Toiling 23 Years, Mysterious Unknown Children of Thief Give Back \$900 to Fulfill a Pledge

Minneapolis, July 10.—A story of years of struggling and privation by the children of an unidentified man to free the family conscience, and the solution of the disappearance of a packet of money has been solved here after 23 years. Mrs. F. A. Colliton, 124 East Lake street, received through the police \$960 in bills, the amount that had disappeared from her handbag on January 17, 1891.

The clearing of the one mystery leaves another for Mrs. Colliton, for the name of those who struggled to return the money were kept from her and though she wanted to return part or all of the money to the family, she was told not to try to learn more of the case.

Methods used in getting the case before the police and in getting the money back to the owner only served to hide more securely the identity of the family that has been conscience stricken since the money was taken.

The family was represented by an agent who kept his own identity secret. Mrs. Colliton and the agent arranged the exchange of money through an attorney. The police department, like an exchange, merely brought the two parties together.

Just one message reached Mrs. Colliton from those who returned the money, and that was: "We are happier today than we have been in 23 years."

Evidence of the struggle to raise the fund and comply with the father's dying wish was made clear by the money.

The little girl is one of the children who struggled to clear the family name. The loss was advertised, but now clear to the identity of the persons who found the money was ever obtained.

This much Mr. Dunn learned, but to find the owner of the money was a different matter. At the time of the loss Mrs. Colliton lived in Bloomington. Her name before her marriage was Lorann Scott. By many interviews with Bloomington pioneers Mr. Dunn learned that Mrs. Colliton was the one who had lost the money.

The mysterious agent told the police the other details, but refused to divulge the name of the family.

For years the man was despondent because of his inability to return the money, which he had spent.

On his deathbed the father begged his children to return the money.

That Francisco Schiatio, who sawed his way from the Iron Mountain jail a week ago for whom local officers are searching, was furnished the saw with which the prisoner escaped, by a girl whom he had wronged, has been learned at Iron Mountain.

Francisco Schiatio, recently acquitted on a white slavery charge in the federal court here and afterward re-arrested by Sheriff Dyckes of Iron Mountain, Mich., on a charge of inducing Mary De Fiore, 14 years old, to go with him to Milwaukee, sawed his way to liberty from the county jail at Iron Mountain, according to dispatches.

According to the police the man got the saw from the girl on her visits to him at the jail. She was arrested and, according to the police, admitted her guilt.

Schiatio, who was a bartender in Iron Mountain was alleged by the federal officials to have taken the girl to Milwaukee for immoral purposes. The man took the girl to the Italian colony of the city and kept her there. It was alleged, for several days. On the advice of friends he then went with the girl to Waukegan, Ill., where they were married. On his return to Milwaukee he was arrested, and, falling to give bail, was held in the county jail for several months. The girl was held as a witness.

PRIVATE BANKS GIVEN GRILLING

The legalizing of private banks, such banks were severely grilled by Mr. Doyle in an address before the National Bankers' Association at Atlantic City and it is possible that legislation will follow at the next session of the Michigan legislature to prohibit private banks in Michigan.

There will be a large measure of agreement with the assertion of State Banking Commissioner Doyle that the private banks should be put out of business than with his other proposal that bankers should be prohibited from engaging in any other business.

Public sentiment and legislative sentiment, too, is gradually getting around to agreement with Mr. Doyle's estimate of the private banks as public menace. Michigan is not the only state where the question has been made a live one by too frequent failures of private banks later shown to have been insolvent for years.

Thus there is reason to believe that the day is not far distant when the last of the private banks will be closed and they will be but a memory.

Private banks have been allowed to linger on at great cost to the people wholly without supervision, too many of them run along in an insolvent condition, and it is only a question of time before their depositors are hit.

Richards, a chemist, was at work on an experiment which involved the use of explosives. The ingredient blew up in a crucible. Richards was holding a carboy of nitric acid. He stumbled and fell, smashing the glass container and splashing the fiery liquid on his face and body.

For months he was not expected to live. When he finally emerged from the hospital he went home wearing a mask. After some weeks he got work as a gardener, but his appearance excited so much comment he was discharged.
