PROCEEDINGS

OFFICIAL MINUTES

Escanaba, Mich., Jan. 18, 1910
A regular meeting of the common council of the city of Escanaba was held in the council chambers on the above-named date.

Present—Mayor Greenhoot, and Aldermen Powers, Priester, McColl, Jaegers, Schmidt, St. Jacques, Gallagher, Valentine and Mooney.—9

Absent—Aldermen Wickert, Long, Folio, Garrity and Johnson.—5.
Alderman Powers, supported by Alderman Jaeger moved that the minutes of the previous meeting be approved without reading. Motion carried.

Mayor Greenhoot informed the council that the action brought by E. B. Cogswell who holds notes against the City of Escanaba to the amount of \$2,450 for payment for seven Abbott voting machines, would be tried on Thursday of this week in the circuit court for the county of Delta and that as the case is an important one, the city attorney had requested the mayor to allow Attorney F. D. Mead to act as assistant counsel for the city.

Alderman Priester supported by Alderman Mooney moved that the city attorney be authorized to employ Attorney F. D. Mead as assistant counsel. Motion prevailed by the following vote: Ayes—Aldermen Powers, Priester, McColl, Jaegers, Schmidt, St. Jacques, Gallagher, Valentine, Mooney.—9.
Nays—None.

A petition signed by Frank Durrell asking permission to move the location of his saloon from 1055 Ludington street to 1622 Ludington street, was read.

Alderman Schmidt supported by Alderman Gallagher moved that the petition be granted. Motion prevailed by the following vote: Ayes—Aldermen Powers, Priester, McColl, Jaegers, Schmidt, St. Jacques, Gallagher, Valentine, Mooney.—9.
Nays—Alderman Mooney.—1

A petition signed by Mrs. A. S. Warn asking the council to assist her in the payment of her taxes as she is unable to pay them, was read. Alderman Priester, supported by Alderman Powers moved that the communication be referred to the finance committee. Ayes, all.

A communication signed by Peter Lemmer and fifty other signers objecting to the inlet which the I. Stephenson company proposes to construct on the east side of the bridge to the coal dock at the north end of Tilden avenue, because the present inlet is more convenient and asking that the original Fannie street be extended east to the water of Little Bay de Noc, was read.

A communication signed by Harry B. Robertson and 45 other signers, of Bay de Noc township, objecting to the inlet which the I. Stephenson company proposes to construct on the east side of the bridge to the coal dock at the north end of Tilden avenue, was read.

Alderman McColl supported by Alderman Powers, moved that the petitions referred to the street committee. Motion prevailed.

The following report of the finance committee was read:

Alderman St. Jacques supported by Alderman Powers, moved the adoption of the following resolution:

WHEREAS—The Common Council and Board of City Assessors have met at the time and place named in the notice of the City Clerk published and provided by law, and have reviewed the special assessment roll for the purpose of defraying that part of the cost which the council decided should be paid and borne by special assessment for the grading and paving of the Danforth Road, commencing from the North and South center lines of Section 24, Township 39 North, Range 23 West, to the City Limits, and have heard all objections to any assessment which may have been made by any person deeming himself aggrieved thereby.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That said assessment roll be and the same is hereby confirmed.

The resolution was adopted by the following vote: Ayes—Aldermen Powers, Priester, McColl, Jaegers, Schmidt, St. Jacques, Gallagher, Valentine, Mooney.—9.

Alderman Priester offered the following resolution:

WHEREAS—The Council has confirmed the assessment roll levied to defray the cost of grading and paving the Danforth Road, commencing from the North and South center lines of Section 24, Township 39 North, Range 23 West, to the City Limits.

RESOLVED—That the amount of said roll be divided into and payable in three (3) equal installments, with interest at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum; each of which said installments shall be payable, with the accrued interests, on the 1st day of July, in the years 1910, 1911, 1912 respectively, and the Board of City Assessors be instructed to make a special assessment roll for each installment as the same shall become due as aforesaid, with the accrued interest, upon all unpaid installments included and assessed therein.

On motion of Alderman Valentine, supported by Alderman Powers, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED—That the Mayor and the City Clerk, be, and they are hereby authorized and directed, to enter into contract between the city and the Solid Rock Paving and Construction Co. for the furnishing of material and doing said work on Danforth Road according to specifications, plans and diagrams thereon on file in the office of the City Clerk, and for the payment of the contract price. The City Attorney is hereby directed to prepare the necessary contracts and bonds, and the same and the sureties thereto to be approved by the Mayor.

Alderman St. Jacques, supported by Alderman Jaegers moved the adoption of the following resolution:

WHEREAS—Notice has been duly published of the intention of this Council to grade and pave the Ford River Switch Road and of the District to be assessed, and of the time when the Council will hear objections thereto, and all objections having been heard and duly considered;

IT IS RESOLVED—That said improvement be made and is hereby ordered that the City Clerk be directed to advertise for two weeks for proposals for doing the work of grading and paving said road or street with stone macadam according to the plans, specifications and diagrams prepared by the City Surveyor and on file in the office of the City Clerk; the work to be completed on or before the 1st day of July 1910, and a certified check to accompany the proposal of each bidder for at least 10 per cent of the largest amount bid, to be forfeited if the bidder refuses or neglects to enter into contract if his bid is accepted. The City Clerk will state in his notice the day of the next regular session of the Council next after the expiration of the time stated for advertising, as the time when the bids will be received.

TWO STREETS SAME NAME

Alleyway From Harrison St. to Dousman, Between Ludington and Thomas Sts. Is Fannie Street

Escanaba has two Fannie streets. One runs east and west from Harrison avenue to Tilden avenue between Ludington and Thomas streets and the other runs north and south for a great number of blocks between Jennie and Sarah streets.

That fact was brought to notice as the result of a petition that is now being circulated among property owners asking that an entrance to the bay be opened through the alley now existing south of Hansen and Jensen's property and through the property of the I. Stephenson company to the bay.

It was on the advice of Capt. George Shipman that the original plat of the city of Escanaba was looked up and it was found that the alley now running from Dousman to Tilden avenue between Ludington and Thomas streets should in reality be a 60 foot street known as Fannie street. The revised plat also shows the same street and the application for an opening to the city, contain notice of the desire that Fannie street be continued east from Tilden avenue to the bay shore.

Citizens Not Citizens

As the direct result of investigations that have been conducted here by representatives of the United States Immigration department a large number of local residents, who have thought themselves citizens of the United States for years, have learned that they were laboring under a false belief.

Last Monday in the circuit court out of twenty-eight who were admitted to citizenship a number had been residents of Escanaba for long terms and had thought themselves citizens. Among those was James H. Elliott, former council member and for several years prominent in the city's affairs who discovered that he was not a full fledged citizen of the United States because of a discrepancy in his papers and he took the formal oath of allegiance.

Of the 39 petitions for naturalization to come before the court Monday 28 were admitted to citizenship, 7 failed to appear, two were dismissed and two were continued to allow the applicants to study government.

NARROW ESCAPE FROM DEATH

Captain Charles McCauley Fell From Ore Dock—Saved by Brace

Capt Charles McCauley of the steamer Maywood narrowly escaped death Saturday afternoon while at work on the new ore dock. While walking along a beam fully seventy feet from the ground, Captain McCauley lost his footing and started falling to almost certain death below. By miracle, however, he was able to arrest his downward flight by grasping a steel brace about eight feet below the beam he had fallen from. Other men on the dock saw Captain McCauley fall, rushed to the spot and assisted him back to the former place of comparative safety on the beam.

Mayor Provided Rink

While there is not any skating on the bay just at present Mayor Greenhoot has provided a much better place for the little folks of the city by flooding the old Tilden grounds and thus making not only a good skating and sliding place, but a perfectly safe place for the children.

Sunday afternoon a great crowd of youngsters gathered on the grounds and from two until six o'clock in the afternoon their cheers and laughter could be heard filling the air.

The mayor is certainly making himself "solid" with the little folks.

Team Ran Away

Becoming frightened while tied on North Mary street late Monday afternoon a team belonging to the Richter Brewing company broke away and created considerable excitement among pedestrians on Ludington street. Arriving at Ludington street, running at a mad clip the team scattered, pedestrians at the crossing until one braver than the rest dove for the reins and finally brought the frightened horses to a standstill.

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

Held Meeting Wednesday and Elected Officers and Directors

Stockholders of the Delta County Agricultural Society held their annual meeting at the city hall Wednesday evening and selected a full set of officers for the coming year. In addition plans were discussed for either purchasing or leasing a permanent fair grounds for the association and before the completion of the business of the evening the committee on grounds was instructed to continue their work and be prepared to submit a complete report when the next open meeting of the stockholders is held on Mar. 18.

A. J. Berckman of Escanaba township was unanimously re-elected as president of the association for the coming year, and the other officers chosen are: Herman Johnson Rock, vice president Atty. Torval E. Strom secretary and Peter Jensen treasurer. T. J. Martin and John A. Stromberg, members of the board of directors from the city of Escanaba, presented their resignations last night each pleading the lack of time to give the proper attention to matters of the association demanded by the officers and both resignations were accepted.

The report submitted by Secretary Strom showed that although the organization has been in existence but four months over two hundred members have been enrolled and sufficient membership blanks have been filled out about the county and not turned in to the secretary to raise the total number of members to over 300.

Considerable discussion was indulged in as to the proper location of a fair grounds. Some favored the old fair ground location but the majority of opinion seemed to be that if property could be secured at a reasonable price near the old cemetery on Stephenson avenue that would be a much more desirable location. The members of the committee on grounds will make a complete investigation of the matter before the March meeting when final action will be taken.

Drug Store at Wells

The Wells Drug Store will be the name of a new establishment to be opened at Wells soon by Charles H. Bisdee, who for the past five years has been employed as pharmacist at Ellsworth's drug store in this city. A new building is being constructed at Wells for the store and it is hoped by Mr. Bisdee to open the establishment for business before Mar. 1.

Since coming to Escanaba Mr. Bisdee has made a host of friends among the businessmen of the city and all of whom are now predicting for him an immense success in his personal business venture.

Goes to Columbia College

Miss Henriette Calhoun, for several years instructor in science at the Escanaba high school and who left here two years ago to take a post graduate course at the University of Michigan, has accepted a position as instructor in science at Columbia College, Columbia, S. C. Miss Calhoun was one of the most popular high school instructors ever employed here and her former pupils and friends will be delighted to learn of the advancement made by her.

Enjoyed Sleigh Ride

About a dozen Escanaba couples enjoyed a bus ride out to Thomas Richie's farm at Flat Rock Sunday evening, and at the farm passed the time pleasantly with music, dancing and games. Refreshments were served.

MUST FILE REPORT

Of Earning of I. S. Co., E. & L. S. Ry. and Mashek Chemical and Iron Co.

Executors of the will of the late Daniel Wells Jr., among whom are U. S. Senator Isaac Stephenson and H. A. J. Upham, must give an accounting of the earnings of the corporations in which Mr. Wells was interested to Daniel Wells Norris, a grandson of Mr. Wells and one of the beneficiaries under his will.

Among the corporations the earnings of which the executors must account for are the I. Stephenson company; the Mashek Chemical & Iron company and the Escanaba & Lake Superior Railway.

Of the decision of the court in the claims of Mr. Norris, a Milwaukee newspaper says:

Daniel Wells Norris, grandson of the late Daniel Wells, Jr. wins his fight to compel the executors of his grandfather's estate to account for earnings of corporations owned by the Wells estate, by a decision just handed down by Judge Ludwig.

Several large corporations in the northern part of the state are owned by the estate. By the will of Mr. Wells his grandson is entitled to a share in their earnings. All of them are controlled by trustees of the Wells estate. No dividends have been declared during the last few years and Mr. Norris complained that dividends ought to be declared, and he be given his share of them.

The trustees objected on the ground that the court has no jurisdiction over the corporations, or over the trustees in their capacities of directors of the corporations. The matter was argued before Judge Ludwig for several days a few months ago.

The matter came up before Judge Ludwig on objections by Mr. Norris to the approval by the court of the last annual account of the executors in his decision Judge Ludwig says:

"It seems to me clear that when the trustees' report is attacked, it devolved upon them to explain the entire situation and the reason for want of income where income is usually expected. The burden to explain is on them."

The undivided profits of the corporations amount to hundreds of thousands of dollars, according to the complainant.

Judge Ludwig's decision reversed a decision by former Probate Judge Paul D. Carpenter, who decided that a court had no right to conduct the desired inquiry. No appeal can be taken to the supreme court from Judge Ludwig's decision according to Attorney Glenway Maxon of counsel for Mr. Norris. The inquiry into the matter of the undivided dividends will probably be taken up before Judge Ludwig next week.

Old Officers Re-elected

At the annual meeting of the directors of the Escanaba National Bank, held Saturday afternoon, officers of the institution were elected for the ensuing year as follows: President, John K. Stack; vice-president, J. C. Kirkpatrick; cashier, M. N. Smith; assistant cashier, E. J. Noreus. These are the same officers who acceptably served the bank last year and their re-election demonstrates the confidence that is reposed in them by the stockholders and directors.

OLMSTED IS PRESIDENT

Stockholders and directors of the Escanaba baseball club met Tuesday and elected a new set of directors and officers for the coming year.

The commission form of government has worked the miracle of making dead cities wake. Lazarus like, a score of municipalities have thrown aside the shroud as soon as business principles have been injected. These cities did not always admit they were dead; not one but realizes today it is alive, very much alive.

Typical of the cities which within the past two years have defied the sting of death and the victory of the grave is Des Moines, the capital city and center of Iowa. Between 1895 and 1900 the population of Des Moines increased only ten per cent, which may be put down as the natural, unstimulated growth of an ordinary city. Between 1905 and 1909 the population of Des Moines increased 37 1/2 per cent, at which ratio the five years ending in 1910 will show a gain of 47 per cent. On April 1, 1908, the city government lacked \$119,200 of enough money to pay the obligations for the year. On April 1, 1909, the trumpet call of a municipal Gabriel having sounded in the meantime there was a balance in the city treasury of \$104,855.—From "Bringing Dead Cities to Life," in the Technical World Magazine for February.

MERCHANTS OBJECT

To the Opening of New Road by I. S. Co. to the Bay

As the result of two petitions filed with the council Tuesday members of the street committee will report at the next meeting plans for extending Fannie street, which has just been discovered running east and west between Ludington and Thomas street, from the east side of Tilden avenue to the bay shore.

One of the petitions filed with the council was signed by fifty Ludington street business men protesting against a new opening to the bay being arranged at the south end of the bridge at the foot of Tilden avenue. Another petition was signed by 45 property owners of Bay de Noc township who filed the same objection.

The two petitions were referred to the street committee with instructions to confer with the owners of the property through which the street would be opened and to present a complete report at the next council session. Mayor Greenhoot urged immediate action on the matter pointing out that property in that part of the city is rapidly increasing in value and that if it is to be purchased negotiations for the deal should be opened at once.

By action that was taken by the council Tuesday night the attorney for Bertha Hunt, who was granted a judgment against the city for being injured by falling on a defective sidewalk was empowered to collect that part of the judgment that has so far been received by the city treasurer.

Permission was given by the council last night to Frank E. Durrell to move his saloon business from 1905 Ludington street to 1622 Ludington street. Bills for the city's new snow plow that was received last week and for the new fire truck received for use by company No. 2 were presented to the council and both ordered paid. The former for \$150 and the latter for \$180.
