A bureau of hospital service has been organized to serve both army nurses and nurses in civilian relief work. It will arrange for nurses' holidays, their recreation ,their convalmence when they are ill ,hotel and club accommodations, equipment, etc.

Thus the graduate nurses in Americs now being enrolled by the Red Cross for war service are assured of splendid working conditions "over there."

In every camp and cantonment in the United States plans are being worked out along the same lines, so that whether she serves at home or abroad the army and navy nurse will be in a desirable environment. The campaign to recruit nurses is being pushed by the Red Cross to keep pace with our rapidly expanding fighting forces. The goal is 5,000 by July 1 and 25,000 by January 1.






