That Escanaba is at least persistent in her effort to maintain a fast article of baseball each season, is the conclusion drawn by the Mining Journal of Marquette, from the effort now being exerted here to secure a berth in the Wisconsin Illinois league. The Mining Journal says editorially:

When it comes to baseball Escanaba is nothing if not persistent. While it has come out of its recent baseball ventures somewhat better than the towns that have been associated with it in them; it is not of record that any great fortunes have been made in the game in the Sandy City, but annually it returns to the charge. Now it is considering the plan of hooking up with a number of Wisconsin cities in a Wisconsin-Michigan league, in which it would be committed to baseball on a more ambitious, and perhaps more expensive, scale than any it has yet essayed. And the outlook for the year 1915 is not one that invites to expansion, either. Escanaba can offer much evidence in support of its contention that it is a "good" town. If it gets tangled up with the Wisconsin cities in a new baseball league its former associates in baseball ventures in the U. P. will wish it no worse luck than that it may win the pennant.
