GREAT GAME IS ASSURED

ESCANABA HIGHS WILL BATTLE WITH MARINETTE IN MOST IMPORTANT AND FINAL GAME OF SEASON AT SOUTH PARK—MONSTER CROWD EXPECTED.

ASK PUBLIC TO ATTEND. Mayor Mackillican yesterday issued the following appeal to the people of Escanaba to attend the football game of today.

On the eve of the biggest football battle in the history of the Escanaba High school Assist. Coach John L. Loell last night issued the following statement: "If Marinette defeats Escanaba at South Park tomorrow, the players of that city will know they have been in a battle. I look for one of the closest games ever played in this city and it may be won by a place kick or drop."

The Escanaba high school football team will meet the Marinette high school at South Park at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon in the biggest battle played in the local gridiron in years. In addition it will be the final high school football game of the year at South Park.

Following a light signal practice yesterday afternoon every member of the Escanaba squad was sent to his bed at 8 o'clock last night, that the team may be in the very pink of condition today. For the last week they have been driven by Coach Warner and Assistant Coach Loell, as no team representing the Escanaba high school has been driven in years.

Members of the Marinette team arrived in the city last night that they too might get a good night's rest and avoid a tiresome trip to this city today. This morning a big party of Marinette rooters will come to the city and will give ardent support to their players on the sidelines at the game this afternoon.

Yesterday afternoon a rousing mass meeting was staged at the high school auditorium when addresses were delivered by Mayor B. J. Mackillican, Dr. H. W. Long, John E. Jackson, Attorney J. L. Loell, Coach Warner and Prof. Hicks.

Last night a big down town demonstration was carried out with over 400 students, bearing the colors, marching up and down Ludington street and attracting much attention. Today's game at South Park is to be made a big social as well as a city affair. A number of private parties have been arranged to attend the game and the people of Escanaba in general will turn out to witness a battle that is certain to be filled with interest.

The students rooting section will meet at the public library at 1 o'clock this afternoon and forming in line there will march up Ludington street and take cars for the park. A curtain raising game will be staged by the High school second team and the Bark River team, starting at 1:30 o'clock while the main event of the afternoon will be started at 2:30 o'clock.

MICHIGAN FOR HUGHES

STATE CHAIRMAN MANGUM SAYS REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE WILL SWEEP STATE BY 150,000.

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 3.—The Republican state central committee completed checking up on official polls today and as a result of the figures State Chairman Mangum stretched his claim of a Hughes plurality from better than 100,000 to 150,000.

"Michigan believes in a protective tariff. It's people know that if the Democratic party remains in power the industries will suffer after the war closes. Therefore they will vote for Hughes and the Republican ticket and I expect that we will win back both congressional districts and send a solid Republican delegation to congress."

ANOTHER SUB NOW EXPECTED

New London, Nov. 3.—"I certainly would not be surprised if a U-boat made its appearance in these waters. In fact, I expect one."

This was the comment made by Capt. Paul Koenig, master of the German underwater packet, the Deutschland, today on the report that a submarine war boat has been seen off Nantucket.

It is generally believed here that the U-57 is somewhere outside. The cargo of the Deutschland has practically all been unloaded and is stored in the warehouses of the Eastern Forwarding company.

The mystery surrounding the exact nature of the cargo continues.

PROHIBITION IS FAKE

Prohibition is the biggest fake ever proposed to the people and is admitted to be such by even its most ardent sponsors.

The prohibitionists today are going through the state of Michigan shouting that liquor is poison and is blamed for all of the evil in the world.

But they do not pretend to prohibit the use of liquor.

The prohibitionists in Michigan today are asking the people of the state to vote for a law that would allow even those who abuse it to drink all the liquor they want so long as they buy it outside of the state.

The Prohibitionists are demanding that the licensed saloon shall be abolished and the trade now going to the licensed saloon shall be transferred to the mail order houses and the breweries outside of the state.

And without accomplishing iota of reform, they are asking the taxpayers of Delta County alone to voluntarily raise their taxes from \$43 a thousand to \$71 a thousand.

And they are making this monumental demand in the face of the fact that the state is commission has just raised the property valuations in Escanaba and Delta County to unheard of figures.

To repudiate at this time nearly \$50,000 now received in Delta County from the sale of liquor licenses in the face of the present tremendous increase in valuations by the state commission, will practically result in the confiscation of all property in this county.

TOWNSHIPS NOT AFFECTED

No voters in Delta county, outside of the cities of Escanaba, are required to re-register under the law, to participate in the election of next Tuesday. Voters in the townships and in the city of Gladstone are not required to re-register at this time.

It has been learned that some confusion has developed among the voters in the townships who believed that the law also required them to re-register but such is not the case as the law applies only to the city of Escanaba.

SPUDS BRING RECORD PRICE

One hundred and twenty-five bushels of prize winning potatoes at the Michigan State Potato show, which closed here yesterday, were sold to the Hewitt Grain & Provision company at \$2.65 a bushel. The price was the highest ever paid for that quantity of potatoes in Cloverland and is believed to set a new record for the state of Michigan.

FORGOT THE THOUSAND.

It is to laugh. Auntie quoted a dry prognosticator last night as to the result of the election in Cloverland. The principal trouble with Auntie's prognostication was that in dealing with Delta county and a lot of other counties, she dropped the figure out of the thousands and column and then forgot some that will be added to the hundreds, tens and units. "Outside of some ten thousand, that she forgot to count, Auntie's guess was alright."

WAR TO LAST FOR AT LEAST 1 MORE YEAR

FORMER NEWSPAPER MAN RETURNS FROM TOUR OF WARRING COUNTRIES WITH ASSERTION END IS NOT IN SIGHT—GERMANS ARE WELL SUPPLIED.

GERMANS WELL SUPPLIED

New York, Nov. 3.—William Walton Harris ex-newspaper man, after six weeks in Europe, during which time he visited all the warring countries, declared tonight the war will last another year.

"I have talked with men in the leading positions in Great Britain, in France and with men from Germany who have lived there for many years and have had an opportunity to come to the safest conclusions.

"Taking a balance from the estimate of oil sides let it be said in all seriousness that the end of the war will not be seen under twelve months. "It is not at all improbable that it will last two years more.

After summarizing the present condition of the allies and the preparations for continuation of war, which they have made, Mr. Harris makes this analysis of Germany's condition:

"While Germany has not as great a supply of men, they are more amenable to direction and they are unanimous in spirit. There is no serious peace party in Germany. They believe they are fighting for their national life. Germany may not be able, probably will not be able, to shine in the offensive, but she will be able to hang on to territory already occupied to a degree that means years of struggle to force her out."

Food restrictions in Germany are merely annoying. Germany has had this season the most enormous crops in her history. As to animal food, she is raising hogs, which breed rapidly, by millions and meat cattle as rapidly as possible and is gaining on the demand. By Christmas at the latest, the shortage in fatty foods will no longer be a serious problem.

GOVERNMENT MUST LOWER FOOD PRICES

Hutchinson, Kas., Nov. 3.—Allan L. Benson, Socialist candidate for president, in an address here predicted intense suffering and even starvation this winter unless the government forces food speculators to surrender their grip on the nation's food supply.

"Flour now costs more than at any time since the Civil war, and we already find the government advocating the use of potato flour," he declared. "Yet wheat is being allowed to pour out of this country to make fortunes for speculators while we have not enough for our own use."

ENTENTE CONFISCATES 41,500 BAGS OF GERMAN MAIL

Berlin, Nov. 3.—Altogether 24,200 bags of mail from Germany and 16,820 bags destined for Germany were confiscated by the British and French authorities from December, 1915, to the end of September, 1916, says the Overseas News Agency. The news agency asserts that only a small part of the seized mail was afterwards re-dispatched to its destination.

TEUTONS ARE DRIVEN BACK

ROUMANIANS TURN ON INVADERS AND DRIVE THEM ACROSS BORDER—ITALIANS NEAR TRIESTE.

Bucharest, via Paris, Nov. 3.—The Rumanians have driven the Austro-Germans across the frontier of Transylvania in the region of Table Butz, according to an official statement today. In the Buza valley they have captured Mount Sirul and Taurumio, while in the valley of the Jiu they have driven the invaders further back capturing four guns.

London, Nov. 4.—The Italians on the Carso are reported tonight to have penetrated to within about 12 miles of Trieste. Three thousand more prisoners have been added to the nearly five thousand taken yesterday. Hard fighting has taken place on and near the Adriatic below Monfalcone. An unofficial report has reached Rome that Duino, on the Venice-Trieste railroad lines has been occupied. An Italian dirigible on Wednesday night bombarded the fortifications and warships in Sentenac bay island of Brazza in the Adriatic. Austrian planes on the same night raided point behind the Italian lines on the Carso.

Success is claimed in attacks on Cervignano, San Girgo di Nogaro, Pteris, Grade and the Adria works near Monfalcone.

RAISERS HAVE ORGANIZATION

CLOVERLAND SHEEP RAISERS' ASSOCIATION WAS LAUNCHED YESTERDAY BY MEN INTERESTED IN THE INDUSTRY—GREAT FUTURE PREDICTED.

The Cloverland Sheep Raisers' association was formally organized by the sheep raisers of Cloverland at an enthusiastic meeting, following a luncheon at the Delta hotel at noon yesterday. Twenty-five of the principal sheep men and others interested in the industry attended the luncheon and meeting yesterday, when a temporary organization was formally launched.

The officers elected are: George M. Mashek, president; Cheever Buckbee, vice president and L. A. Erickson secretary and treasurer. The temporary officers will frame a constitution and by laws and another meeting will be held at an early date when a permanent organization will be organized.

One of the first steps of the permanent organization will be to join the Ovine association, the national sheep growers' body and through which organization the Cloverland association will be able to secure many valuable aids.

In addition to the actual sheep raisers in attendance there were present a number of men who are authorities on different phases of the industry. W. F. Raven former head of the extension department of the Michigan Agricultural college in the peninsula, and who has visited practically every flock of sheep owned in this section of a short talk on the advantages offered for sheep raising in this district. Prof. Brown, head of the department of animal husbandry, delivered a most interesting talk on the financial benefits accruing to sheep raisers through an association. He pointed out that as soon as the sheep raised in this section have been standardized as to breed and quality and lambs were being produced in sufficient quantities, outside buyers would come here to bid would come to the peninsula to bid for the stock. He also spoke of the possibility of the clip of wool in this district being sold in carload lots, at considerably better prices than are now being received. A. L. Carr, county agent for Ontonagon county, pointed out the necessity of shipping both lambs and wool in carload lots to receive the highest prices.

J. N. Lewis who has recently arrived in this district from Indiana and has established his flock of sheep on a newly purchased farm near Rapid River and H. R. Brown a sheep raiser of Ontonagon county, were among those who were present. Every authority on the sheep industry who was present agreed that Cloverland is an ideal location for sheep raising and marked enthusiasm for an industry that is comparatively new in this territory, was developed.

Following the luncheon a number of non-resident sheep raisers and authorities, accepted the invitation of H. W. Reade and a visit was made to the National Pole Company's farm at Whitney, where the flocks there were viewed.

FINE SPEAKER HERE TONIGHT

Hon. Emmett R. Hicks, former attorney general of Wisconsin and one of the most eloquent orators on the Republican platform in this campaign will address a big mass meeting at the city hall tonight.

Mr. Hicks has been vigorously engaged in the campaign in Wisconsin for the past several weeks and it was through special arrangements made by Chairman O. P. Chatfield that he was induced to come to this city and practically wind up the campaign.

It is expected that Mr. Hicks will be greeted tonight by an audience that will tax the capacity of the city hall.

THE STRAND.

While the theatre world was still talking of his humorous characterization of "Abe Potash," in "Potash and Perimutter," the renown of Hebrew comedian, Barney Bernard was preparing another surprise for them under the large glass studios of the Vitagraph company, here he was working in a V-L-S-E feature release in five parts, entitled "Phantom Fortunes," which will be the headliner at the Strand today.

At first, Barney found it not a little difficult to work before the camera's eye—He missed the applause and the sea of faces before him who rewarded each typical expression or grimace with a hearty laugh. Gradually, however, he became accustomed to his new surrounding and when the picture had been completed his opinion of the silent drama as expressed in an interview, had risen to no small degree.

"It's a wonderful thing, this motion picture business," said he. "Your work lasts forever and while I am handicapped by being unable to use dialect and typical phrases I am sure the 'closeup' will give me unlimited chances of showing the different expressions. Then I am able to perform for the great mass in the motion picture—for those who find their recreation in this less expensive form of entertainment—while on the stage only a comparatively few witnessed my efforts every evening and at matinees, say once or twice a week.

According to Clara Kimball Young, the popular film star who is appearing at the head of her own company in a screen adaption of Robert W. Chambers famous novel, "The Common Law" the great fault with most producers of motion pictures lies in their misconception of what the so-called photograph really is at its best.

"The motion picture is not a play or drama, but a narrative," said Miss Young in a recent interview. "There is all the difference in the world between the two forms of expression. Many magnificent novels would fall hopelessly as 'staged' dramas and yet make fine motion pictures. On the other hand the highest form of drama loses half its force when novelized and an not be successfully produced as a motion picture at all. Who can imagine successful presentations of Ibsen on the screen.

"The solution is a simple one. Story telling is different art to that of the dramatist. Of course a story may be potentially dramatic but it is the wide range of incident and character drawing that makes a big story, whereas a drama is built almost entirely for situations and climatic effect.

"Anyone who will thing over the list of most successful pictures during the past two or three years will realize the truth of my claim that the best pictures are those that merely try to tell a big human story and not those that attempt too far to infringe upon the true province stage. As a case in point let me mention "The Spillers," which story made a dreadful failure as a play and a wonderful success as a picture."

IMPORTANT CONFERENCE IS HELD IN CHICAGO THAT MAY AFFECT MONEY STANDARDS OF NATIONS

Chicago, Nov. 3.--Behind closed doors of the Chicago club tonight 12 men, associated with the nation's biggest financial houses, were in conference. It is known that the conference dealt with the financial relations of the United States with France, Russia and England.

From a New York correspondent of a Chicago house comes a telegram tonight foreshadowing the importance of events being discussed in the conference.

The telegram says, according to reliable information, the future of the gold standard depends upon the attitude of the United States bankers towards the next British loan. If a billion dollars is not obtainable without collateral England, France and Russia are prepared to form a pool and send a billion dollars in gold, provided England agrees to demote-gize gold.

The combined committees have investigated a large number of street lighting systems and are endeavoring to hit upon one that will not prove too expensive to install and maintain and an expression of the public interest in the undertaking is desired.
