THE WAR

London, Oct. 19.—The reports that the allies have occupied Strumitza and landed at Enos, which was recently transferred from Turkish to Bulgarian rule, has caused a more optimistic feeling throughout the allied countries.

As to the progress of the near eastern campaign it is known from both Serbian and German accounts that Field Marshal von Mackensen's army is meeting with greater resistance than was expected, and although it is probable that the Serbians eventually must fall back on stronger strategic positions in the north, the fact that the allies are bringing heavy forces against the Bulgarians, and so placing them that the Bulgarians will be compelled to divide their armies, gives hope here that the Germans may be balked in their latest attempt to reach the sea and bring assistance to the Turks.

All along the line the Serbians and their Montenegrin neighbors, who also are being attacked, are offering very stubborn resistance to both Austro-Germans and Bulgarians, and while they have given up a number of towns and positions they have not yet reached the line on which they expect to make their stand.

The Bulgarians, so far as can be learned, have made progress only in the Zlotokopska valley, near the river Morava north of the town of Vranja, where they blew up a bridge. There is no confirmation, however, of the report that they cut the railway in this district, the bridge which they destroyed being a small wooden one near the railway. The Bulgarian force which penetrated the valley is not a large one.

On the other hand, it is pointed out the capture of Strumitza is of real strategic value, as its occupation permits the defense of the southern end of the railway and compels the Bulgarians to keep a force there. Enos, too, is of value, as, although not a good landing place, its occupation threatens Dedagatch, which has a great harbor and is fortified and mined. The civilian population already has left Dedagatch, which is entirely in the hands of the military, under German officers.

The Italians, according to the latest reports, will not send a contingent to the Balkans, but co-operation of their navy in the Aegean, where an allied fleet already has gathered, is looked for.

The point at which the Russians will strike has not yet been disclosed. The expectation is, however, that the allies have a surprise for the central powers and that steps are being taken to bring Turkey to her knees before assistance can reach her.

There has been plenty of heavy fighting on both the eastern and western fronts, but in neither case has either side attempted a general offensive.

The Germans are still making a great effort between Riga and Dvinsk and have met with some minor successes but thence to the Roumanian border, wherever there has been any fighting, it is the Russians who are attacking, and they, too, claim some gains.

Much the same conditions prevail on the western front. The British have been attacking east of Verdun, according to the Berlin report, while the Germans attacked the French near Souchez and the French took the offensive in Champagne, Lorraine and the Vosges. None of these attempts is making any marked alterations in the positions of the armies.

GERMAN TROOPS GETTING READY

London, Oct. 19.—"Along the Russian front," says the Morning Post's Petrograd correspondent, "the Germans everywhere have begun preparation for winter. It is believed their warfare will take on a purely defensive character as soon as the fighting for Dvinsk is decided."

"The trenches are being deepened and widened and lined with concrete. They are provided with field railways to the rear, while comfortable underground quarters, which are fully protected against the rigors of the weather, have been prepared for the men. These works already are completed in several districts, notably around Mitau and south of Riga. Zeppelin hangars have been erected at Kovno."

"Many changes in the personnel of the army staff have been noted at the front since Emperor Nicholas took over command from Grand Duke Nicholas. The older men are being shelved in many instances in favor of younger and more active officers. Moreover numerous officers of class, who are called by the Russians 'Silk Plumaged Courtiers' are being displaced by men better grounded in military science."

MECHANICAL EAR DETECTS U BOAT

New York, Oct. 18.—How England and France have overcome the menace of the German submarines is told by William Dubilier, a New York engineer, who returned from Europe a few days ago, after helping the French and British governments to install a submarine detecting system. His work contributed largely to the success of the allies in getting the submarine situation in hand, since his sound-filtered resonance microphone placed directly to the destruction of a number of the kaiser's U-boats.

In an interview published in The Brooklyn Eagle, Mr. Dubilier explained the workings of his submarine detector. This instrument weighs perhaps a quarter of a pound, is about 2 1/2 inches in diameter, and looks like a telephone receiver. The detector registers the most feeble sound waves. It is electrically connected placed into a water tight box, and lowered into the water along the shore. The detector is connected with an amplifier, invented by Dr. De Forest, another American. This magnifies 20,000 times the registrations of sound waves.

DETROIT HELPED BY WAR ORDERS

Detroit, Mich., Oct. 16.—Detroit manufacturers are reaping a harvest from war orders placed since the outbreak of the conflict in Europe, as shown in customs statistics for September, in which the value of exports reach a record total of \$13,187,323, an increase of \$5,321,994 over the same month last year.

the fate of the underwater craft. "The pursuing boat is in constant communication with the shore and gets directions as to the course the submarine is taking. When the German boat rises, it often comes up under the very guns of the destroyer."

"What kind of guns are employed against the U-boats, Mr. Dubilier?" "Usually 1-inch rapid-fire cannon. One puncture of the hull of the submarine from such a gun is generally enough, since the plates composing the shell of the vessel crack and split."

Mr. Dubilier described other methods, aside from his own, that had been successful in checking von Tirpitz's "blockade." He told of the speedy motorboats which had run down so many U-boats, of the aeroplanes, which from their perch were able to see the hostile craft beneath the surface, and of the huge rope and steel nets which guarded English harbors and which were stretched clear across the channel.

Mr. Dubilier does not believe, however, that the United States should curtail its submarine construction program on the basis of Germany's experience. He says: "Submarines would form excellent defensive weapons for our coasts. There would be no shore stations here to detect them because we would be in possession of the shores, and there would naturally be no nets or subaqueous obstructions. The situation there is so very different from that obtaining in the English channel."

Exports to England totaled \$3,478,291; to Newfoundland, \$117,687; British South Africa, \$98,394; France, \$57,427, and Russia, \$33,620. Exports to other countries reach only relatively small figures. This is accounted for by the fact that exports to other countries from Detroit are cleared from United States seaports.

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TAKES STEPS TO PREVENT EXTINCTION

London, Oct. 16.—Means are to be adopted to prevent peacocks from becoming extinct in cases where the only male heir has given his life to his country. In the ordinary course, succession to a peerage is limited to direct male descendants of the last or of a former holder of the title, daughters being excluded. But by "special remainder" as the provision is called, the nearest of other male relatives will now be given the title. There are now at least 200 heirs to peerages in the army and navy, and a number have already fallen. Among the dead are Lord Wendover, the sole heir of the Marquis of Lincolnshire, Captain Biggs, who was the only son and heir of Lord Stamfordham, the King's private secretary, and the Claude Maysey-Thompson, the sole heir of Knarborough. Lord Ribblesdale is among those who have lost an only son in action but he has grandsons by his daughters. Thirteen are allowed to descend by the

Washington, Oct. 19.—To drive home the lesson of the necessity of preparedness for defense the Girls of America will be organized by leaders of the woman's section of the navy league to make Washington kits for American soldiers in case of war similar to the Lafayette kits made by the sympathizers for the French soldiers in the trenches. The kits will contain knitted socks, warm shirts, and handkerchiefs, scarfs, sewing housewives equipment with various sized needles, threads and buttons, towels, and soap and all the little things which go so far to make life comfortable for men in camp and barracks life. None of the kits so made shall be sent outside of this country.

PHILLIES WERE NOT IN CLASS

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 13.—The Boston Braves' sensational victory over the Athletics a year ago scared most of the experts out of picking the winner of the series just closed. Every baseball writer in the big leagues thought the Red Sox stronger than the Phillies, but they all thought last year that the Athletics outclassed the Braves, so when the 1915 advance dope had to be written they were gun shy.

Pat Moran is not an object of sympathy. He should be congratulated for winning one game in five and for making the others so close. His club was beaten four times by one run, when really it had little business in the same ball park with the American league champions.

Without Grover Alexander, Pat Moran's team was anything but a formidable bunch. With him it was still shy the punch that makes world's champions. Philadelphia's pitching staff had no second best. Among Alex's shipmates it was nearly a tossup. So was it a tossup among Carrigan's hurlers.

To realize how well Carrigan was one has only to consider that Joe Wood, Ruth and Mays never tossed a ball in the series, and every one of them is rated a good pitcher. Moran did not use McQuillan, Demaree, Baumgartner and Tincup, but it wasn't because he had plenty of other dependable ones. It was because he didn't know how any of them would behave under scorching fire.

There is no alibi for the Phillies. There need be no alibi when the inferior club is trimmed. Pat's star catcher, Bill Killifer, was unable to play, but it is extremely doubtful that he could have done better than Eddie Burns, who perhaps was the real dark horse of the series. Advance dope had it that he would blow up and take the rest of the team with him. But he was about the steadiest man on the Philadelphia club. The costly charged to him Saturday was on a hard chance, and the balance of his defensive work was perfect. Besides, he had it better than any one dreamed he could.

Lewis didn't do anything of which his folks should be ashamed of. He clearly outplay both his Boston rival, Nichoff was touted as Barry's inferior and disappointed nobody. Bancroft and Scott were about a toss-up, but after watching them closely most people would prefer to have the young Philly on their club. Gardner outshone Stock, except perhaps in hitting. The

NORTH WESTERN BUYS 500 STEEL ORE CARS

Reflecting the rush now being felt in the ore handling trade is the fact that the Northwestern road has placed orders for 500 steel ore cars for use in the iron trade. Referring to the recent purchase by the company a Negaunee correspondent says:

The railway has been short of ore cars all summer, and has had difficulty meeting the demands of the mining companies.

The Northwestern has had to increase the number of its engine and switching crews properly to handle the increased ore business, and many of the firemen on the Peninsula division have been running locomotives for the greater part of the summer, causing the employment of more firemen. Two and three switch engines have been worked almost continuously in the Negaunee yards and about the mines, to take care of the increased ore business.

During some past seasons, when the ore business was at its height, more ore has been shipped from the Negaunee mines by rushing the steam shovels and trains for a few weeks at a time, but the traffic this season has been steadier and the crews have had practically continuous work. Besides the large tonnage shipped over the company's line from the Marquette range, the Northwestern has handled a great deal of ore from the Gogebic and Menominee ranges.

For several weeks this season a train crew was employed at Republic to provide better shipping facilities for the Cleveland-Cliffs Iron company's output from the Republic mine. Before the C. C. I. company took over the Republic mine little of the ore was shipped over the Northwestern and all that was sent to the Escanaba docks was handled by the regular freight train loads of ore were handled from the mine by the Northwestern and it had a yardmaster employed there for several weeks. Before the mine changed hands most of the Republic ore was handled by the St. Paul.

The stockpiles at the mines near Michigamme have almost all been cleaned up and it is expected that before the shipping season closes that there will be little or no ore on stock at any of the properties there. A steam shovel now working at the Ohio mine, and shipment will be going forward in a few days.

The stockpiles at the Negaunee

mines, which at the opening of the shipping season were larger than they had ever been before, have with a few exceptions, been cleaned up. Much of the ore shipped was mined and stockpiled last year. The mines now have plenty of room for stocking during the winter months and Negaunee businessmen look for a much better winter than that of 1914. Practically every man in Negaunee is now employed and there are over 100 men from Ishpeming working in the mines here. Ishpeming miners have moved their families here during the past few months, and others would make their homes here if houses could be secured at a premium.

WARDEN FAVORS PRISON STATUTE

Warden James Russell of the Marquette prison is a thorough believer in the indeterminate sentence law. He considers it a useful statute and declares the results of its operation satisfactory in all the penitentiaries of the state.

Since the law went into effect in 1903, there have been 571 men paroled at Marquette. Of this number 147 observed the conditions of their paroles. There are now out on parole and reporting regularly each month sixty-two men. This makes a total of 409 out of 571 who have either made good or are still on parole and complying with the conditions. Of the whole number, 162 violated their parole and 109 of these have been returned to the prison, leaving sixty-two still at large.

Judiciously administered, Mr. Russell says, the law will become more and more an effective factor in taking out of prisons the reclaimable element, leaving those who are hopelessly incorrigible to serve out the full time for which they can be held. The warden regards the law as of incalculable value for the promotion of good conduct, consequently for better discipline. It provides an incentive to good behavior.

The Marquette warden is convinced that it would materially diminish the percentage of violations if the law should be amended so as to require the convict who breaks his parole to serve out his maximum term, less the good time earned, after his return to prison.
