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Taft did as well as the regular ticket did in Vermont that a list of states including some of the largest in the union were his.

In making this statement Hillis was either making a blundering and sorrowful attempt at joking or else he was proving the contention of the Rooseveltians that he is a ninny.

The Vermont election was about as stunning a blow to Mr. Taft's second term aspirations as could have been administered. In that state his ticket only received 57 per cent of the Republican vote of 1908. The Progressive party won two votes to every three given the regular Republican ticket.

If optimistic Mr. Hillis will take his pencil and a piece of paper he will discover that if the vote of New York, for instance divided on the same basis as that of Vermont that instead of receiving 870,070 votes as he did in 1908, President Taft this year will get about 486,000 while Roosevelt's vote will be in the neighborhood of 335,000.

In the home state of Taft and Hillis, Ohio, the result based on the result in Vermont, would be approximately Wilson, 538,000 Taft 319,000, Roosevelt 214,000. Pennsylvania would vote, Mr. Hillis would find, Wilson 570,000, Taft 415,000, and Roosevelt 285,000.

There is every reason to believe that in these three great pivotal states Roosevelt will receive a much larger proportion of the vote than his candidate for governor received in Vermont.

ASSANINE OPTIMISM.
For 32-carat optimism one Charles D. Hillis takes the cake, ice cream and all the other dainties on the table. Charles D. is chief cook of the Taft or regular Republican organization, and was selected because he was supposed to be some politician.

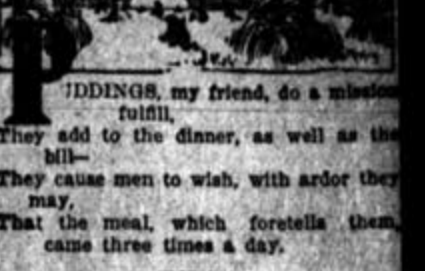

GOOD EATINGS. Mock Terrapin—Here is a good supper dish. Half a calf's liver, season and fry; chop not too fine, dust thickly with flour and a teaspoonful of mixed mustard...

French Soup—Take a pint of milk, put it on to boil. Beat an egg, add a tablespoonful of sugar and stir with a powdered cracker into the hot milk. It needs very little cooking. Serve hot or cold.

Dutch Pudding—Mix half a cup of cream of wheat or farina with four tablespoonsful of cocoa, half a teaspoonful of salt in a bowl; put over hot water and pour over three cups of boiling milk. Cook until smooth (about twenty minutes), add a tablespoonful of butter. Beat the egg and add folded lightly in.

Bird's Nest Pudding—Now that good cooking apples are in the market, this is an acceptable dessert: Pare and core sufficient apples to cover the bottom of a pie plate. Make a biscuit dough, soft enough to spread over the apples, and bake in a hot oven. Turn onto a plate, apples on top, spread generously with butter, sprinkle with sugar and nutmeg and serve with or without cream.

Ham Canapes—Cut bread into slices a fourth of an inch thick; then cut with a small biscuit cutter into rounds; fry to a delicate brown in hot fat. Pound a cup of boiled ham to a paste, add two tablespoonsful of Parmesan cheese, season with salt and paprika. Spread this mixture over the toasted circles and brown in the oven. A delicious dish may be prepared by serving a little chopped boiled ham in white sauce, poured over hot toast.

 united and untiring support to Hon. John Power for congressman in this district.

After paying this slight tribute to the local and district candidates Mr. Ferris proceeded to a discussion of national and state issues. He eulogized Theodore Roosevelt frequently throughout his address for many acts that today stand out, he asserted, condemning the candidacy of one who has proven himself, unworthy of trust and a veritable ingrate. Mr. Ferris paid a handsome tribute in the course of his address to William Jennings Bryan whom he compared with Theodore Roosevelt with excellent results for Mr. Bryan.

He told of the \$50,000 contribution received by Roosevelt from the Standard Oil Company and asserted that the plea now being made by Roosevelt that he is a friend only of the people and not of the big interests is proven to be only a temporary pose by the personal benefits that have been received by him and his cause from the Standard Oil Company and the Steel Trust.

Mr. Ferris dealt in his address with the economic principles of life and asserted that if elected as governor he would endeavor to render to the common people an administration based first on justice and then on sterling business principles.

Mr. Ferris advocated a school term extending throughout the year and asserted that there was no such thing as over education. He complimented Escanaba on its beautiful high school and common school buildings. He urged the people to throw open those buildings for night schools that all who are hungry for education may have an opportunity to grasp the desire. In closing Mr. Ferris asserted that the people would be forced to admit that the last congress, which was in control of the Democrats was the best in a score of years, producing more laws for the benefit of the nation at large than any congress in years.
