

budget committee of 'he reichstag has adopted various resolution looking to the regulation and cheapening of the food supply. These resolutions include a reduction in the maximum price of sugar and by products, the fixing of maximum prices for rice and vegetables of all kinds, as well as food stuffs or lives ock, and providing for special allowances of grain to breed ers' of animals and poultry.

The budget committee also adopted a resolution recommending the reduction of the age limit for old age pensions from seventy to sixty-five years. Another resolution increasing the war allowances of 'he families of soldiers and the pay of privates wareferred for further action.

The committee also discussed a propocal to reduce the war salaries of the higher officers in order to secure funds for increasing the privates' pay. The Socialists finally offered a resolution demanding a thorough revision of all; military salaries. The war minister opposed such changes as did also Dr. Helfferich, 'he secretary of the imperial treasury, who remarked that savings thus made would be insignificant.

### MEET DEATH WITH DIGNITY

Railroad Men the Bravest of the Brave When the End Has to Be Faced.

Why is it that some disasters cause a greater shock to the public than others of greater magnitude? No doubt the presence of the heroic eleme.t. the popularity of the Victims, the murderous intent, the narrow escape 1.com greater disaster, all contribute to the human interest which attaches to such wrecks as that which recently befell the fast Pennsylvania train east of the city. Two faithful employees, old in the service, met death instantly. Accompanied by the expression of regret over the loss of valued lives was tne rejoicing that many passengers were almost miraculously spared. The destruction of property of itself is an item of importance, but it dwindles in the light of the more consequential loss of life.

Those railroad men every day faced the possibility of that which finally happened-sudden and violent deathyet they were unafraid and died nobly Their loss will be felt, and yet the manner of their going is not without its consolation. Death must come, and it is something not to be obliged to meet it after a long and painful illness under the distressing circumstances that so frequently accompany the last days of an active life.-Indianapolis

### LOCOMOTIVE IS CENTURY OLD

First Put Into Operation in 1814 By George Stephenson-Rocket Had Speed of 35 Miles.


The first locomotive was completed and put into operation just a century ago, in 1814, by George Stephenson, who was born in Wylam, England, June 9, 1781. He was engineer at a colliery when he invented a traveling engine to draw wagons along a tramway. Stephenson's first locomotive attained a speed of six miles an hour. Improvement after improvement was made, not only in the locomotive, but in the rails, and in 1822 Stephenson opened the first railway, which was eight miles in length.

In 1829 his locomotive, the Rocket, reached a speed of 35 miles an hour, winning the prize of \$2,500 offered by the Liverpool & Manchester Railway company. The entire system of railway locomotion, with stations, signals, tenders and carriages, was completed with the inauguration of the Liverpool & Manchester line in 1830. Stephenson was largely instrumental in establishing all the English and foreign lines during the first period of railroading. He died in 1848. The centenary of steam locomotives finds those engines improved and enlarged beyond the wildest dreams of the inventor, but already threatened with extinction by the electric locomotive.

### TURNS WATER BACK TO TANK

Locomotive Injector Attachment That Does Away With Considerable Annoyance.

In ordinary practice the overflow from locomotive boiler injectors is discharged alongside and near the railroad tracks. In cold weather this overflow freezes, forming coatings of ice



near the tracks in railroad yards, resulting oftentimes in very serious accidents to the railroad employees, and causing constant trouble and expense in removing it. This invention overcomes these difficulties by providing means for returning the overflow water back to the boiler feed system, thus preventing the promiscuous discharge of the overflow alongside the tracks .-- Scientific American.

Farmers and Automobiles. Take the 10 states of the Middle

West known as the grain belt: Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, Wisconsin, Missouri, Kansas, South Dakota, North Dakota and Oklahoma. Four years ago these 10 states owned 130,000 automobiles; the proportion of farm machines was perhaps one in ten. The number of motor-cars in these 10 states has quadrupled in the last three years and more than doublod in the last two years, so that on January 1, 1915, by figures furnished by the various secretaries of state; the number of cars was 559,730. Of this framense total fully one-half belong to farmers. The number in the 10 states is increasing at the rate of 13,000 machines a month, 425 a day. The average value of these machines was \$980,-Farm and Fireside.

### No Power In Raw Gas.

It is not the amount of gasoline that determines the amount of power to be derived from a given-sized cylinder. It is the amount that can be changed into vapor and mixed with air to a proper degree before ignition. In winter much gasoline is wasted by being carried as liquid into the cylinders. Such material burns very slowly compared to the proper mixture, and leaves much of the carbon deposited in the combus-tion chambers. This is not economy.

## REICHSTAG PLANS **ALL FOOD SUPPLIES**

Berlin, via London, Dec. 20 .- The budget committee of the reichstag has adopted various resolution looking to the regulation and cheapening of the food supply. These resolutions include a reduction in the maximum price of sugar and by products, the fixing of maximum prices for rice and vegetables of all kinds, as well as food! stuffs or lives ock, and providing for special allowances of grain to breeders of animals and poultry. The budget committee also has

adopted a resolution recommending the reduction of the age limit for old age pensions from seventy to sixty-five years. Another resolution increasing the war allowances of the families of oldfers and the pay of privates was ferred for further action.

The committee also discussed a propo al to reduce the war salaries of the higher officers in order to secure funds for increasing the privates' pay. The Socialists finally offered a resolution demanding a thorough revision of all military salaries. The war minister opposed such changes as did also Dr. Helfferich, the secretary of the imperial treasury, who remarked that savings thus made would be insignificant.



On St. Marrin's day (November 11) arrangements were usually made for slaughtering on a large scale, and for the next six months fresh meat worth eating was practically unobtainable. Until the spring grass was again ready there was a run on salted beef and salted mutton. Salted beef is excellent-for a change. But have you ever tried salted mutton?-London Chronicle,


