Advice For Housewives About Flour

County Agent B. P. Pattison has the following announcement to make concerning the hot weather use of flours

Hot weather frequently produces pollage in certain flours and meals if they are not properly cared for, especially those which contain a high outer coatings of the grain. To prevent such losses, particularly at this time when bread stuffs are so essential to the allies anad ourselves, the following instructions for the storing of these flours and meals are given:

1. Buy in small quantities. 2. See that flours and meals are in good condition when purchased. Keep in a cool dry place.

Use tins or covered jars for containers, scalded and perfectedly dried. It is well to use two covered con tainers alternately always putting fresh purchases in a clean containers, and never mixing the residue from the previous purchase with the fresh purchase.

4. Sterilize before putting away by placing in shallow pans (or clean cotton containers) in an oven and heating slowly, being careful not to burn ,or even brown. The flour or meal must be in thin layers and stirred frequently so that every part may be equally heated. After cooling, place in clean covered containers.
