C., Dec. 16 .- The administration today took the first step toward repairing the shattered govrament finances when the house by a vote of 205 to 189 passed a resolution continuing for one year the emergency war tax law. Republicans on the first test vote won a victory but the democrats soon cathered in the members and republican amendments to the resolution were defeated by majorities

ranging from 6 to 30. Majori'y leader Kitchin made the principal argument for the resolution. Representative Fordney of Michigan lead the republican speechmakers. The resolution will be to the senate tomorrow where arrangements have been be made to pass the measure and clear the way for adjournment tomorrow over the holidays.





Michigan will in the near future receive some of the best political plums to be passed out by the democratic administration is the opinion of politicians here who have their ears to the ground. Indeed, Democra ic National Committeeman E. O. Wood in a recent conference put the matter of recognition of Michigansquarely up to Prestdent Wilson. He had no criticism of the way the state had been treated in patronage mat ers in the past. But he did make it plain that the time had arrived when further rewards should be passed to the faithful.

Members of the Michigan democratic organization have been somewhat reluctant to push their claims in the past. They consider that the Michigan democracy is nited now with faces toward the battle of 1916. All this was diplomatically laid before the president. The importance of the state both politically and in a commercial way was also brought to the attention of the chief executive.

The president was reminded of the many fine appointments which Michigan had during the two administrations of President Cleveland. These included the appointment of Mr. Thurber as the president's private secretary; Don M. Dickinson as postmaster-general; William E. Quimby as minister to the Hague; Edwin F. Uhl, western Michigan's greatest lawyer, as ambassador o Berlin; Allen M. Moorse of Ionia as U. S. consul at Glasgow and A. P. Swineford of Marquette as yovernor of Alaska. Uuder Republican administrations the state has also been signally honored, as instanced in the appointment of Thomas J. O'Brien of Grand Rapids successively as minister to Denmark and later as ambassador

Under the Wilson administration the state has had nothing outside of loca! appointments except the appointment of Edwin F. Sweet of Grand Rapids as assistant secretary of commerce While the governor, the state chairman and the state organization gladly endorsed Mr. Sweet, yet his appointment has always been considered as personal on the part of Secretary Redfield. Mr. Sweet and Mr. Redfield were close personal friends when members of the house of representatives.

Mr. Wood feels encouraged to be eve that Michigan will get more rec ognition soon. What kind of positions will be passed out no one knows, but there are a number of good foreign appointments and also positions of honor carrying fat salaries in Wash-

It was also urged that regulations be made to prevent the sale of lumber below cost or that the manufacturers, under government advice, be permitted to agree on values representing a
