DR. LINDHOLM GIVES A VIVID BATTLE VIEW

Former North Escanaba Physician Tell of Battle in Which Wisconsin-Michigan Men Take Part.

NOW IN THE HOSPITAL

Lieut. H. O. Lindholm, formerly assistant to Dr. A. B. Kitchen of North Escanaba, is confined to a hospital in France, suffering from mustard gas. A Hun machine gun bullet in his arm and a piece of high explosive in his hand.

A letter from Lieutenant Lindholm telling of his experience, with the Thirty-second division, made up of men from Michigan and Wisconsin, was received by Dr. Kitchen yesterday.

Tells of Battle: The letter is one of the most interesting to come to Escanaba. It follows:

Dear Dr. Kitchen: Greetings. Well at last they have landed me in a hospital. Roosevelt Unit No. 15 of New York, with a pair of mustard gassed lungs and a German machine gun bullet in my arm, besides a piece of high explosive shell in my hand. Oh, this is some game, this war business. Well doctor, I'm glad I'm alive and how I got out of it with whole scalp is more than I can account for. Myself and Capt. Lemon are the only doctors left of the old outfit. Capt. Falk was quite seriously wounded on the second day of the drive, but I lasted nine days before Fritz got me. Tug Wilson was also nipped but will be back to duty in a couple of weeks. Tripelker also is dead. I followed right with my battalion from the Marnes to the Vesle and while in a dressing station in a wine cellar a German 305 landed and got us all, and after being dug out I got a machine gun bullet on top of it all. You know they have gas in their high explosive shells now. Oh its a great life if you don't weaken. People think at home that doctors are safe. Oh yes they are. We were two officers, Dr. Post of Detroit, myself and 11 hospital men and patients when she went up in smoke.

I have been thrown by big shells so many times but that last one sure did shake my nerves. I am quite shaky yet, but hope to get up and at 'em again soon. Shell shock is no fun and I doubt if they will send me back to the line again. The French say there has never been a more terrific artillery bombardment in the history of the war. Believe me Fritz sure caught hell. I have seen the dead in piles of 10 and 20 around machine gun emplacements, especially on the edges of woods where they had placed machine gun troops to cover their retreat. They abandoned guns, ammunition, trains and everything imaginable. When they knew their game was up and our boys almost on top of them they raised their hands and squealed. Kamerad. They gave them Rameard with a bayonet. I was working in a field hospital at the time I of us were sent out to the front to help out as doctors are also expendable you know, and run short. Well we doctors on that drive certainly have done our bit. Most of my best friends have either been killed or wounded so when I get back if I ever do there's no doubt will be an entire new personnel. Our hospitals 15-20 kilometers are shot at night along with long range guns or reise along by boche planes. They have no respect for hospitals but our aviators have. Well I haven't got much more to say this time so will conclude with best wishes from.
