"In no instance is Mr. Henderson sustained by the law in his charge enlighten the state may be the best but his effort reveals a surprising lack of acquaintance with the facts and the law pertaining to the sub-

"He charges that Sec. 1 is invalid because 'it discriminate' against the foreign wholesaler in favor of the Michigan wholesaler.' It does not so discriminate. The law requires the foreigner to pay 'the same license fee as is provided in this section for resident person.'

"He further charges Sec. 1 is invalid because 'it interferes with interstate commerce which is only under the jurisdiction of the federal congress.' He has not kept up with his statutes and cases of the past few years. The case cited, even if in point, has been nullified in effect by a federal statute. This provides. in brief, that all intoxicating liquor" taken into a state shall, upon arrival, be subject to the same extent as though produced there.

"The provision as to native wines and cider, so copiously attacked by him, has been in the law without change for 20 years or more, and un disturbed by the courts.

NEWS AND NOTES In and Around Delta County

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Substitutes for Baked Loaves That Are Common in Various Parts of Europe.

Baked loaves of bread are practically unknown in many parts of south Austria and Italy as well as the agricultural districts of Roumania, says the Baker's Weekly. In the villages of the Oberstelermark, not very many miles from Vienna, bread is seldom seen, the staple food of the people being sterz, a kind of porridge made n ground beech nuts, which is taken at breakfast with fresh or curdled milk, at dinner with broth or fried in lard, and with milk again at supper. The sterz is also known as helden, and takes the place of bread not only in Stelermark but in Carynthia and in many parts of the Tyrol.

In the north of Italy the peasantry live chiefly on polenta, a porridge made of boiled maize. The polenta, however, is not allowed to granulate like, Scotch porridge, or like the Austrian sterz, but is boiled into a solid pudding, which is cut up and portioned out with a string. It is eaten cold as often as it is hot, and is in every sense the Italian peasant's daily bread. The modern Roumanians are held by many scholars to be descended from a Roman colony, in other words to be the cousins of the Italians, and curiously enough a variation of the polenta called mamaliga is the national dish of Rumania.

The mamaliga is like the polenta in that it is made of boiled maize, but It is unlike the latter in one important respect, as the grains are not allowed to settle into a solid mass but are kept distinct, after the fashion of oatmeal porridge.

The balloon America, in which Wellman and his party set out upon their per lious flight, met with a mishap after it had proceeded twenty-two miles from the starting point.

ship shot upwards at a terrific pace until it was above the clouds. The pilots succeeded, however, in bringing her about, and set out to fight their way southward against a strong wind.

The airship proceeded slowly southward to the edge of the ice pack, where the steamer Fram was anchored. After much difficulty, a tow rope was gotten aboard the Fram, which started immediately to tow the airship to Spitzbergen. The strain was so great, however, that it threatened to tear the car to pieces. and Mr. Wellman finally decided to bring the airship down.

This was effected without mishap and the car rested on the surfac of the water until all the crew, the dogs and the scientific instruments could be transferred aboard the

A fresh start was then made and the America was towed back to a landing stage within a short dis tance of where the start was made. Big Gas Bag Explodes.

But the ill luck of the expedition was not yet at an end. Just as the airship had reached the landing stage and everything looked favor able for its rescue without serious damage, a sudden gust of wind caught the bag broadside on and snatched it away from its tow lines. It was carried careening over the rough ice hummocks for some distance and then exploded.

All the scattered parts of the air ship were subsequently recovered but the damage was so great as to reclude any further attempt to fly or the pole this year.

He overlooks People vs. Rohrer, 111 Mich, 31 which further construes this section and also overlooks the fact that the old law has not been changed on these points in the Warner-Cramton law, except to cut out the unconsti tutional provision as to double pun

"He again cites 68 Mich. 557 as authority for his opinion that the revocation of violation of the liquor laws is invalid.

"This charge, if true, would be the most serious of all. Happily, it is not true. In the case he cites, the dealer paid an annual tax, and it was held that to take away the bus iness on which the tax had been paid would be unconstitutional. The most important feature of the amamended Indquor law, in my judgment, is in this connection. The money now paid by the dealer is paid as a fee for a license, and the authorities uniformly hold that a license can be revoked for cause Furthermore, when a licnse is applied for, the application must contain an agreement that in the event of the issuance of a license to such license shall be revokable as provid ed in this act. This is a reasonable agreement to obey the laws, and revocation according to the agreement would certainly be valid.

AS TO BONDS. "The authority given the county treasurer to detrmine the necessity for a new bond in certain specified cases is declared invalid,.
