauty to observe the different direction which the flesh will take. One kind of food, namely potatoes, will make the abdomen full. Another kind of food will make the shoulders stout, while a third kind will cause the cheeks to grow fat. It is a knowledge of these various kinds of food which makes a woman pretty or otherwise. She can really govern her fat to suit herself if she knows what

If the shoulders are of the sloping or old-fashioned type they should be dressed very plainly.* A Quaker handkerchief folded around the shoulders in such a manner as to make them | Bismarck the most imposing and a still lower and still more sloping is the prettiest thing in the work. Next comes the Priscilla scarf, which is a sort of plain muslin fichu; and third, there is the plain round low neck, with its neat finish and its delicate edge. All of these serve to bring out the oldfashioned lowness of the old-fashioned low sloping-shoulder.

The shoulder of the matron which is the plump, round shoulder, is the shoulder that can be dressed showily. It can be wrapped with furs and dressed with velvets. It can be encircled with real lace and it can be looped and twined with jewels. If the shoulders, in spite of every art persist in being uneven and ugly there are exercises that can be taken for them. One of these is the weight exercise. The victims walks up and down for 15 minutes a day carrying a weight in her short arm-the arm with the high shoulder. In time this will lower the shoulder. If both shoulders are high she bends backward until they are equal.

The shoulder exercise, the shoulder dlet, the shoulder massage and the shoulder treatment will, in time, make any pair of shoulders handsome. And in a short while the worst pair of arms and neck will become beautiful. It takes about four weeks of constant care. But at the end of that time the results will be so good that the patient will not regret the time she spent upon the work of reforming her shape.

How many of us thank metallic lead for the comforts of paint? Yet the tallic lead corroded by acid to a white powder known as "white lead." Of course, there are many imitations of

"white lead," some of which are sold as white lead and some which are offered by the name of ready-prepared paint under the familiar pretense that they are "just as good" as white lead. But all good paint is made of the metal, lead, corroded and ground to a fine white powder and the first six months of the current mixed with linseed oil.

White lead is also used in the coating of fine oil cloths and for many purposes besides paint.

"Red lead" is another product of metallic lead and is what is known as an oxide of lead, being produced by burning the metal. Red lead is the best paint known to preserve iron, steel or t.n. and is used largely in painting metal structures, such as skyscraper skeletons, mills and

There are many other products of the metal lead, such as litharge, orange mineral, etc., which are essential to many of the arts in which we never imagine that lead would be of the least use.

Verily, we live in an age of lead as well as of iron.
