WAR

Berlin, July 22.—From the beginning of the war the German trade unions have proved a strong help, rather than a hindrance, to the government in its efforts to secure the highest efficiency in output of the various necessities of warfare.

URGES HUGE SUM AS NEW WAR CREDIT

London, July 22.—A new note of credit of \$750,000,000 has been introduced in the house of commons. This is the second supplementary vote and will bring the sum actually appropriated by parliament for war expenditures to a total of \$3,250,000,000 between August 5 last and March, and the grand total to \$5,000,000,000.

The amount thus provided will tide over the period of the forthcoming parliamentary recess. The vote of credit does not involve a new loan, but merely sanctions expenditures out of the funds on hand.

Items of loans to the allies of Great Britain might also, the premier pointed out, grow with the adhesion to the allied cause of states not yet participating in the war.

London, July 22.—In this national crisis expenditures, both public and private, should be rigidly curtailed and at the same time new taxation should forthwith be imposed upon all classes of the people in order that when the war shall be brought to a triumphant conclusion the nation may enter the period of restoration with its financial power impaired to the least possible extent.

BECKER MAKES EFFORT TO SAVE HIS OWN LIFE

New York, July 21.—Another effort to have the life of Charles Becker, the former New York police lieutenant, who is sentenced to die July 28 for instigating the murder of Herman Rosenthal, the gambler, was made tonight when a fifteen thousand word statement, prepared by Becker in the Sing Sing prison deathhouse, and said to contain new facts, was placed in the hands of Governor Whitman at Albany.
