# NAVAL CANNON EXPLODES

# ONE DEAD ONE HURT EXTRA! 2 P. M.

ONE MAN WAS INSTANTLY KILLED AND ONE IS SERIOUSLY INJURED BY THE PREMATURE FIRING OF A CANNON BY MEMBERS OF THE ESCANABA DIVISION OF STATE NAVAL RESERVES SHORTLY AFTER NOON TODAY.

## THE DEAD:

PAUL PAULSON, 18 YEARS OF AGE, RESIDES ON MAPLE ST.

## THE INJURED:

FRED WINCHESTER OF WELLS FACE BURNED, RIGHT ARM INJURED AND CLOTHING TORN FROM RIGHT SIDE OF BODY.

The accident occurred immediately after the close of the formal speaking program of the day at the old Tilden house grounds.

The cannon belonging to the reserves was dragged to the bay slope immediately south of the speakers stand and arrangements were being made to fire a salute.

The gun was placed in position and bags of powder were being rammed into the muzzle.

A great crowd of curious people gathered about and the Reserves were unable to push the people back.

While the powder was being rammed home it is believed that one of the spectators or one of the Reserves dropped sparks from a cigarette or a smouldering match into the loose powder.

At the instant the crowd pushed forward, Paulsen, who was officiating as gunner standing in front of the gun was pushed directly in front of the muzzle as the charge was fired.

The entire charge of wadding, and powder entered the unfortunate young man's lower jaw and neck shattering the bones and killing him instantly.

Winchester was standing at his side attempting to push back the crowd and because of his position was less seriously injured.

Paulsen has been a member of the Reserves for several months and was a general favorite with members of the organization.

## CORPORATION TAX LEVYING IS BEGUN

COLLECTORS ARE COMPILING LISTS OF COMPANIES FOR ACTION UNDER NEW LAWS.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 26.—Internal revenue collectors are already compiling a list of corporations in their districts as the tax is to be collected for the present calendar year. The corporations will be listed under five heads—financial, commercial, public service, industrial, mercantile and miscellaneous.

## PECULIAR FORMS OF BREAD.

Substitutes for Baked Loaves That Are Common in Various Parts of Europe.

Baked loaves of bread are practically unknown in many parts of south Austria and Italy as well as the agricultural districts of Roumania, says the Baker's Weekly. In the villages of the Obersteiermark, not very many miles from Vienna, bread is seldom seen, the staple food of the people being sturz, a kind of porridge made from ground beech nuts, which is taken at breakfast with fresh or curdled milk, at dinner with broth or fried in hard, and with milk again at supper. The sturz is also known as heiden, and takes the place of bread, not only in Steiermark but in Carinthia and in many parts of the Tyrol. In the north of Italy the peasantry live chiefly on polenta, a porridge made of boiled maize. The polenta, however, is not allowed to granulate like Scotch porridge, or like the Austrian sturz, but is boiled into a solid pudding, which is cut up and portioned out with a string. It is eaten cold as often as it is hot, and is in every sense the Italian peasant's daily bread. The modern Roumanians are held by many scholars to be descended from a Roman colony, in other words to be the cousins of the Italians, and curiously enough a variation of the polenta called mamaliga is the national dish of Roumania. The mamaliga is like the polenta in that it is made of boiled maize, but it is unlike the latter in one important respect, as the grains are not allowed to settle into a solid mass but are kept distinct, after the fashion of oatmeal porridge.

## SWEDISH STRIKERS STERNLY PUNISHED

ONLY FEW STREET CAR EMPLOYEES GET BACK, AND AT MINIMUM WAGES.

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 26.—The local street railroad company has scored a complete victory over the strikers. The men have applied for their old positions, but only a few of them have been taken back. Those who formerly received the maximum wage have been re-employed at the minimum rate. On the other hand, the strike breakers have been rewarded. The company has sued the strikers for damages.

## LIKED WIT OF ARTEMUS WARD

Londoners for a Wonder Appreciated Work of Great American Humorist.

On the occasion of Artemus Ward's professional visit to London, which occurred not long before his death, J. E. Preston Muddock says in his book, "Pages from an Adventurous Life," that the American humorist's advertisements of his "shows" were as full of funny surprises as the lectures themselves. One that tickled the general public was this:

Artemus Ward Delivered Lectures Before All the Crowned Heads of Europe Ever Thought of Delivering Lectures. And an excerpt from his lecture on "Drawing" is quoted by Mr. Muddock as a particularly delightful bit. "I haven't distinguished myself as an artist," Ward said, in his inimitable way, "but have always been mixed up in art. I have an uncle who takes photographs in his spare moments, and I have a servant who takes everything he can lay his hands on at any moment."

"At a very tender age I could draw on wood. When a mere child I once drew a small cart-load of raw turpentine over a wooden bridge. It was a raw morning. The people of the village recognized me. They said it was a 'drawing' drawing. That shows how faithfully I had copied nature. I drew their attention to it, so you see there was a lot of drawing in it. "The villagers, with wonderful discernment peculiar to villagers, said I had a future before me. As I was walking backward when I made my drawing I replied that I thought that my future must be behind me."

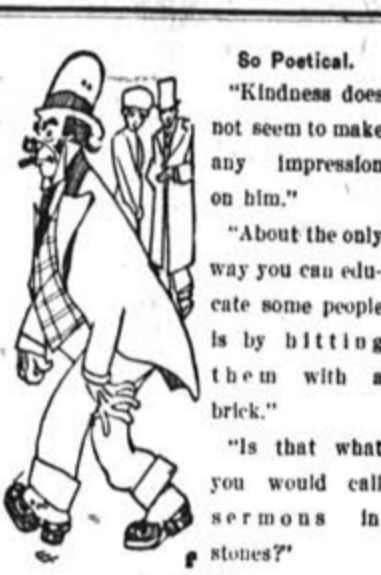

In choosing the mattress to begin with, it is well to know that most hair mattresses for full sized beds weigh forty pounds. When the hair is short or they are sometimes made to weigh forty-five pounds.

The prepared cotton felt mattresses are both sanitary and comfortable. They cost about \$15. They are infinitely better than the poor quality hair mattresses.

Cheaper than these and not comparing with them in value are those made of ordinary cotton felt, costing about \$7.50, still better than a poor hair; cotton and wool at \$5, African fiber with cotton top at \$4.50 and, least desirable of all, the excelsior with cotton top and bottom at \$2.50.

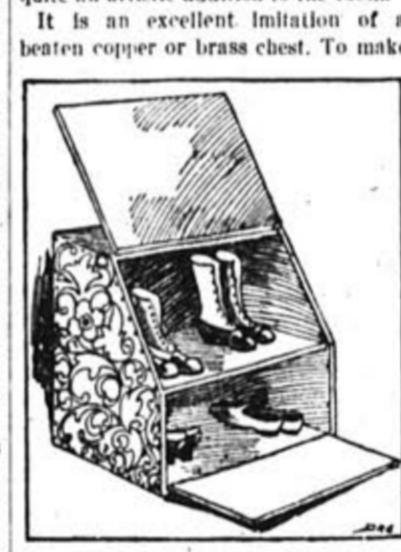
Rich people claim it as their own, but nobody knows how to frivol better than the hardworking wage earner once the opportunity offers itself.

One hundred and fifty square miles of green life in compact order round about Damascus, spread out with all the profusion of a virgin forest.

These are other things about bees quite as wonderful as their rule of life. Their eyes reflect in a hundred facets many things which perhaps we cannot see, and those triple eyes set in the center of the forehead may, it will be a powerful vision more wonderful still.

WINDMILL MADE INTO CHURCH

Novel House of God That Serves for Small Congregation in England.

Twelve years ago, when the villagers living off the border of Reigate heath, Surrey, England, had no place of worship nearer than the parish church, a service was held in a school room close by and was so well attended that the authorities looked around for a suitable permanent building.

The erection of a church was out of the question, but there stood on the heath the remains of an old mill, a picturesque feature, is a beautiful bit of landscape. Inspection showed that once the rats were got rid of a comparatively small outlay would furnish and render the mill fit for public worship, and soon it was opened as the Chapel of the Holy Cross.

The interior of the chapel arouses interest. Four buttresses, four feet thick by six feet in height, serve as rests for two massive beams which cross each other in the center and support an upright shaft cranked with age and strongly bound with iron bands. The buttresses make four natural alcoves. The entrance door stands in one, and immediately opposite is the altar; the harmonium is placed in a third, and the bellringer sits close beside it and rings his bell; the fourth is occupied by the congregation. The rent of this novel church is only 25 cents a year.

IRON TRADE REVIEW

(Special to Morning Press.)

CLEVELAND, Aug. 26.—The Iron Trade Review says:

In spite of the tremendous production of furnaces and mills of the United States Steel Corporation and independent interests, all companies are now having great difficulty in making deliveries satisfactory to consumers.

It is certain that the steel corporation record by between 50,000 and 100,000 tons, will set a new record for ore shipments, and will show total shipments of finished materials to well over 900,000 tons, a figure near normal.

All subsidiaries show a marked increase in output, particularly in pig iron and billets. The billet mill at Gary has been started running on forging bills, and the Gary rail mill will turn out 40,000 tons this month.

In the pig iron market interest centers in many inquiries and some sales made for the first half of next year. Include large blocks of basic in eastern territory for first quarter and half at \$18 delivered, but furnaces are cautious about committing themselves after the first of January.

In the south, only two or three furnaces are willing to give quotations for delivery next year. In the Pittsburgh district Bessemer has advanced to \$16.50 Valley.

The reduction of the tariff on pig iron will result in sharp curtailment of sales of American iron on the Pacific coast, where even before the passage of the new tariff bill foreign countries enjoyed a large part of the business.
