Gladys Cooper Most Beautiful Actress in The British Isles

Gladys Cooper is heralded as the most beautiful actress in England.

I believe she is. I saw her clad in a simple blue silk nightgown, her blond hair, with its natural wave, hanging loose about her exquisitely modeled shoulders.

She was propped up in bed, for I called early in the morning. Yet, without makeup or artifice, she was one of the most perfect things I've ever seen.

First Hours Hardest. The first hours are the hardest, as every woman knows. One who is beautiful before breakfast need not worry about the rest of the day.

Her secrets? Hard work, country life, a youthful spirit! She has played continuously in London for three years without a vacation, but she always lives in the country, is devoted to riding and hiking in the English fog to rose gardens and to home cooking.

She believes city life ruins a woman's freshness. "But why," she asks, "do you Americans concern yourselves so entirely with beauty of face? I find a woman's style, chic, person-

ality, vivacity, the things she has cultivated for herself, indefinitely more interesting.

Figure Most Important. "A beautiful figure is more to be desired than a perfect profile. In France they judge a woman by her appearance from the tips of her toes to the top of her head. I do that, instinctively. Faces don't interest me, aside from what they contribute to the whole effect."

Miss Cooper holds that plain women can cultivate beauty. "I mean," she explains, "that beauty is merely the emphasizing of the distinctive things about one's self."

To cultivate beauty, I should say, cultivate yourself and your mentality. Then progress along your own particular line. Distinction is bound to come.

All Can Excel. "Have you noticed the differences in children? Some are lovely, individual, charming. Others are just plain, drab things. The drab ones could be just as beautiful as the others if someone took the pains to fix them up and cultivate them."

That's all I see to beauty—or charm—or whatever it is that makes a woman admired—just the knowledge of how to find your type and bring yourself up in it."

Miss Cooper came to America for just a week, in the hope of finding a play to take back to London for production.

Miss Ruby Register, of Dallas, Texas, has been elected to honorary membership in the National Association of Practical Refrigerating Engineers, being the only woman upon whom this honor has been conferred.

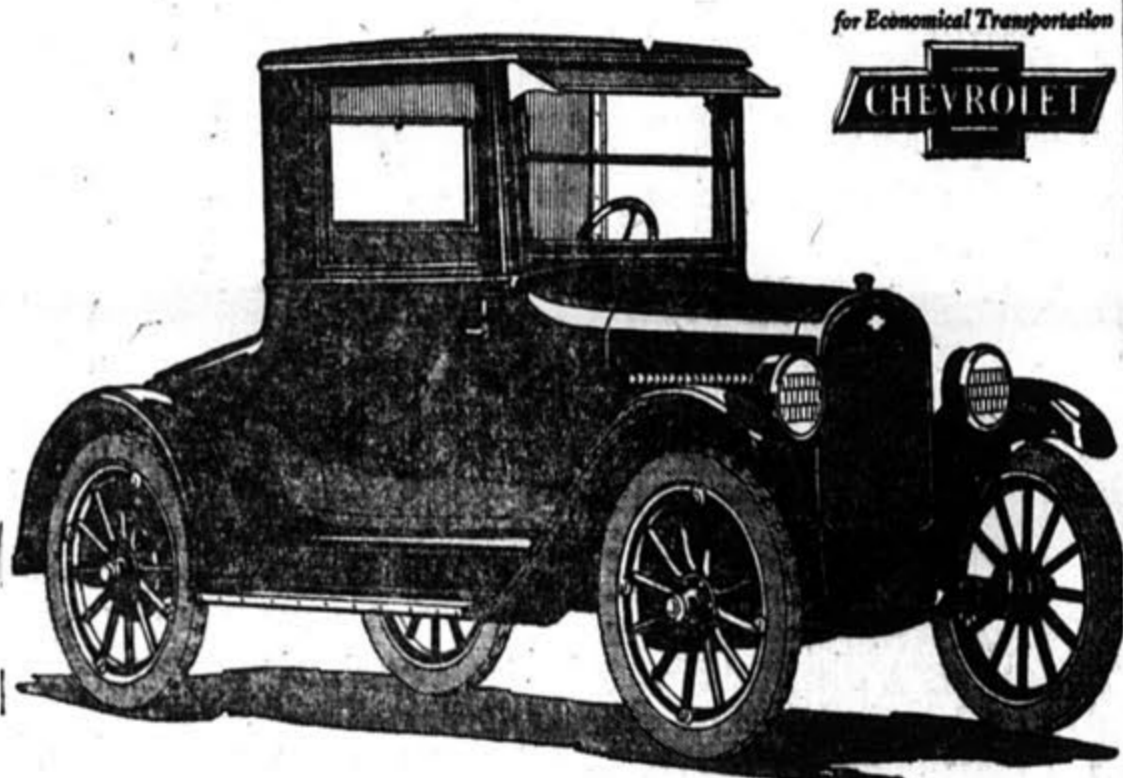

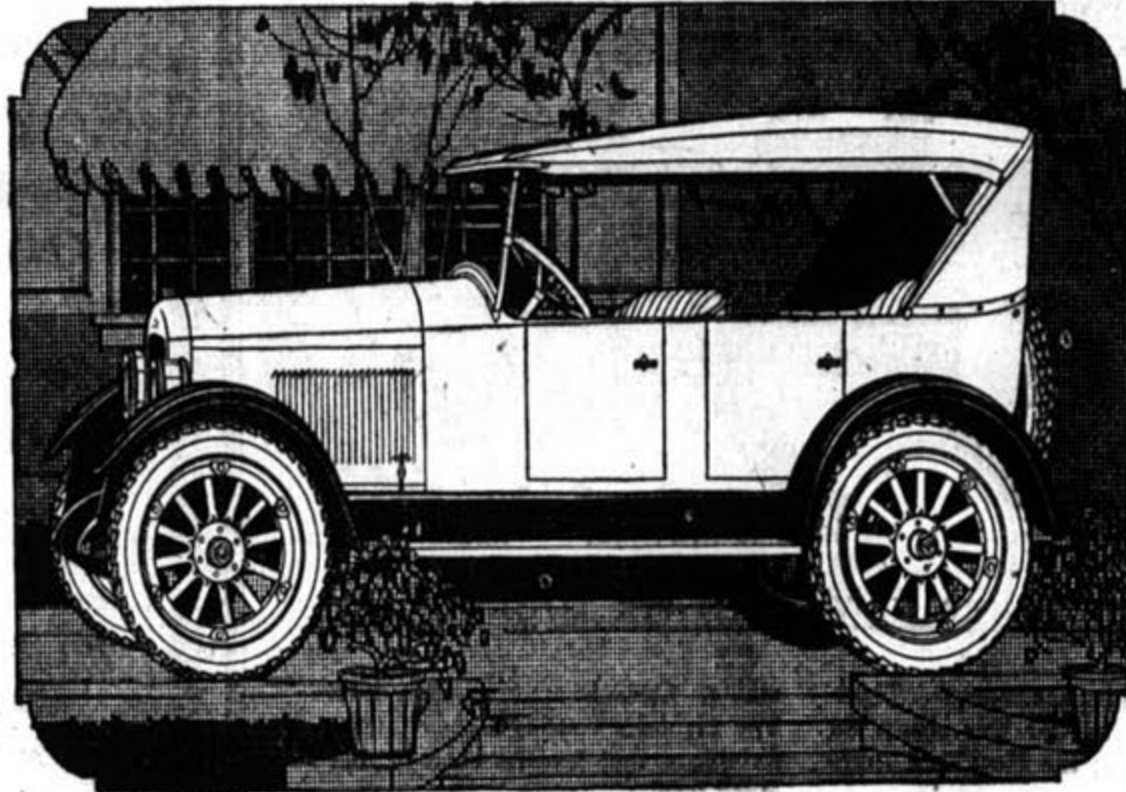

FIRST TYPEWRITER.

The typewriter is not a distinctly modern invention. So long ago as 1714 a patent was taken out in England by Henry Mill for a "machine for impressing letters singly and progressively as in writing, whereby all writings may be ingrossed in paper so exact as not to be distinguished from print."

The machine was very clumsy and practically useless, however. It was not until more than a century later (1829) that anything more was attempted. Then the first American typewriter, called a "typographer," was patented by W. A. Burt. In 1873 C. L. Sholes, an American, after five or six years' work, succeeded in producing a machine sufficiently perfect to warrant extensive manufacture.

He interested E. Remington & Sons, the gun manufacturers, in it, and in 1874 the first model of the modern typewriter was put upon the market.

PASSING OF ALMANACS.

There are almanacs, nowadays, but they are sad travesties on the almanacs of old. Almanacs were the best sellers of the Sixteenth and Seventeenth centuries. Astrologers were all-powerful then, and their products were sought and accepted. Almanacs grew important because of their prognostications.

As time passed, almanacs became a fruitful source for the shafts of wits, even as they were in later days. Astrologers were unmercifully ridiculed, and their prophecies, most of them extravagant and futile, were made the butt of jokes and were trampled. The stationers, taking a hint and veering their course into the tide of public opinion, promptly issued almanacs without prophecies to suit the taste of the skeptics.

But, at the same time, they published another edition, in which predictions to suit the demands of the most credulous were proudly arrayed.

Most famous of all, perhaps, in America, was Benjamin Franklin's "Poor Richard's Almanac," begun in 1732 and continued by him for about 25 years. Poor Richard's maxims have become household words.

GERMANS HAVE LOTS OF CASH IN THE SOUTH

Latin Representatives of German Firms Are Not Broke.

BY CHARLES P. STEWART. Poverty stricken as Germans may be at home, it's worth considering that there are a few parts of the world where they ended the war with more actual "cash money" than almost anybody.

True, so many countries were aligned against the central powers that there were not many where their assets, liquid and otherwise, were very safe from alien property custodians. Still, there were a few, notably in South America.

Argentina and Chile remained neutral to the end, if not a trifle pro-German in their sympathies. Brazil joined the allies and seized German ships in her waters, but never interfered with her German residents' private holdings.

Now, Germans were and are very numerous in all these countries and owned a great deal in all of them.

Barrels of Money. If they could have done so, no doubt they would have realized heavily and sent the money home to be used against the allies, but they couldn't get it across the ocean. Consequently it piled up in banks in Buenos Aires, Rosario, Santiago de Chile, Valparaiso, Rio de Janeiro, Porto Alegre and other cities until they were fairly bursting with it.

Throughout the whole period of huge war profits, with the allied subjects financially pinched by demands from their native countries, the Germans had these vast sums to operate with. The black list was supposed to cripple them, but there were precious few Germans who couldn't find neutral firms to trade through.

Finally the armistice and the ensuing business depression found the allies, on the one hand, in many cases hard put to it even to last through the hard times, and the Germans, on the other, simply rolling in ready cash with which to gobble up every bargain that the money crisis soon forced into the market in endless numbers.

Cash Right at Hand. Today, in finance, Germans are far stronger in South America than ever before. Not the least of their advantages is that, when a Latin-American government or enterprise wants some accommodation, the Germans don't have to refer the proposition to the home country. If they care to handle it, they have the resources right at hand. It wouldn't be surprising if, on a showdown, theirs would prove to be the most influential single foreign interest on the southern continent.

Just what it amounts to in cash it's impossible to say, but there's no doubt it runs high into the hundreds of millions—enough to pay reparations for quite a while, if it were possible to get at it.

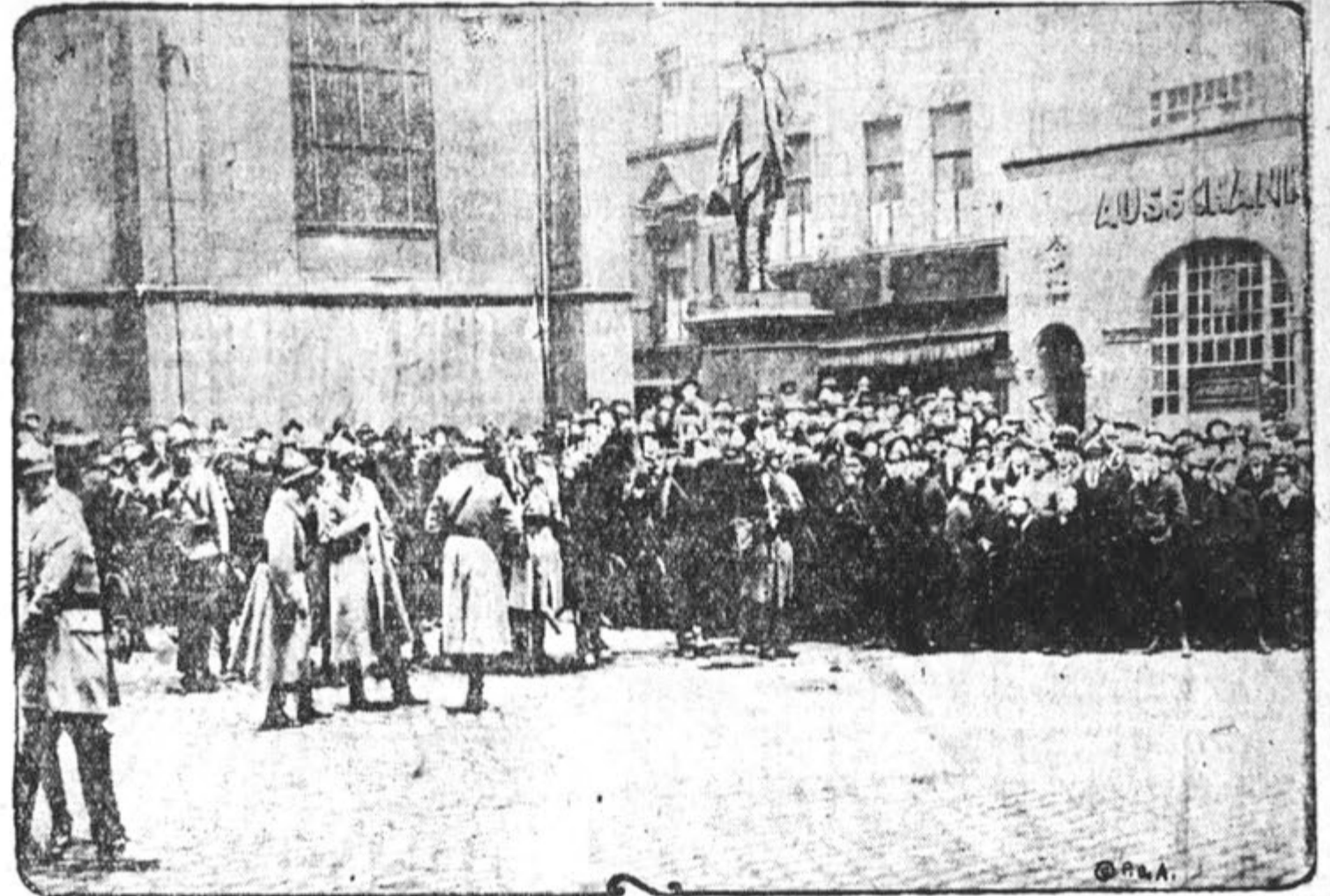
