

Secretary Daniels declined to comment on Mr. Rathon's charges, declaring that he did not desire to make a datement until he was more familiar with the allegations.

Assistant Secretary Roosevelt shid that the special board of inquiry appointed by the Judge Advocate General of the navy two weeks ago had power to inquire into methods of naval intelligent officers in securing evidence against persons suspicioned of moral delinguency.

Secretary Daniels also declined to discuss the assertions attributed to General Wood, saying that if any one wished "to put him on oath and let him tell what he knows about the navy, he might be called before the committee and he can explain his expert knowledge."

Entering a general denial of the Sims charges against the navy department Secretary Daniels declared that the matter has gone so far that unless the charges are proved at the investigation, to the satisfaction of the American people an inquiry will be made Ly a naval board.

### Not In Command.

The secretary emphasized that Admiral Sims was not commander in chief of the American naval forces overseas and was subordinate to Admiral Mayo as commander of the Atlantic fleet and to Admiral Benaon, chief of naval operations.' He said Admiral Sims' duty was to make recommendations to the department and then to obey orders issued.

Mr. Daniels indicated that there were frequent clashes between the department and Admiral Sims because destroyers were not withdrawn from

were laid hare the country would be proud of the navy's war record. Mr. Daniels said Admiral Sims must be required "to establish every criticism he has made of the department."







His friends say that inasmuch as the league has not to Ride Street Cars been accepted by the United States he did not feel he could continue. Mr. Fosdick announced his resignation in a cablegram to Sir Erick

Drummond, secretary general. Fosdick is a young lawyer who attacked national attention during the term of Mayor Gaynor in New York city by the manner in which he investigated municipal finances. In the war he was chairman of the commission on training camp activities and was appointed an under secretary of the League of Nations last May.

He represented the League at the International Labor Conference in Washington last November.

With Sir Erick and Juan Monet, the French under secretary general. he was a member of the cabinet of the league. Under the general direction of the three, a staff of experts has been working on plans for disarmsment mandates, protection of minorites, a court of international justice and other instruments provided by the league covenant. Mr. Fosdick will return to the
