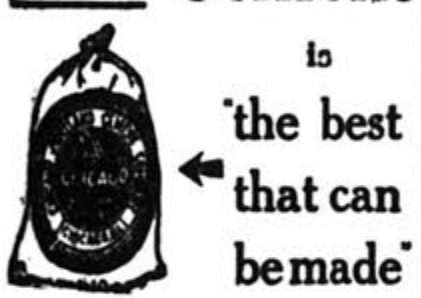
WOLGAST AND RIVERS

## GOHPER PAPER DENOUNCES "8" FOR ITS ACTION

Minneapolis, Minn., April 10.—Bitter denunciation of the Big Eight conference for its action Saturday in rejecting the scholarship athletic standard is expressed in today's issue of the Minnesota Daily, the official student publication. The Daily presents to the students a ballot in which it asks for a vote on the question of withdrawing from the conference. It says in part:

"After months of dickerings, subterfuge, measures of circumvention and eleventh hour vetoes the conference question is the same status as it was last fall. The time has come for the students and faculty of the University of Minnesota to take a stand one way or another.

"We believe the conference has ceased to serve its purpose and justify its existence, so far as Minnesota is concerned. We believe that Minnesota should sever its connections with its present entangling alliances."

## MICHIGAN DEMOS MAY NOT INSTRUCT

Howell, Mich., April 10.—Edmund C. Shields, chairman of the Democratic state committee, makes the following statement, explaining his views regarding instructing the Michigan delegation to the national convention:

"As the time draws closer to the national Democratic convention is becoming more evident that the Democratic party is rich in presidential candidates, and that nearly every part of the country will present to the convention some favored son for consideration. Already Gov. Wilson, Gov. Harmon, Speaker Clark, Rep. Underwood and Gov. Marshall each has a following of delegates chosen. In addition to this, it is fairly certain that Mayor Gaynor, Gov. Foss, Gov. Burke and others will be placed before the convention.

"As to some of these candidates, their qualifications and claims for others, the Democrats of the nation, as a whole, have not been informed of their merits. In nearly every case, the elements which might prove weaknesses have not been made generally known, or received very careful consideration. As the sole desire of every loyal Democrat is that the best and strongest man be chosen, it is but fair and reasonable that the claims for every man be given a full hearing, and the longer and more careful the consideration, the more apt is the conclusion to be correct.

"The Democrats of the state of Michigan have not, for years, furnished any Democratic electoral votes, and it would seem to be illogical for Michigan, therefore, to take an arbitrary position in demanding of the Democrats of the nation any particular candidate out of a group, each of which is so well qualified, until the Michigan delegation has had an opportunity to get all possible information as to every candidate."

He is willing to have the winner take all of the purse that is offered. As yet no club or organization has offered to put on the fight card, but arrangements may be made soon.

## BOYS ARE MISSING; ARE THEY DROWNED?

Crystal Falls, Mich., Apr. 10.—Two boys, Theodore and Charles Kytomaki, sons of John Kytomaki, who lives near the bath house west of the road to the Great Western location, disappeared last Monday and it is thought that they were drowned by breaking through the ice of the Paint river.

An incessant search has been kept up for the boys since the morning after they disappeared and all traces of them seem to lead to the conclusion that they are under the ice in the river.

About the only clear statement from anyone is that made by Roy Letch who says that, when he was going home Monday afternoon, he saw two boys playing on the ice near the middle of the stream. His description of the two fellows fits in with that of the missing boys. He says that they wore caps, which is the clearest identifying mark reported.

Several other tales are told of two boys being seen on the railroad walking to the south and also of their having jumped a train leaving the North Western station, but these stories are not anywhere near clear as to identity.

The ages of the boys were said to be 10 years. They are said to be inclined to roam at will and when they didn't show up at home Monday night it was thought that they had gone to the Tobin location with some boy friends but that theory has been proved false.

Search was continued uninterruptedly all through the week and yesterday Sheriff Holmes gave orders to draw the water off, which was done.

## MAY RUN LAUNDRY; WASH MONEY CHEAP

Washington, Apr. 10.—The problem of washing and ironing dirty paper money appears to be solved by some new machines which have been perfected in the government's bureau of engraving and printing. One of these machines will take a dirty, germ-laden piece of currency and turn it out slick clean and crisp in two minutes and the other will do the same job in three.

## LATEST NEWS IN THE WORLD OF FINANCE AND TRADE

### BOSTON MARKETS

We believe Granby still the cheapest stock on the list, producing now at the rate of 20,000,000 lbs of copper annually and making a net profit of between \$90,000 and \$100,000 per month on the present price of copper, this from the old property. We understand the hidden creek property which they purchased some time ago will be in condition for production within the next 18 months and that it will be capable of producing around 30,000,000 lbs of copper below 8 cents per pound. The combined output of the two properties would then be about 50,000,000 lbs at a cost of about 8.1-2 cents, there are only 150,000 shares outstanding.

### NEW YORK MARKETS

The local market was very erratic today the price changes being quick and decisive with the volume of transaction large. The sensational rise in Granby was the feature, this stock scored quick advance to 56 3-4, later reacting to 31 1-2, and closing at 53 bid, we still consider Granby one of the cheapest stocks on the list on account of its prospective earning power, Old Colony and Mayflower were much more quiet today showing a slight sagging tendency. The amount of liquidation was small and the reaction being caused chiefly by stop orders, Lake was weak around noon time, but rallied well to 49 and closed 47 bid, a dispatch from Butte stated that North Butte had struck the Edith May vein on the 2600 foot level and this was responsible for the good buying in this stock, but considerable stock was offered and price showed little change. We think the liquidation today has placed stocks in stronger hands and that we shall see a continuation of the upward movement in coppers within a day or two.

### BODY OF BAY CITY MAN MISSING SINCE NOV. 25 IS FOUND IN THE RIVER

Bay City, Mich., Apr. 10.—The body of Linus Keith, a retired railroad engineer who disappeared from his home here on Nov. 25, last year, and who was believed to have been murdered because he had on his person at the time more than \$2,000 worth of diamonds and a considerable sum of money, was found floating in the Saginaw river here today. The diamonds and money were all found on the body. The neck was broken. An investigation is under way to determine the manner in which he met death.

## KEPT AN UMBRELLA TWENTY-TWO YEARS

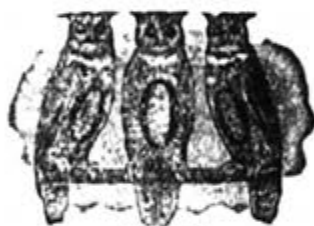

by two, in other words from three to one.

Therefore, on May 1, 1911, your village board could grant only one license. As a matter of fact it granted four, and I must hold that at least three of the four who were granted licenses were not entitled to them, and were and are illegally in business.

Under this decision, therefore, at the present time your board can grant only one license for the coming year. This license your board can grant to any one of the new or old men in the business.

Mr. Roseway, who gave up his license in Garden township, and did not apply for a renewal, cut down the number in the township by doing so and lost any rights which he might have had there, and could not acquire any special right in the village by his transfer from the township to the village.

I trust that this covers the situation in your village; the number is cut down by the operation of the law according to the decision of the supreme court and must be abided by in the future action by your board. If you grant more than one license your board could be made to set the illegal license aside, and the man getting it would be subject to prosecution. T. E. STROM.
