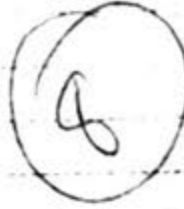

## CHILD IS INJURED IN "HOOKING A RIDE"

As a result of "hooking" a ride on the rear of a moving wagon, Harold Johnson, eight year old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Johnson, narrowly escaped instant death early last evening, when his head was crushed between the wheel of a dray and a shed.

The lad, playing in the rear of his home at 1109 Sincalre street grabbed onto a dray driven by Victor Groth and as the team was backed by the driver preparatory to the unloading of some hay, the lad fell between the wheels and the shed. With the cries of the child the team was stopped immediately and the child carried to his home. Dr. Groos was summoned and after carefully dressing the wound declared that the child had a decidedly narrow escape from death but that he would recover. An ugly gash marks the child's forehead.

## EXPECTS THREAD WILL GO HIGHER

Milwaukee, Wis., Sept. 9.—The European war has affected the flax market, and the price of linen thread has advanced 10 cents on the pound, with another increase looked for by October 1, according to Arnold Crabbe, of H. E. Locke & Co., thread manufacturers' agent, in the Manufacturers' Home building.

Mr. Crabbe, together with Albert Hall, manager of the Milwaukee office has just returned from Boston, where a convention of managers of Locke branches was held. The flax shortage was discussed.

Most of the flax for thread making purposes is grown in Austria, says Mr. Crabbe, and it is now impossible to get the product to mills in the east. The Locke company has a supply of raw flax on hand which it thinks will be sufficient to last until peace is declared.

The supply of burlap has also been cut off, according to Mr. Crabbe, and box toes for shoes are becoming scarce. Because of expensive labor at home it is impossible to produce burlap in the United States.
