# Germany's Terms

By Count Roon

Germany is entitled to the following terms because of its strength, and until they are realized there should be no armistice:

Annexation of Belgium. Annexation of the entire Flanders coast, including Calais. Annexation of the Briey and Longwy basins and the Toul, Belfort and Verdun regions eastward.

Restitution to Germany of all her Colonies, including Kiaochow.

Great Britain must cede to Germany such naval bases and coaing stations as Germany designates.

Great Britain must give Gibraltar to Spain, cede its war fleet to German, give Egypt and the Suez Canal to Turkey.


Greece must be re-established under former King Constantine, with frontiers as before the wat-

Austria and Bulgaria will divide Serbia and Montenegro.

Great Britain, France, and the United States must pay all of Germany's war costs, the indemnity being a minimum of \$45,000,000,000.

They must also agree to deliver raw materials

France and Belgium must remain occupied at their expense until these conditions are carried

GASOLINE AS DANGEROUS AS DYNAMITE

> Many automobile owners do not fuly realize the danger connected with the careless handling of gaseline. In a general way they recognize the explosive power of the liquid, but few of them know how great that explosive power is. A writer in one of the magazines devoted to the automobile trade impressive by comparing the explodynamite He points to the fact that gasoline even at low temperature, con" stantly develops an explosive vapor. Five gallons of gasoline will generate 8,000 cubic feet of gas, which, if ignited, expands 4,000 times. One gallon of gasoline, properly mixed with air and compressed, is equal to about 8' pounds of dynamite in explosive force. What makes gasoline particularly dangerous is the fact that it is more rapidly ignited and exploded han dynamite. One can never be too careful in handling gasoline under any and all circumstances.


