## WOMAN CONVICTED OF SLAYING GIRL

Muskegon, Mich., May 25.—After 17 minutes' deliberation the jury in the trial of Mrs. Martha Schrebe Sateole, charged with the murder of her 11-year-old stepdaughter, Evalina, returned a verdict of murder in the first degree.

The jury was dismissed at 6:30 o'clock, and, expecting a battle of hours, Mrs. Steele retired to the county jail where, upon the announcement of the verdict she collapsed. She was immediately attended by the county physician, Dr. J. T. Cooper, who left her shortly to her only comforters, Capt and Mrs. Phillip Lawton of the Salvation Army.

Following the charged given to the jury by Judge James E. Sullivan, the crowd, that exceeded all previous sessions of the court and filled the hall and waited restlessly in knots on every side of the county building, dispersed, fully convinced that the jury was in for an all-night session. The judge ordered the jury to go to supper after a half hour discussion and then to return. Scarcely seated in comfort awaiting the call to his own meal, he was called by a special messenger and hurried back to the court.

## JOHN DE-PALMA SEVERELY HURT

Indianapolis, May 25.—John De Palma, brother of Ralph DePalma, and his mechanic, Clarence Phillips, were painfully injured when their Delage car turned turtle while traveling at a speed of ninety miles an hour during practice for a time trial yesterday. The car which is the one Rene Thomas drove to victory in last year's race, was badly damaged. The accident happened on the turn coming into the homestretch. It was witnessed by the greater part of a crowd which numbered close to 15,000 persons.

It was said at the hospital that the men were severely bruised and that Phillips in particular suffered several nasty cuts. Both, it is thought, will be in condition to drive in the race on Saturday. The car was sent to the National factory for repairs. According to officials of that company, it will be ready for the race.

The accident practically put a stop to practice. None of the drivers would risk their speed and the pace set by the Stutz team in the morning remained a record for the day. Howard Wilcox in a Stutz furnished the thrills. He made a lap in 1:31, which is only forty-seven seconds slower than Bollo's record. Wilcox did the lap without difficulty, and now holds the record for American cars on the track. The mark formerly was held by the Maxwell driven by Teddy Tetzlaff last year. Tetzlaff's time was 1:33.4.

# ITALY HAS 2,065,000 MEN

According to latest reports, Italy's strength on land and sea is as follows:

**ARMY.**  
Infantry—2 regiments of grenadiers 94 of infantry of the line, 12 of bersaglieri or light infantry and 8 of Alpine chasseurs, 61 regiments of mobile militia (corresponding to the German landwehr) and about 400,000 infantry of the territorials (corresponding to the landsturm). Each regiment of the first line has its reserve unit. Total infantry about 1,320,000 men, all mobilized.  
Cavalry—29 regiments, each with its reserve unit; 31 squadrons of militia, 30,000 territorials; total, about 150,000 men.

Artillery—24 regiments of field artillery, 3 of garrison artillery 78 batteries of militia and 100 batteries of territorials; total, about 450,000 men. Signal corps, engineers, medical corps, commissary, etc., about 145,000 men.

Total forces which may be put in the field, 2,065,000 men.

**NAVY.**  
First Squadron—6 dreadnaughts, 5 mounting 13 1-2 inch guns apiece, and one mounting 12 1-2 inch guns; squadron speed 22.5 knots.

Ten first-class battleships (pre-dreadnaught), 4 mountain four 10-inch and eight 7-5 inch guns, speed 22.5 knots; 4 mounting two 12-inch and 12-8 inch guns; speed 20 knots; 2 mounting four 12-inch, four 8-inch and 12 6-inch guns, speed 20 knots.

Five old battleships of small fighting value, three light scout cruisers, about 50 efficient torpedo-boat destroyers.

For joint service with both army and navy—14 squadrons of seven aeroplanes each, and 10 dirigibles.

# ORE MARKET LOOKS GOOD

Crystal Falls, Mich., May 24.—As a result of the recent large sales of ore to the operators of eastern furnaces, mining men throughout the Lake Superior district anticipate that operations will soon be conducted on a much larger scale. A few weeks ago the outlook was not very encouraging and it was feared that many properties that were closed down last fall would remain idle through the summer but the sales of ore reported within the past 10 days indicate that the season will show a gain as compared with the season will show a gain as compared with last year.

The volume of new business has been heavy enough materially to affect the mining situation. Within the past 10 days several hundred men have been put back to work on the old ranges. The idle properties on the range began resuming work several weeks ago and in the interval nearly 1,000 men have been given employment.

The demand for Menominee range ore seems to be better than the demand for ores produced on the Marquette range as active shipping operations started in that field nearly a week earlier than on the latter range. Practically all of the active mines in the Menominee district are now shipping to Escanaba. Only a few of the Marquette range properties have started to send out ore.

The movement of ore thus far from both of the old ranges exceeds by a considerable tonnage that forwarded during a corresponding period last spring, while the shipments from the Mesaba range properties have been several times larger.

It is said that the Cleveland-Cliffs Company has over 2,000,000 tons in stock on the Marquette and Swazey ranges, so the season will have to be an exceptional one if all of this ore, together with the output of mine, is shipped before the close of navigation.

Exploratory operations will be resumed at a number of points on this range in the next few weeks. During the past few years very little drilling has been done, but the improvement in the iron situation has caused several to prepare for drilling operations. Cole & McDonald have several contracts in prospect and the firm is preparing to do some exploring on its own account on lands held under option. It has a promising tract near the Bristol mine, and it expects to find ore there.

## CONDITION FAST GROWING BETTER

Reports continue to accumulate as to the encourage conditions in the iron and steel trade.

Henry E. Bope, vice president and general manager of the Carnegie Steel company, has been quoted by an eastern paper as expressing the conviction that the country's requirements for steel are growing more rapidly than production. With the close of the war, he predicts a great boom in this

country, as a result of the demand from European countries for material to repair the property damaged or destroyed.

The uses for steel are increasing all the time. Mr. Bope said, "and more steel is required for the old uses. Take the single case of the railroads. A recent inquiry for equipment called for cars for a total capacity of seventy-seven tons, which, with the weight of the car itself, would make the total loaded weight over 100 tons. A car so heavy would destroy light rails and heavier rails must follow not only on the road buying these cars, but on other lines. If the roads were to buy all the rails they need the single item of extra weight on this basis would increase

their needs 1,000,000 tons. Of course, the increase in weight will come gradually but the tendency upward is here.

"Then there is the matter of axles and other materials which are steadily increasing in weight. Not long ago the maximum weight of an axle was 500 pounds; today it is 650 or 700 pounds, and the steel wheel must come into more general use as another result of the heavy loads which wheels are being made to bear. Finally the railroads, both steam and electric, are learning that the steel tie is more economical, handier, and gives better service than the wooden tie. A steel tie will outlast about three wooden ones for an interurban road

and about two in the case of a steam road.

"All this means more steel. And I have given only a few instances. "But an even more trustworthy sign of better times for the trade and for industry, generally is to be found in the crop reports. I should not be surprised if we had a \$12,000,000,000 crop this year. And the farmer is the backbone of the country's prosperity. Incidentally the farmer is also a great user of steel. He buys wire nails, automobiles and agricultural implements."
