HEAT PLANT IS INSTALLED

The advance gang of workmen and a foreman of the Lake Superior Steam Heating company have arrived in the city and will at once start work installing the heating plant at the new "Delft" opera house being erected by the Semer Land company at 905 Ludington street.

The plant that will be installed here is the same that is being placed in the most modern opera houses of the country and when completed the heating system of the new house should be at a point of perfection. Three men and a foreman arrived yesterday and today more will come to Escanaba that the work may be rushed to a rapid conclusion. A portion of the equipment was delivered at the opera house site yesterday and more will come each day this week. The work of the electricians will also start within a few days.

The Foster Construction company may well be proud of the rapid progress that they have made thus far on the local structure. The work of placing the corrugated iron and asbestos about the frame of the files of the house was almost completed last night, when completed to make the flies absolutely fireproof. The side-wall and the roof of the structure over the auditorium and foyer have been entirely completed. Expert masons are now working on the intricate and beautiful front.

From the idea that can now be obtained of the new "Delft," the house will be the most beautiful in the entire northwest, thus filling a long felt want in that line for Escanaba.

chancelleries today the inclination is to interpret Austria's uncompromising attitude as an indication that she is bent upon an appeal to arms and will take her first active military measures against Serbia within 24 hours. At the termination that time her mobilization will be complete. I am in position to state tonight that immediate conflict cannot be avoided and that after the first gun has been fired, Russia will send an ultimatum to Austria tantamount to a declaration of war. Whether the efforts of pacific England are to be crowned with success or not there is not a diplomat in Europe who is not convinced that a peaceful settlement now would mean only a postponement of inevitable war between the Teutonics and Slavs. These races are bound sooner or later to come into a mighty clash that will involve the whole of Europe.

London, July 27.—It is reported that foreign Minister Grey has made successful representations to Germany, Italy and France, for a conference of representatives of those countries in England with a view to co-operative in securing the mediation of the Austro-Servian crisis. The Italian and German ambassadors saw Lord Grey this morning. Lord Grey invited Austria-Hungary, Serbia and Russia to operations pending the result of the proposed conference to be held in London, with the German, French, Italian Ambassadors.

Vienna, July 27.—Austria last night was officially at war with Serbia, although there has been no formal declaration of war and will be none.

Austrian officials explained that a formal declaration is unnecessary for the reason that Serbia never subscribed to The Hague convention.

The virtual declaration of war, however, was made this afternoon when the Austrian foreign office, sent his passports to M. Jovanovitch, the Serbian minister, who, it is reported, has left Vienna. M. Jovanovitch, upon receipt of his passports, made preparations for a speedy departure.

It was announced here tonight that the Servians, when they evacuated Belgrade to set up the seat of government of Kragujevatz, in the interior, blew up the bridge across the Danube which connected Semlin and Belgrade.

A significant note in the general situation is the publication in the Vienna Neue Freie Presse of a statement that Serbia's aggressive change of front occurred only after the arrival of official telegrams from Russia. The article declares that until these telegrams were received, Serbia was inclined to comply with the Austrian demands.

This intimation regarding Russia's interference is generally accepted as true by the crowds in the streets, which all day long, despite a driving and disagreeable rain, have been engaged in continuous patriotic demonstrations. Processions bearing flags and headed by bands have occupied the streets since day break. All day an enormous crowd has been assembled in front of the war office, and the numerous army officers who have been passing back and forth have been cheered at every appearance on the street.

New York, July 27.—The stock market opened this morning with great excitement as a result of the Servian and Irish home rule situations. Two hundred thousand shares changed hands during the first hour. The declines were not so heavy as abroad.
