YOUNG BOYS AND OLDER MENEXEMPT

Will Not Be Called With the Remaining Registrants, it was Stated Yesterday by Crowder.

Washington, Sept. 10.-Eighteen ear old boys and men of 37 years and older will not be called in the pext draft. They must register on September 12 with the other between 18 and 45, inclusive, except those already registered or in the service, but they will not receive their questionnaires or be immediately classified. It is not the plan to call to the colors. only those between the ages of 32 and 36 and 19 to 21, all inclusive. The others will not be called until Class one of these groups is exhausted. By that time it is believed that the 18 year old group will have reached the age of 19 years.

These facts were made public today by General Crowder.

Will Speed Draft. The establishment of these two groups was found to be necessary in order to take the most efficient manpower available with the greatest possible speed. The number of men af-

fected is not known. With a total of 13,000,000 men expected under the first sweeping plan, bringing more than 60 head of the to be registered and classified by the local draft boards, it seem well nigh hopeless that these organizations could finish the job before they are needed in the training camps.
