Berlin, via Amsterdam, Nov. 29 .-Peace talk has been suddenly revived in the German press. Vorwaerts, which resumed publication a week ago. after having been suspended by the government for the frank peace plea which it published, renews its demand on strong language. Action on the part of the authorities seems improbable in view of the fact that several other well known newspapers are permitted to discuss the same object Voerwaerts flady demands an end of the war, saying:

"The real cause of the highest cost of living is the long duration of the war. Every successive week of the war renders the economic situation of the poorer classes more tolerable the best safeguard in the future against the increase of prices would te the speedy termination of the war.

"We rely on the leaders of our party to multiply their efforts and to see that everything in their power is done to end the conflict. # DR. FREDERICK HIRN WARN GIVERS OF

Washington, Nov. 29.—The depart ment of commerce asks those who contemplate sending Christmas pres ent abroad to ascertain whether these presen's will have to pay tariff duties. Otherwise, the person to whom the gift is addressed may find that he has to pay charges in order to obtain his gift.

.The department invites correspond ence on the subject. Letters should be addressed to the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce. The bureau asks that the inquiries be made as explicit as possible, because it cannot send out an entire tariff schedule in answer to each letter. An example of what not to do is afforded by the first of the 1915 letters, which arrived on Nov. 11. It was addressed to the treasury department. The writer asked for the rate on "Christmas gifts" to Canada. The bureau of foreign and domestic commerce, to which the letter was forwarded, was unable to reply until it was known whether the gift was a toy, a diamond stickpin or a warm garment, or what.


