(Continued from Page One) will be sufficient reason for withdrawing all deferred classifications. The board will accept as a reasonable excuse for temporary idleness or being engaged in non-productive work—sickness, reasonable vacation, lack of reasonable opportunity to secure essential occupation. If domestic circumstances are such that to change employment would be to work a great hardship to dependents of the registrant by causing the family to move, the board is given the right to excuse said registrant.

Any man known to be in non-productive employment after July 1 will be forwarded a notice by the local board instructing him to appear to submit evidence bearing on reasons for not being engaged in an essential occupation.

There is a great demand for labor in all productive occupations and employments read the instructions to the local boards "and especially in agriculture and other necessary industries. Therefore registrants who have been given deferred classification and who can engage in some productive occupation without substantial financial loss or hardship to themselves or others should be willing to seek some productive occupation or enter the military service rather than remain in an occupation in which they are rendering no effective assistance to the nation.

It will be required that one-half the admission fee to the party be paid in Thrift Stamps and the orchestra, owner of the hall and other paid for their services in connection with the function, will receive one-half their pay in Thrift stamps and the remainder in cash.

(Continued from Page One) the allied flyers in scattering disorder among the fleeing enemy. Another American is reported to have fallen into the hands of the enemy when forced down between the lines. The whole Austrian right was jeopardized tonight by the rushing cavalry and the employment of Austrian reserves in the Piave region is believed impossible.

Italians in West.
As for the western front the Italian forces operating with the French in the protection of Rheims, hold steadfast to Bligny mountain, which the Germans again have attempted to take.

Raids Successful.
In the northern sectors the British and French have carried out successful raids and the Americans have added to their glories today by making the B61st Belleau wholly American. Berlin remains mute tonight. Increased fighting between the Ancre and Avre was noted in the day statement, which also declares that the Germans penetrated Franco-American trenches east of Badon Villers and inflicted heavy losses.
