REICHSTAG PLANS TO CUT PRICES ON ALL FOOD SUPPLIES

Berlin, via London, Dec. 20.—The budget committee of the reichstag has adopted various resolutions looking to the regulation and cheapening of the food supply. These resolutions include a reduction in the maximum price of sugar and by products, the fixing of maximum prices for rice and vegetables of all kinds, as well as food stuffs or livestock, and providing for special allowances of grain to breeders of animals and poultry.

The budget committee also has adopted a resolution recommending the reduction of the age limit for old age pensions from seventy to sixty-five years. Another resolution increasing the war allowances of the families of soldiers and the pay of privates was referred for further action.

The committee also discussed a proposal to reduce the war salaries of the higher officers in order to secure funds for increasing the privates' pay. The Socialists finally offered a resolution demanding a thorough revision of all military salaries. The war minister opposed such changes as did also Dr. Helfferich, the secretary of the imperial treasury, who remarked that savings thus made would be insignificant.

HAY MONEY PLANTS HARD HIT IN 1915.

Washington, Dec. 20.—The lead dollar industry suffered a loss of \$25,500, 58 at the hands of Chief W. F. Flynn of the secret service in the last year, he reported today. Counterfeit bank notes totaling \$45,819.85 were also seized.

New York and Pennsylvania led the list of arrests, and in all 536 arrests with only 95 acquittals, were secured.



HOLIDAY WARNINGS TO BE OBSERVED

The season of the year is at hand in which amateur Santa Clauses, with cotton whisks and inflammable padding, offer themselves up as sacrifices to the Christmas spirit. The trouble is that they often endanger the lives of others, especially women and children, by their failure to use non-inflammable materials and to exercise ordinary common-sense precautions in the neighborhood of candles and tinsel decorations. There are numerous cases of terrible burnings because of Christmas tree fires, and in the holiday entertainments at schools and churches, with large throngs of children present, dangerous games are likely to occur if a fire should start in the decorations. There are plenty of fire-proof materials which can be used for Christmas tree trimmings and decorations, and cotton should never be used to represent snow, especially where the tree is lighted with candles. It is better to be safe than sorry, or to turn the Christmas season into a time of mourning.

**STRANGER WAS
MAPLE RIDGE MAN**

Alfred Davidson, who was found unconscious in the ice box of a North Western refrigerator car at Ishpeming, has told the hospital authorities that he entered the car at Maple Ridge, where he has made his home for some time.

Of Davidson's condition and the unusual predicament in which he found himself, a correspondent says:

"Alfred Davidson is the name of the man who was found unconscious Thursday afternoon in a refrigerator car on the North Western line. He is Finnish, twenty-eight years of age. Davidson did not regain consciousness until yesterday morning. He says he entered the car at Maple Ridge. It was dark at the time, he said, and he entered through a trap door in the top. The trap opened into the refrigerator box. As he jumped into the car the door closed and he could not open it. There was a charcoal burner in the

car to warm the perishable goods and it is thought the gas from the stove was a factor in affecting him. The box was air tight and he could not have survived long anyway.

"Davidson said he felt himself grow drowsy and weaker gradually but tried several times to open the door, which seemed to be locked. It is thought that if Davidson had remained in the refrigerator an hour or so longer it would have been impossible to restore him to consciousness.

**WILSON'S NAME TO
GO ON THE BALLOT**

Lansing, Mich., Dec. 20.—More than the required number of petitions to place the name of Woodrow Wilson on the primary ballot as the democratic candidate for president have been filed with Coleman C. Vaughan secretary of state.

The first petitions for the renomination of President Wilson were delivered to the state department Wednesday afternoon, from democratic voters in Detroit. Another bundle of Wilson petitions came from Detroit, Thursday morning.

Although the names of 100 democrats attached to a Wilson petition is sufficient to place his name on the primary ballot nearly 500 signatures have been received.

Word has reached Lansing that the plans are being formulated by friends of William Jennings Bryan to place the name of the former secretary of state on the democratic primary ballot in opposition to President Wilson.

Democratic leader in the state house charge that this is a plot on the part of the republicans to stir up trouble in the democratic ranks.

No petitions have been filed as yet in behalf of any other candidate. The presidential primary will be held April 3, the day of the spring election.

The body of Morris Kaspar of Marquette arrived in Marinette last night and was taken to the L. D. Martin Undertaking establishment pending the arrival of relatives. Ulcers of the stomach was the cause of his demise. He was 52 years old.

The funeral will be held tomorrow morning from the Undertaking rooms to the Jewish cemetery. The Rev. M. Korchin of the Temple Montefiore will officiate.

The deceased is survived by a widow; two daughters, Anita and Adell and one son Lester of Marquette; father, Harry Kaspar; brothers, Benjamin and Kolman of Garden Bay; who all arrived in the city for the funeral. **WOULD HAVE FEDERAL
TAX ON MAIL ORDER.**

Washington, Dec. 20.—Representative E. E. Browne, Wisconsin, has introduced a bill providing that mail order houses engaged in interstate commerce shall pay a tax of 1 per cent on the cash value of sales in any state. Those houses, the bill directs are to keep accounts as prescribed by the secretary of the treasury.

Representative J. J. Esch has introduced a bill requiring interstate railroads and those in territories and the block system upon certain portions of their passenger lines, and empowering the interstate commerce commission to require the installation on automatic train control devices. Penalties of \$1,000 a day may be enforced for violations of the law.

**FULTZ EXPECTS O.B.
TO PROTECT PLAYERS**

David Fultz, president of the Baseball Players' fraternity, has issued a statement relative to the peace negotiations between the Federal league and the American and National league.

"Should the peace negotiations prove successful," said Fultz, "there will, of course, be a provision restoring all players who have gone to the Federal, to their original status in organized baseball. Any other settlement would be grossly illegal and unfair to the players.

"Provision doubtless also will be made for carrying out the long term contracts signed by players with both organized ball and the Federal league.

"There are also players both in organized ball and the Federal league who have not yet received their entire salaries for 1915. These obligations, too, shall be taken into consideration in any adjustment.

"Should peace be declared it would result in automatically restoring to full membership in the Baseball Players' fraternity all Federal league players who were members before going to the Federal league."

**WAR DOESN'T HARM PARIS
AS CENTER OF FASHIONS.**

New York, Dec. 18.—Mere war hasn't reduced Paris from her position as a fashion center. At the appraisers' stores of the custom house the importation of Paris models to the United States in the current month was said to be the largest officials can remember and, notwithstanding that most of the gowns were for individuals and not for the trade, the trade imports also have increased.

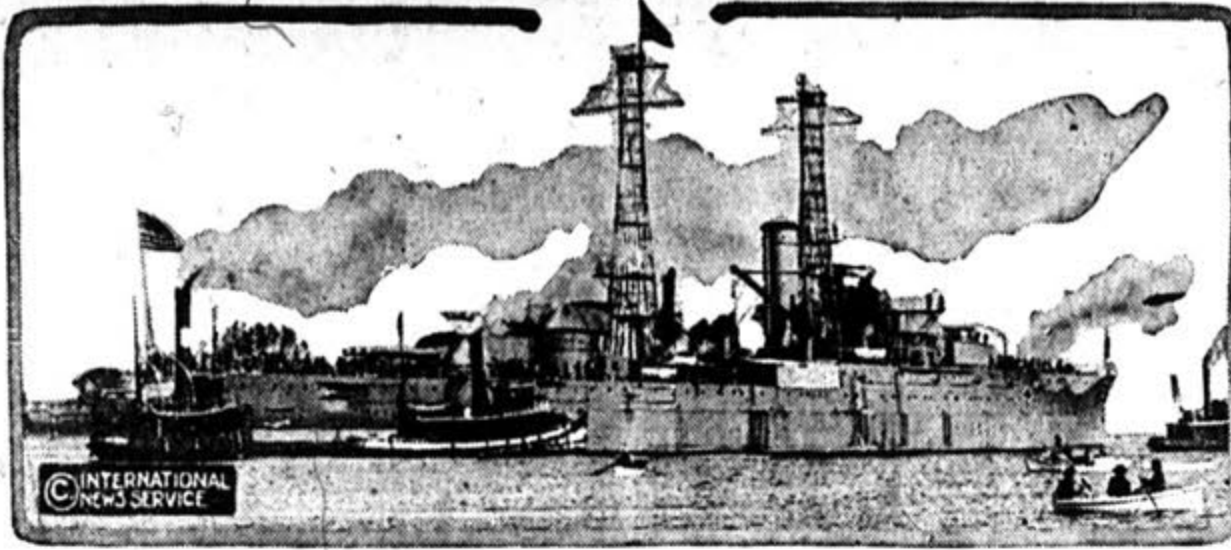

San Diego, Calif., Dec. 18.—Expressing the desire to "fly once before retiring to a quiet life," Mrs. Lulu Comstock, aged seventy-four, of this city, arranged for a flight with Aviator Anton Meyerhoffer, Jr., that ended today with the falling of the fly boat in the waters of San Diego bay and the death of the woman.

Mrs. Comstock, previous to the beginning of the flight stated that she wished to be taken to a height of at least 1,500 feet. Within a few minutes after the flight had been started, according to the story told by Meyerhoffer, Mrs. Comstock was seized with a fit and reaching out, grabbed the aviator in a firm grasp.

Meyerhoffer says that he struggled desperately to free himself from the embrace of the woman so that he could control the machine, but that before he could release himself from her grasp the flying boat, which was about 50 feet in the air, turned over and fell into the waters of the bay. The force of the impact with the water completely wrecked the flying boat.

GERMANY SEEKS HOARDED MONEY IN DEPOSIT VAULTS.

Berlin, Dec. 18.—The Reichsbank is taking measures to secure all gold deposited in safety deposit vaults since the war began.

EXTEND PENSIONS TO VETS. WIDOWS

Washington, Dec. 18.—A series of bills modifying materially the pension laws have been introduced by Representative M. E. Burke, Wisconsin. One changes the law which now prevents a woman who married a Civil war veteran after 1890 from receiving a pension by providing that any woman married to a pensionable Civil war veteran six years or more before his death shall be eligible. Another provides that if the widow of a pensionable veteran remarries, and her second husband dies, she shall then be

eligible to a pension. At present she forfeits her rights to a pension upon her remarriage.

A third bill provides that "war widows," or women who married soldiers during the Civil war shall receive pensions of from \$12 to \$20 a month. At present, it is the practice to grant applications in special cases. A fourth bill puts the widows of Spanish war veterans on the same basis as widows of Civil war veterans, and provides that if they were married, for six years prior to their husbands' death, they shall be entitled to a pension regardless of their financial condition.

REICHSTAG PLANS TO CUT PRICES ON ALL FOOD SUPPLIES

Berlin, via London, Dec. 20.—The budget committee of the reichstag has adopted various resolutions looking to the regulation and cheapening of the food supply. These resolutions include a reduction in the maximum price of sugar and by products, the fixing of maximum prices for rice and vegetables of all kinds, as well as food stuffs or live stock, and providing for special allowances of grain to breeders of animals and poultry.

The budget committee also has adopted a resolution recommending the reduction of the age limit for old age pensions from seventy to sixty-five years. Another resolution increasing the war allowances of the families of soldiers and the pay of privates was referred for further action.

The committee also discussed a proposal to reduce the war salaries of the higher officers in order to secure funds for increasing the privates' pay. The Socialists finally offered a resolution demanding a thorough revision of all military salaries. The war minister opposed such changes as did also Dr. Hefferich, the secretary of the imperial treasury, who remarked that savings thus made would be insignificant.

Washington, Dec. 20.—The lead dollar industry suffered a loss of \$25,599,55 at the hands of Chief W. F. Flynn of the secret service in the last year, he reported today. Counterfeit bank notes totaling \$45,819,835 were also seized.

New York and Pennsylvania led the list of arrests, and in all 536 arrests with only 95 acquittals, were secured.

**STRANGER WAS
MAPLE RIDGE MAN**

Alfred Davidson, who was found unconscious in the ice box of a North Western refrigerator car at Ishpeming, has told the hospital authorities that he entered the car at Maple Ridge, where he has made his home for some time.

Of Davidson's condition and the unusual predicament in which he found himself, a correspondent says:

"Alfred Davidson is the name of the man who was found unconscious Thursday afternoon in a refrigerator car on the North Western line. He is Finnish, twenty-eight years of age. Davidson did not regain consciousness until yesterday morning. He says he entered the car at Maple Ridge. It was dark at the time, he said, and he entered through a trap door in the top. The trap opened into the refrigerator box. As he jumped into the car the door closed and he could not open it. There was a charcoal burner in the

car to warm the perishable goods and it is thought the gas from the stove was a factor in affecting him. The box was air tight and he could not have survived long anyway.

"Davidson said he felt himself grow drowsy and weaker gradually but tried several times to open the door, which seemed to be locked. It is thought that if Davidson had remained in the refrigerator an hour or so longer it would have been impossible to restore him to consciousness.

The first petitions for the renomination of President Wilson were delivered to the state department Wednesday afternoon, from democratic voters in Detroit. Another bundle of Wilson petitions came from Detroit, Thursday morning.

Although the names of 100 democrats attached to a Wilson petition is sufficient to place his name on the primary ballot nearly 500 signature have been received.

Word has reached Lansing that the plans are being formulated by friends of William Jennings Bryan to place the name of the former secretary of state on the democratic primary ballot in opposition to President Wilson.

Democratic leader in the state house charge that this is a plot on the part of the republicans to stir up trouble in the democratic ranks.

No petitions have been filed as yet in behalf of any other candidate. The presidential primary will be held April 3, the day of the spring election.

**WOULD HAVE FEDERAL
TAX ON MAIL ORDER.**

Washington, Dec. 20.—Representative E. E. Browne, Wisconsin, has introduced a bill providing that mail order houses engaged in interstate commerce shall pay a tax of 1 per cent on the cash value of sales in any state. Those houses, the bill directs, are to keep accounts as prescribed by the secretary of the treasury.

Representative J. J. Esch has introduced a bill requiring interstate railroads and those in territories and the block system upon certain portions of their passenger lines, and empowering the interstate commerce commission to require the installation on automatic train control devices. Penalties of \$1,000 a day may be enforced for violations of the law.

**FULTZ EXPECTS O.B.
TO PROTECT PLAYERS**

David Fultz, president of the Baseball Players' fraternity, has issued a statement relative to the peace negotiations between the Federal league and the American and National leagues.

"Should the peace negotiations prove successful," said Fultz, "there will, of course, be a provision restoring all players who have gone to the Federals, to their original status in organized baseball. Any other settlement would be grossly illogical and unfair to the players.

"Provision doubtless also will be made for carrying out the long term contracts signed by players with both organized ball and the Federal league.

"There are also players both in organized ball and the Federal league who have not yet received their entire salaries for 1915. These obligations, too, shall be taken into consideration in any adjustment.

"Should peace be declared it would result in automatically restoring to full membership in the Baseball Players' fraternity all Federal league players who were members before going to the Federal league."

**WAR DOESN'T HARM PARIS
AS CENTER OF FASHIONS.**

New York, Dec. 18.—Mere war hasn't reduced Paris from her position as a fashion center. 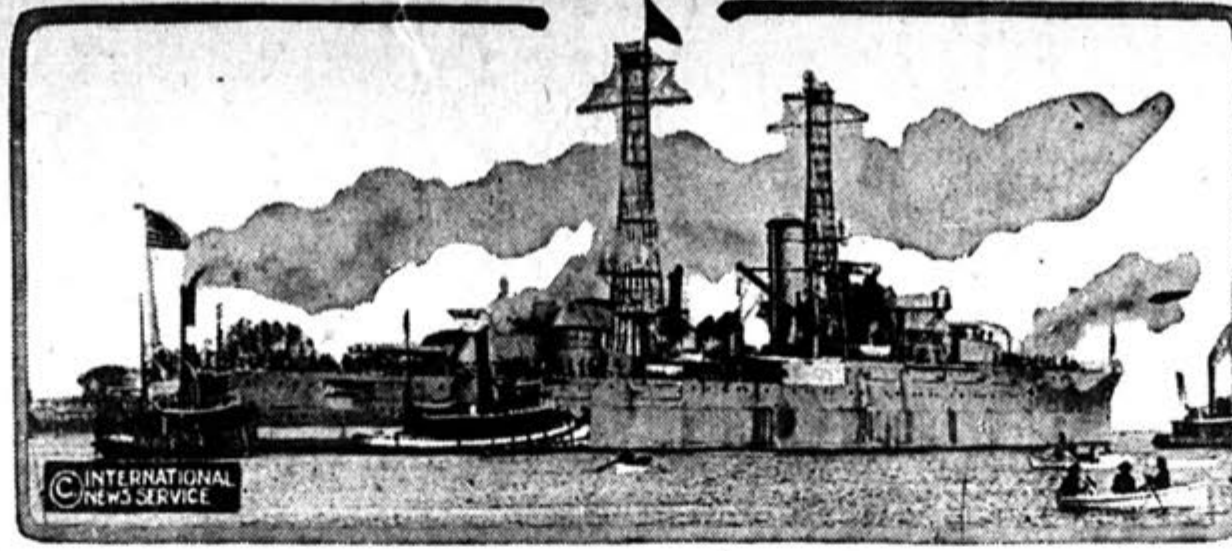

San Diego, Calif., Dec. 18.—Expressing the desire to "fly once before retiring to a quiet life," Mrs. Lulu Comstock, aged seventy-four, of this city, arranged for a flight with Aviator Anton Meyerhoffer, Jr., that ended today with the falling of the fly boat in the waters of San Diego bay and the death of the woman.

EXTEND PENSIONS TO VETS. WIDOWS

Washington, Dec. 18.—A series of bills modifying materially the pension laws have been introduced by Representative M. E. Burke, Wisconsin. One changes the law which now prevents a woman who married a Civil war veteran after 1890 from receiving a pension by providing that any woman married to a pensionable Civil war veteran six years or more before his death shall be eligible. Another provides that if the widow of a pensionable veteran remarries, and her second husband dies, she shall then be

eligible to a pension. At present she forfeits her rights to a pension upon her remarriage.

A third bill provides that "war widows," or women who married soldiers during the Civil war shall receive pensions of from \$12 to \$20 a month. At present, it is the practice to grant applications in special cases. A fourth bill puts the widows of Spanish war veterans on the same basis as widows of Civil war veterans, and provides that if they were married, for six years prior to their husbands' death, they shall be entitled to a pension regardless of their financial condition.
