TWO STREETS SAME NAME

Alleyway Erom Harrison St. to Held Meeting Wednesday and Of Earning of I. S. Co., E. & L. S. Dousman, Between Ludington and Thomas Sts. Is Fannie Street

Escanaba has two Fannie streets. other runs north and south for a great number of blocks between Jennie and Sarah streets

That fact was brought to notice as the result of a petition that is now being circulated among property owners asking that an entrance to the bay be opened through the alley now existing south of Hansen and Jensen's property and through the property of

the I. Stephenson company to the bay. It was on the advice of Capt. George Shipman that the original plat of the city of Escanaba was looked up and it was found that the alley now running from Dousman to Tilden avenue between Ludington and Thomas streets should in reality be a 60 foot street known as Fannie street. The revised plat also shows the same street and the application for an opening to the city contain notice of the desire that Fannie street be continued east from Tilden avenue to the bay shore.

Citizens Not Citizens

As . the direct result of investigations that have been conducted here by representatives of the United States Immigration department a large number of local residents, who have thought themselves citizens of the United States for years, have learned that they were laboring under a false belief.

Last Monday in the circuit court out of twenty-eight who were admitted, to citizenship a number had been residents of Escanaba for long terms and had thought themselves citizens. Among those was James H. Elliott, former council member and for several years prominent in the city's affairs who discovered that he was not a full fledged citizen of the United States because of a discrepancy in his papers and he took the formal oath

Of the 39 petitions for naturaliza tion to come before the court Monday 28 were admitted to citizenship, 7 failed to appear, two were dismissed and two were continued to allow the applicants to study government.

NARROW ESCAPE FROM DEATH

Captain Charles McCauley Fell From Ore Dock-Saved by Brace

Capt Charles McCauley of the steamer Maywood narrowly escaped death Saturday afternoon while at work on the new ore dock. While walking along a beam fully seventy feet from the ground, Captain McCauley lost his fobting and started falling to almost certain death below. By amiracle, however, he was able to arrest his downward fight by grasping a steel brace about eight feet below the beam he had fallen from. Other men on the dock who saw Captain McCauley fall, rushed to the spot and assisted him back to the former place of comparative safety on the beam.

MUST FILE REPORT

Ry. and Mashek Chemical and Iron Co.

Executors of the will of the late Daniel Wells Jr., among whom are U. S. Senator Isaac Stephenson and H. A. J. Upham, must give an accounting of the earnings of the corporations in which Mr. Wells' was interested to Daniel Wells Norris, a grandson of Mr. Wells and one of the beneficiaries under his will.

Among the corporations the earnings of which the executors must account for are the I. Stephenson company; the Mashek Chemical & Iron company and the Escanaba & Lake Superior Railway.

Of the decision of the court in the claims of Mr. Norris, a Milwaukee newspaper says:

Daniel Wells Norris, grandson of the late Danjel Wells, Jr. wins his fight to compel the executors of his grandfather's estate to account for earnings of corporations owned by the Wells estate, by a decision just handed down by Judge Ludwig.

Several large corporations in the northern part of the state are owned by the estate. By the will of Mr. Wells his grandson is entitled to a share in their earnings. All of them are controlled by trustees of the Wells cstate. No dividends have been declared during the last, few years and Mr. Norris complained that dividends ought to be declared, and he be given his share of them.

The trustees objected on the ground that the court has no jurisdiction over the corporations, or over the trustees in their capacities of directors of the orporations. The matter was argued before Judge Ludwig for several days a few months ago.

The matter came up before Judge adwig on objections by Mr. Norris to he approval by the court of the last annual account of the executors in his decision Judge Ludwig says:

"It seems to me clear that when the trustees' report is attacked, it devoived upon them to explain the entire situation and the reason for want of inome where income is usually expected. The burden to explain is on them."

The undivided profits of the compara ions amount to hundreds of thousands of dollars, according to the complaint. Judge Ludwig's decision reversed a desicion by former Probate Judge Paul D. Carpenter, who decided that a court had no right to conduct the desired inquiry. No appeal can be taken to the supreme court from Judge Ludwig's decision according to Attorney Glenway Maxon of counsel for Mr. Norris. The inquiry into the matter of the undivided dividends will probably be taken up before Judge Ludwig next week.


