Boston, Mass., Oct. 12.—Erlie Shore, the youthful right hander, got an opportunity this afternoon to avenge himself for the beating the Phillies gave him Friday and he seized it, winning 2 to 1 in a pitching duel with George Chalmers.

The series count now is three to one in favor of the Red Sox, due to their three straight 2 to 1 victories, and, unless Alexander can haul back their advance in Philadelphia tomorrow afternoon, they will rule as kings of the baseball world before the setting of tomorrow's sun.

Failure to hit in the pinches is the real cause of the Phillies' loss today. They had at least five fine chances to score or force a run, but only once was the timely wallop produced and that was in the eighth inning when Cravath singled, following a lead-off sacrifice scoring "act" with two bases.

Tally of the game. "Rubby" won, a hero of yesterday's game, earned a few more laurel leaves today. He saved the game by a brilliant running catch and then, with a sixth with a slugger at bat, he scored Hoblitzel from first. Chalmers pitched a fine game, and had there been any pinch hitting he would have won.

In the seventh both sides were retired in short order. In the eighth Philadelphia made her lone run when Cravath tripled and scored on Ludrus' third single of the game, after Bancroft and Paskert had flied out.

In the eighth Boston again threatened to get a run, when Speaker singled, Hoblitzel and Lewis were walked, Gardner then hit the ball, but it developed into a double play by fast fielding work.

In the ninth, Philadelphia went out as fast as the men came up.

POOR COST NOT HIGH

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DELTA COUNTY SPENT FREELY

REPORT OF COUNTY CLERK IS FIRST OF ITS KIND AND IT SHOWS THE COUNTY SPENT MORE THAN RECEIVED IN PAST YEAR

According to a report that has been prepared by County Clerk A. J. Pappin for submission to the supervisors, it cost Delta county a total of \$93,206.22 to conduct its affairs during the past year, exclusive of the cost of building and repairing roads. As but \$80,000 was raised by taxation for general county purposes, this county spent \$13,206.22 more than its income in the last twelvemonth period.

FRENCH AND GERMANS LOCKED IN TERRIFIC COMBAT ON WEST FRONT, INVADERS MARCH INTO SERBIA

London, Oct. 12.—Terrific fighting has developed in the Givanchy hills, northwest of Souchez and on the slopes of the Latolle heights, close by hill 140, northwest of Neuville St. Vaast. Both the Germans and French claim success.

Berlin, Oct. 12.—The Teutonic advance over the whole front in Serbia is making good progress, it is stated in this morning's official announcement. The Serbian village of Semendria was taken yesterday, the statement says, and the entire city of Belgrade has been occupied. It is denied that any useless destruction of property took place in Belgrade.

ROADS ARE THREATENED

That heavily loaded trucks are rapidly ruining the roads of Delta county and that some steps must be taken at once by the county authorities for the preservation of the highways, was the gist of an appeal to the Delta county board of supervisors by members of the county road commission yesterday. U.S. TO TRY NEW SUBMARINE MOTOR

Washington, Oct. 12.—It was announced at the navy department that at least one of the submarines, bids for the construction of which have been opened, the Neff propulsion system will be installed. This system if it bears out the predictions made for it by its inventor, A. R. Neff of Long Beach, Cal., and navy officers who have tested it, will give to submarines a speed, when submerged equal to that they have when on the surface.

SAY ALLIES PLAY LAST BIG TRUMP

Lilla, France, Oct. 12.—In view of the tremendous preparations, the amount of ammunition used and the number of troops employed in the great attack along a front of less than 20 miles, from LaBassee to a point south of Arras, the Anglo-French gains are not considered to have been important.

The most important British gain was to the south of La Bassee canal. In an easterly and southeasterly direction, where the Germans were thrown back from two-thirds of a mile to nearly two miles along a front between a mile and a half to two miles and a half in extent.

KAISER IS WAR MAD, SAYS FRIEND

New York, Oct. 12.—That the ethical ideas of the emperor of Germany have entirely changed, and that he is the leader and exponent of "Prussianism" is its crudest sense, is the opinion expressed by Poultney Bigelow, for years an intimate personal friend of the kaiser, and author of The German Emperor and His Neighbors, The Borderland of Czar and Kaiser, and The German Struggle for Liberty.

"The German emperor's ethical ideals have changed completely," said Mr. Bigelow, "since I knew him as a lad. Then he was a normal healthy, average boy. Now he is war-mad. The use to which poison gas and the submarine have been put by the Germans is in keeping with what might be expected from a people who have come to regard themselves as the omnipotent masters of the world."

THE WAR

London, Oct. 12.—While the armies of the central empires continue to advance into Serbia, nothing has yet been made public to indicate anything in the nature of an actual military move by Bulgaria against Serbia, except a report that an assault is momentarily expected on the railroad connecting Nish and Saloniki.

Austro-German troops advancing from Belgrade have beaten back the Serbians both southeast and southwest of that city. This was announced today by the Austrian war office. "In the occupation of Belgrade nine naval guns, twenty-six field gun barrels, one searchlight, numerous rifles, quantities of munitions and other war material fell into our hands. Ten Serbian officers and more than six hundred men were made prisoners. The enemy's casualties were very great," says the Austrian statement.

Three-quarters of the city of Belgrade has been destroyed by six thousand German shells, according to an Athens dispatch to the Paris Matin. Although the main Serbian forces are declared to be waiting farther south for the crucial test, the Teutons are not gaining ground unopposed on the north. The war office at Nish says that the losses on both sides are enormous, particularly in officers, and that the Serbs are valiantly resisting the inroads of the invaders and at numerous points have been victorious over them.

Coming to the aid of their compatriots are the Serb troops from Albania which have been on duty along the Bulgarian front, while unofficial advisers are to the effect that thousands of untrained men and many women in the Serbian kingdom are preparing to contest the march of the Austro-Germans across their territory.

Roumania is showing increasing alarm on account of the threatened military movement by Bulgaria and the central powers in close proximity to her frontiers, but neither Athens nor Bucharest is exhibiting any intention to depart from a policy of benevolent neutrality toward the triple entente powers.

AMERICAN 'SUB' MOST EFFECTIVE

New York, Oct. 12.—An American designed and built submarine destroyed the German battle cruiser Moltke in the Baltic sea a few weeks ago. Other vessels of this type are operating now in the North and Baltic seas. American-built submarines have journeyed from this side of the Atlantic to the coast of Ireland, then to the Mediterranean and as far as the Dardanelles, where they have been operating against the Turks with considerable success.

Four boats made this journey of about 7,000 miles without a mishap of any kind and at the rate of about 8 miles an hour. Ten submarines, each about 160 ft in length, were built from American designs and patents for the British government. They might have been built in this country, but William J. Bryan, then secretary of state, objected, so they were built in Montreal.

Their journey to the Dardanelles is by far the longest ever made by a submarine and puts into the shade the performance of the German-built boat, about which there was so much talk which went from Kiel to the Adriatic.

When the war started Charles M. Schwab obtained a contract for 10 submarines to be built in this country by the Electric Boat company. That company owns the Holland patents and builds the Utesco engine, which is an improved Diesel engine, with which these submarines are propelled on the surface, and the electric motors and other parts with which they are equipped, while the hulls are built at the Fore River Engine company plant on the Atlantic coast, or the Union Iron works on the Pacific side.

When Mr. Bryan objected to building the submarines for the British on the ground that it would be a violation of the declaration of neutrality, Mr. Schwab again crossed the ocean and told the British authorities that he would have to give up the contract unless he could make the vessels in Canada. Arrangements were then made for their manufacture by Schwab in Montreal.

- (a) Visceral anatomy and the circulation of the human body, both arterial and venous. (b) The nature, action, modes of action and comparative value of disinfectants. (c) The methods of embalming and preparing bodies for transportation, also shipping rules. (d) How disease are spread, the best method for the restriction of diseases, and bacteriology in relation to the spread of diseases. (e) The signs of death and the manner in which it is determined.

DISEASE CLOSES BAY CITY SCHOOLS

Bay City, Mich., Oct. 12.—All Bay City schools were closed for 10 days today by order of Dr. John A. Keho, health officer. The action is due to a threatened epidemic of infantile paralysis. The board of health also ordered that no Sunday school be held and that proprietors of moving picture theaters must keep children under 18 years of age out of their places.

PERJURY CHARGE, LUCE 'DRY' SCRAP

Newberry, Oct. 12.—Henry and Culbert Mark are under arrest charged with committing perjury when they qualified as sureties on the liquor bond of Thomas Whalen, in McMillan. The arrest is said to be an outgrowth of the efforts of the "drys" to force saloons out of McMillan. When the Marks went on Whalen's bond the "drys" petitioned the county treasurer to demand a new bond alleging that the sureties were insolvent. This action failed and the arrest on the perjury charge followed.

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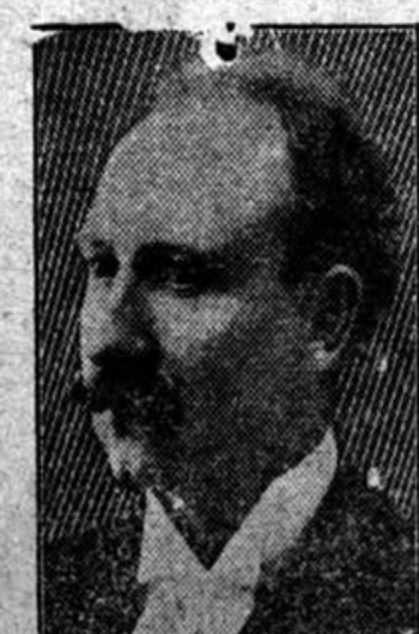

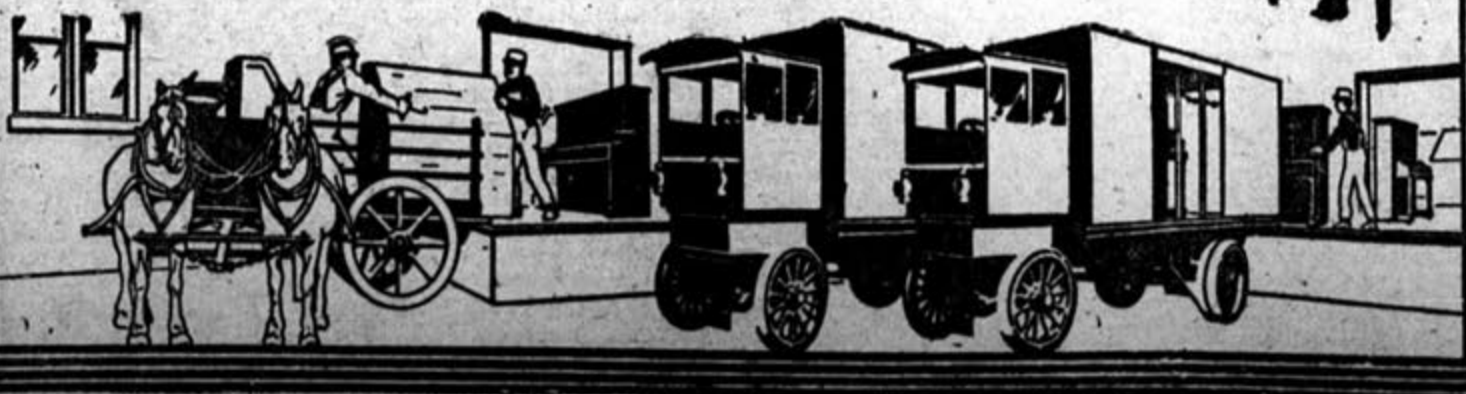

Oct. 13, 1915

TO THE CITIZENS OF ESCANABA:

Where a municipality grants a franchise to a Public Utility for a specific number of years and reserves the right to purchase before the expiration of the term, it has been generally accepted by Courts that the price fixed must include a sum for the value of the property as an operating business with customers and earnings.

In our desire to be reasonable and fair regarding the value of the North Michigan Water Company, we have given little consideration to this item. We call your attention to the ruling of the Supreme Court of Kansas.

"A system of water works in a city, without the right to operate there, or without being connected with water takers, and not in a running condition, would be comparatively worthless. The Water Company was the owner of these important elements of value, and it seems reasonable that they should not be taken without compensation." The parties evidently contemplated that the value of the plant should be fixed by the same standard that would be adopted if the purchaser had been an outside party instead of the City, in which case these elements would be included without question.

Justice Lurton of the United States Supreme Court, in the Olan case, said: "The option to purchase excluded any value on account of unexpired franchise; but it did not limit the value of the bare bones of the plant, its physical property, such as lands, its machinery, its water pipes or settling reservoirs, nor to that it would take a reproduction of these physical features. The value in equity and justice must include whatever is contributed by the fact of the connection of the items making a complete operating plant. The difference between a dead plant and a live one is a real value and is independent of any franchise to go on, or any good will as between such a plant and its customers."

When you, the citizens of Escanaba, come to thoroughly appreciate our desire to fix an unbiased value upon the plant of the Water Company, you will find that we have eliminated several items of consequence allowed by Courts in plant valuations.

We welcome the day when this property shall secure a valuation both fair to the City and to the Company, upon which basis there can then be had a common understanding as to values and a reasonable return upon the same.

U.S. KEEPS EYE ON NEW MERGER

Washington, Oct. 12.—Attorney-General Gregory has issued a formal statement saying that any attempt to bring about a combination of independent steel companies "would be subjected to the closest scrutiny by the department of Justice."

The statement follows: "Asked whether the department of Justice would take any action with respect to the definite and circumstantial reports of a proposed combination of independent steel companies, the attorney general said:

"I cannot be questioned that it is unlawful to unite through the United States Steel corporation one-half of the competitive units in the steel trade, the other half would also have the right to combine. And, of course, what could be done in the steel trade could be done in every other branch of trade, thus virtually putting an end to competition."

"But the decision of the circuit judges of the third circuit in the steel case is not yet the established law. It is because of just such consequences that the government is appealing from that decision. Besides, in the Harvester case, a court of equal rank took a very different view of the law."

"The question is now pending before the supreme court. In the meantime, attempts to combine able and efficient competitors, affecting trade over a wide area, will be subjected to the closest scrutiny by the department of Justice."

MORE MONEY

(Continued from page one.)

Gentlemen:
Following is an outline of the road work that has been accomplished during the last fiscal year. Under schedule "A" is a list of the amounts that have been expended for improvements on the various roads and schedule "B" is an estimate of the amounts needed to so improve all roads as to not only make them passable at all times, but to put them in condition to be maintained as first class roads at a minimum cost.

Ford River Road
Has been repaired to the county line and is in fairly passable condition. The bridge over Ford River has been painted.

Iron Mountain Trunk
The re-surfacing has been completed about 6 miles west and we hope to finish to the county line this fall. The state reward is more than paying for this work. The ditches have been cleaned and widened to the county line, a 12 ft. concrete culvert has been built over Portage creek and the outlet drain started last summer has been completed. A 4 ft. concrete culvert has been put in west of Hyde.

Schaffer Road
Has had minor repairs and dragging.

Cornell Road
The grading and ditching contract of the 5 mile section started last year has been completed, but the road still needs some surfacing and culverts. The section above Cornell has had considerable repair work and is in much better condition.

Manistique Trunk
The re-surfacing of the Bay Shore Div. has been completed and the new macadam extended as far as Ensign and the grading completed 4 miles farther to the Ogontz bridge. 3 concrete culverts were built on the Ensign div.

Lathrop Road
The section from Campbell to the county line has had minor repairs, but needs rebuilding and considerable drainage.

Marquette Trunk
Has only had minor repairs and is in very bad condition. About 12 miles of this road must be rebuilt to make it passable.

Peninsula Road
All the new portions have been completed and are fairly good earth roads. The only section in Masonville township, about 4 1-2 miles in length, needs rebuilding.

Maywood Road
The contract for grading and ditching is completed and some of the most needed surfacing is now in progress. It is expected that this road can be opened this fall, but considerable surfacing is still needed to put it in good shape.

Portage Road
This road has been cleared and grubbed throughout and minor repairs made. The last 3 miles will need rebuilding.

Beaver Road
Contract has been completed and road was opened last fall.

Fairbanks Road
Some graveling and other repair work was done on this road last fall.

Escanaba Road West
Has been re-surfaced from Butcher creek to the city limits.

Gladstone Road North
Last fall this road was macadamized from the Buckeye bridge to the city limits.

Gladstone Road South
A portion was macadamized and the rest re-surfaced from the depot to the city limits.

Cornell Bridge
This structure was finished about 6 weeks ago.

The estimate in the annexed schedule "B" is for clearing grading and ditching portions of roads that at present are not passable in wet weather and cannot be maintained no matter how much money is expended, until they are graded and drained.

It is anticipated that the 3 mill tax will be needed for maintenance of roads already built, for a more durable top for our present macadam roads and a portion will be needed as a fund for carrying on macadam work that will ultimately be paid by state reward, but which cannot be collected until the work is complete.

It is not proposed to spend the \$100,000.00 in one year, but to spread it over a period of 2 to 3 years as appears most economical. However as under the present highway law the state builds the bridges over 30 ft. span on the trunk lines, and as we have 3 bridges on the Manistique trunk that we expect to have the state build, it would seem to be advisable to get as much done as possible on that road next year in order to get these bridges before any alterations are made in the law.

The state has already completed one expensive bridge on the trunk line, the Whitefish bridge and have promised to build a new one this winter on the Iron Mountain trunk over the Ford river. In addition to these we have made application for state maintenance on the following: The concrete bridge over the Escanaba river at Wells, Day's river bridge, Tacobash and Rapid River.

ARREST ALLEGED SWINDLE CHIEFS

Bay City, Oct. 12.—Word was received here that Prosecuting Attorney J. L. McCormick and Detective George Craig had secured the arrest of George Reynolds in Peoria, Ill., on a charge of swindling in Bay City.

Reynolds will be brought back. He was rounded up as the fourth and ringleader of a gang of alleged swindlers, three of whom were arrested Tuesday on complaint of William Goldie, Jr., hoop manufacturer. The three are Earl Bell, alias Earl Dunn, 31, of Rogers, Neb.; David Roaume, 35, of this city, and Thomas Conner, 53, of Estey, Mich. Their arrest was kept secret. They stoutly deny their guilt. Each is held in jail in default of \$2,000 bail.

The arrest came just as they were closing a deal with Goldie for a tract of several thousand acres in Missouri. Last spring Anton Piechovlak, stove mill operator, since deceased, was swindled out of \$5,000 on a similar deal, and when the operators appeared here this week Chief of Police Davis took them into custody.

Their "game" is alleged to have consisted in putting over the deal, getting a certified check for \$5,000 as option money, inviting their purchasers to go at their expense, to look over the land and leaving their "guests" in the lurch.
