 The press report Sunday of his speech was based on what purported to be a stenographic copy of his remarks. An examination of the stenographer's notes shows that he recorded the general as saying:
 "I do not think we want a large regular army. I am very much opposed to it. We only want a large enough army to police the nation in times of peace. We need a navy. All that we have now is not a navy; it is a floating death trap. We want a good navy with highly trained men and good ships. They are an active force for peace. We want to build up a good merchant marine. We want this for our commerce and our navy. Back of that comes the big military force of the nation which means the people of the nation."

FINANCIERS IN BIG CONFERENCE START TO WORK

Meet Bankers of United States in Informal Talks.

Washington, Jan. 19.—Financiers of the Pan-American republics today discussed how they could best promote the mutual welfare of the nations they represent.

Drawn together, as President Wilson said in a message of welcome, "by no selfish purpose but solely to ascertain how they might serve one another," the delegates to the second Pan-American financial congress, including the ministers of finance of several countries, began their work by reaffirming the solidarity of the American ideals of peace and justice. Cooperation was pledged for the development of the great natural resources of the two continents, which, it was pointed out, would rebound to the advantage not only of the Pan-American nations, but of the world.

Secretary Glass presided at the opening session at which the delegates heard the message of President Wilson, addresses by Secretary Lansing and John Barrett, director general of the Pan-American union and responses by a member of each visiting delegation. After an informal luncheon the delegates separated into national groups for conferences with prominent bankers of the United States to consider specific problems of transportation, exchange, commercial credits and other phases of international dealings.

CLAIMS FLYERS NOT MURDERED

Mexico City, Jan. 19.—The American aviators Connelly and Waterhouse, who met death at Las Animas, Lower California, were not killed by Mexicans, according to the report of the judge of the primary court of claims at Ensenada, L. C., just received in the capital. The judge asserts they died from thirst and hunger, that no wounds were found on their bodies and that messages scrawled on the wings of their plane told of their slow deaths from exposure.

Berliners Pay More to Ride Street Cars

Berlin, Jan. 19.—When the surface car lines of Berlin were taken over by the municipality last summer many persons looked for a decrease in fares. Instead the fares now have been advanced to 30 pfennigs, an increase of ten.

British Army Heads Will Rescue Trucks

London, Jan. 19.—Large numbers of derelict army trucks now rusting where they were abandoned in shell-swept areas in France are to be "rescued" and brought back to England by the ministry of transport.

ALL ARE TAKEN ABOARD BRITISH LINER CEDRIC

Rescue Ends Thrilling Experience by Americans on Powatan.

BULLETIN.
 Boston, Jan. 19. (By the Associated Press)—The white star line Sedic, reported by radio tonight that she had taken off the passengers from the transport Powatan, disabled 200 miles off Halifax and was bringing them in. The Sedic is bound from Liverpool to New York.

IN BAD FLIGHT.
 New York, Jan. 19.—Lightless and heatless, with her engines dead as the result of a leak which flooded her boilers, the army transport Powatan, which left Friday for Antwerp is struggling tonight in a storm swept sea, 200 miles southeast of Halifax. Aboard are 271 army and civil passengers including 11 women and eight children and a crew of 200 men. Wireless S. O. S. calls sent out late Sunday telling of the vessel's plight have brought about her a half dozen or more steamers ready to give aid. Waiting at Halifax and other ports are tugs and destroyers with steam up ready to put to sea if they are needed.

Leak Controlled.
 Late wireless advices say that the leak has been controlled. The White Star Liner Sedic, one of the vessels to answer the distress call is standing by waiting for the weather to moderate so that the passengers can be taken off while the British Steamer Haptic and other ships are ready to take the transport in tow to assist her into Halifax, the nearest port. A message late today from Captain Randall of the transport said that the barometer was rising indicating the passing of the storm and he said that all was well with the passengers aside from their discomfort.

The majority of the women and children are relatives of army officers or of the civilians detailed to prepare for the return of soldiers dead from abroad.

The army force, as shown by the records here, consists of four officers and 178 men and the civilian passenger list has 88 names.

FOSDICK QUILTS AS OFFICIAL OF WORLD LEAGUE

Delay in Acceptance Here Is Given as His Reason.

Washington, Jan. 19. (By the Associated Press)—Raymond B. Fosdick under secretary general of the League of Nations and American representative in the league machinery so far, has resigned. His friends say that inasmuch as the league has not been accepted by the United States he did not feel he could continue.

Mr. Fosdick announced his resignation in a cablegram to Sir Erik Drummond, secretary general. Fosdick is a young lawyer who attracted national attention during the term of Mayor Gaynor in New York city by the manner in which he investigated municipal finances. In the war he was chairman of the commission on training camp activities and was appointed an under secretary of the League of Nations last May.

He represented the League at the International Labor Conference in Washington last November. With Sir Erik and Juan Monet, the French under secretary general, he was a member of the cabinet of the league. Under the general direction of the three, a staff of experts has been working on plans for disarmament mandates, protection of minorities, a court of international justice and other instruments provided by the league covenant.

Mr. Fosdick will return to the practice of law in New York.

COURT TO PASS ON DRY MEASURE

Washington, Jan. 19.—The supreme court today decided to pass on the validity of both the federal prohibition amendment which became operative last Saturday and the act of congress prescribing the manner of its enforcement. The decision will be rendered in the case brought by the state of Rhode Island. Solicitor General King announced that he would immediately file a motion asking for dismissal of the Rhode Island case on the ground that the court lacked jurisdiction.








NATIONS FORGOT CHRIST, BISHOP HARRIS ASSERTS

Disaster Comes When Christianity Is Discarded.

"Russia in its days of splendor, with no thought of Christ, sowed the wind and reaped the whirlwind of Bolshevism." Bishop Harris declared Sunday in a masterful sermon in St. Stephen's Episcopal church. "Germany, whose streets are now filled with blood; Austria without secure government; France wondering 'what next' England uncertain and America, owing to political party strife, failing to utter to the world, an effective word of leadership—all the result of a lack of God consciousness, a failure to think in life in the terms Christ values them."

Bishop Harris' text was "What Think Ye of Christ?" and he spoke with an impressive earnestness and eloquence. The church was beautifully decorated in honor of his visit with the congregation and the building was filled.

At the service, a class of fourteen was presented for confirmation by Archdeacon Wilderand the bishop expressed himself as well pleased with the remarkable growth the congregation is making.

In the sermon, the bishop said: "Men are being forced to understand that the menaces of this day can only be thwarted by a practical

judgment of life by thinking of Christ. What a nation thinks of Christ is the measure of your own soul. What you think of Him becomes the terms of your daily life and it's your daily living that writes in the very fibre of your character the destiny of your soul. And the world knows your answer—you may hide it from your own eyes, you may cheat your own soul, but your life is read—and your life is what tells the story of what you really think of Christ."
