Iron Trade Review

Cleveland, Ohio, April 19.—Iron Trade Review today says:

Demands for steel continue to converge upon the mills in flood-tide and the shading off of buying in recent weeks has brought no relief to hard-pressed producers.

The big problem remains the satisfaction of all requirements as desired which has become a practically impossible task with the present shortage of material...

Production has been driven a step higher under the intensified pressure from consumers. The Carnegie Steel Co. probably will average 95 percent of total steel ingot output this week.

High pressure from steel supplies is being exerted by the automobile industry to maintain its present amazing rate of production.

Recent purchases of semifinished steel by Steel corporation subsidiaries have taken a large tonnage out of the market and it is estimated the general shortage of material among the mills at present reaches 300,000 to 400,000 tons.

Western railroads which have been seeking about 250,000 tons of additional rails for this year's delivery have succeeded in getting Chicago producers to accept some of the tonnage at \$43. mill, the old price.

The Central of New Jersey has asked tentative bids on 25,000 tons for a new bridge over Newark bay.

The general market still is moving up a little each week as shown by Iron Trade Review composite of fourteen leading iron and steel products which is up to \$47.15.

The business congress will continue for a period of five days. 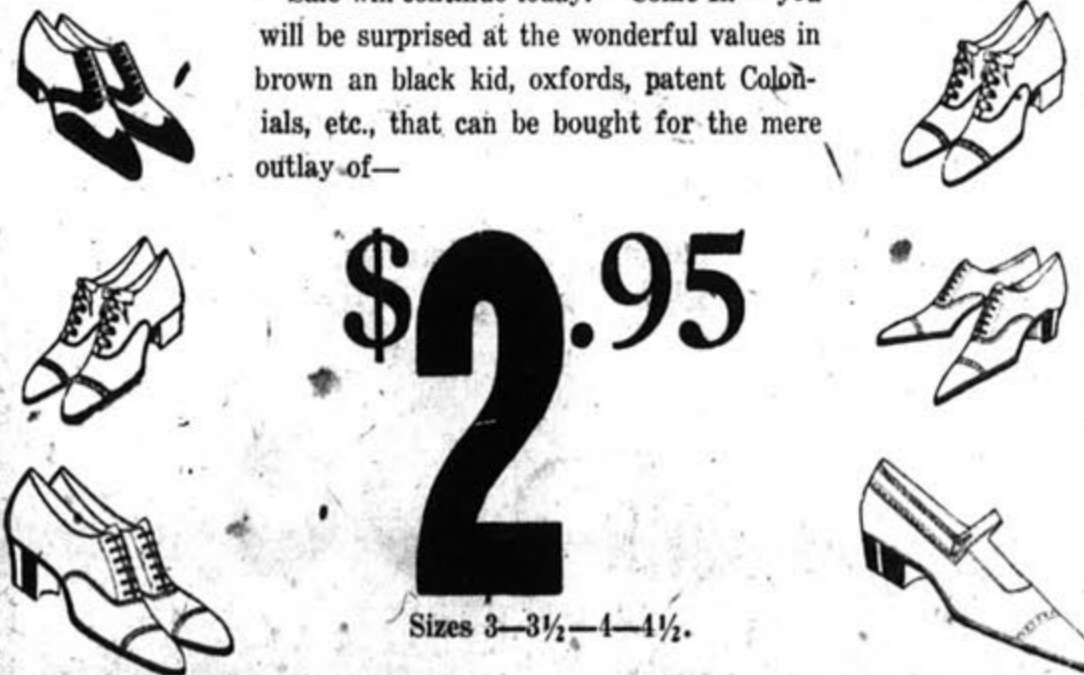

JEWISH HOSPITAL HAS DISCOVERY TO BALK DISEASE

Dioxide of Carbonic Acid Gas Arrests T. B. C. Development.

Local Jews who are interested in the National Jewish Hospital with leaders of the medical profession in praising the report which has just been issued by the Research Department of the Hospital, which offers valuable contributions to the knowledge and treatment of tuberculosis. Particular interest centered about the announcement that was made by Dr. H. J. Corper who is head of the Research Department at the hospital, that he had proven experimentally that carbon dioxide or carbonic acid gas, has an inhibitory effect on the growth of tuberculous bacilli, and it is hoped that when it is

possible to supplement the sufferer's normal supply of this gas, created by combustion in his own body, the progress of the disease will be arrested. Medical authorities are enthusiastic and have declared that the experiments and discoveries with carbon dioxide may furnish the clue which will lead to that goal for which scientists have searched many years—a chemical cure for tuberculosis.

Makes Valuable Additions.

The Hospital Research Laboratory in its report has also made valuable additions to the methods of treatment of tuberculosis. It has declared that postural, or of great importance in checking hemorrhages from the lungs of a tuberculous sufferer. Ordinarily blood containing tubercle bacilli is carried from diseased lungs to healthy lungs during hemorrhages. This can be prevented, and blood can itself be checked, and bacilli found, by proper adaptation of posture. They also discovered that the injection of oils as a means of curing consumption is dangerous in that it has a tendency to produce bronchial pneumonia.

An addition to the symptoms by which tuberculosis can be diagnosed, was also made by the hospital. They discovered in many of

the patients under treatment for the disease the presence of a hard bony nodule on the hard palate. This had never before been noted by medical men among the diagnostic symptoms of the white plague. It is now being generally accepted by them as a contribution to the knowledge of the disease and its detection.

Experts in Charge.

Research work at the hospital is done by a staff of specialists under the direction of Dr. Corper and Dr. Robert Levy of Denver, and a national research board of directors which includes Dr. Alfred Meyer, lung specialist of Mt. Sinai Hospital, New York, Dr. John F. Anderson of New Brunswick, Dr. Paul A. Lewis, secretary of the Henry Phipps Institute, Philadelphia, Dr. S. S. Goldwater, Mt. Sinai Hospital, New York, Dr. F. S. Mandelbaum, Mt. Sinai Hospital, New York, and Dr. H. J. Corper of Denver. The work was made possible by a special gift to the hospital, which enabled Dr. Corper and his staff to undertake it for a five year period which terminates in 1924. The possibility of continuing and expanding this important work will be discussed at the subscribers convention.

search board, in discussing the work of the men who in the laboratory at Denver are trying to find a chemical cure for the white plague, was most optimistic. "This work has been carried on along faithful painstaking lines, by men who have the imagination as well as the knowledge and the patience to turn visions into achievements," he said. "A medical discovery, you must understand, hangs fire for many years before its value can actually be proven. Some one must follow along the countless blind alleys, must check up results unendingly. Forlich had discarded 605 fruitless experiments before he found that the 606th experiment had proven that salvarsan would cure the malignant blood disease for which he was seeking a panacea. While it would be premature to say today just what we may expect from our experiments with carbonic acid gas, nevertheless we know that an important contribution has hereby been made to the knowledge of tuberculosis."

The National Jewish Hospital for Consumptives was the first free tuberculosis sanitarium in America, and during its twenty-four years of existence has cared for more than four thousand patients from all parts of the United

States. The achievements of the hospital and plans for its future progress will be discussed at the subscribers convention at Denver on June 22, to which Mr. Manny Strass, of New York, chairman of this convention, is inviting the hospital's thousands of sufferers.

NEA Service Staff Correspondent. London, April 20.—Imagine the wife of one of the Vanderbilts or Rockefeller's joining an American Labor Party whose leaders preached nationalization of land, mines and railways, and a capital levy upon big fortunes in order to wipe out war debts.

And you can get some idea of the beautiful Countess of Warwick becoming one of the most ardent supporters of the British Labor Party. To help the party she has offered her splendid home "Easton Lodge," in Sussex, as a place where the parliamentary leaders of the Laborites may spend week-ends to recuperate and to confer.

The granddaughter of Viscount Maynard, she is the wife of the Earl of Warwick, who holds some of the oldest and proudest of British titles of nobility. He is the owner of the famous Warwick Castle, which for some years has been leased to an American. The countess owns 23,000 acres of land in her own name.

I was curious to learn at first hand why a woman who by birth and wealth belonged to the most exclusive of British aristocracy, had become an active member of the party whose rank and file is made up of the British toilers.

She replied quite simply and unaffectedly:

"I have belonged to the Labor Party for as many years as it has existed, so that the discovery of my views is hardly new. I am glad to be working with those who are treating with serious consideration and more adequate grappling the pressing problems of our time. With such a combination of talent and earnestness they have shamed other political parties."

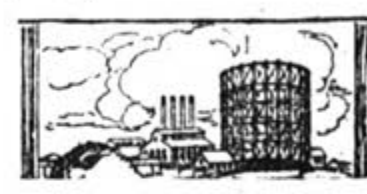

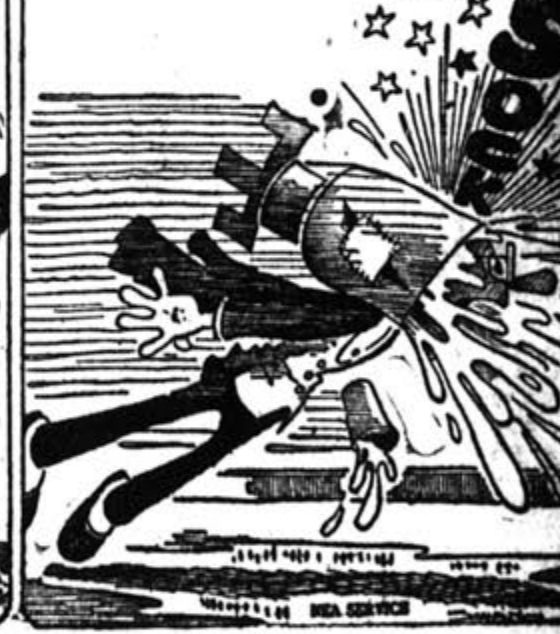

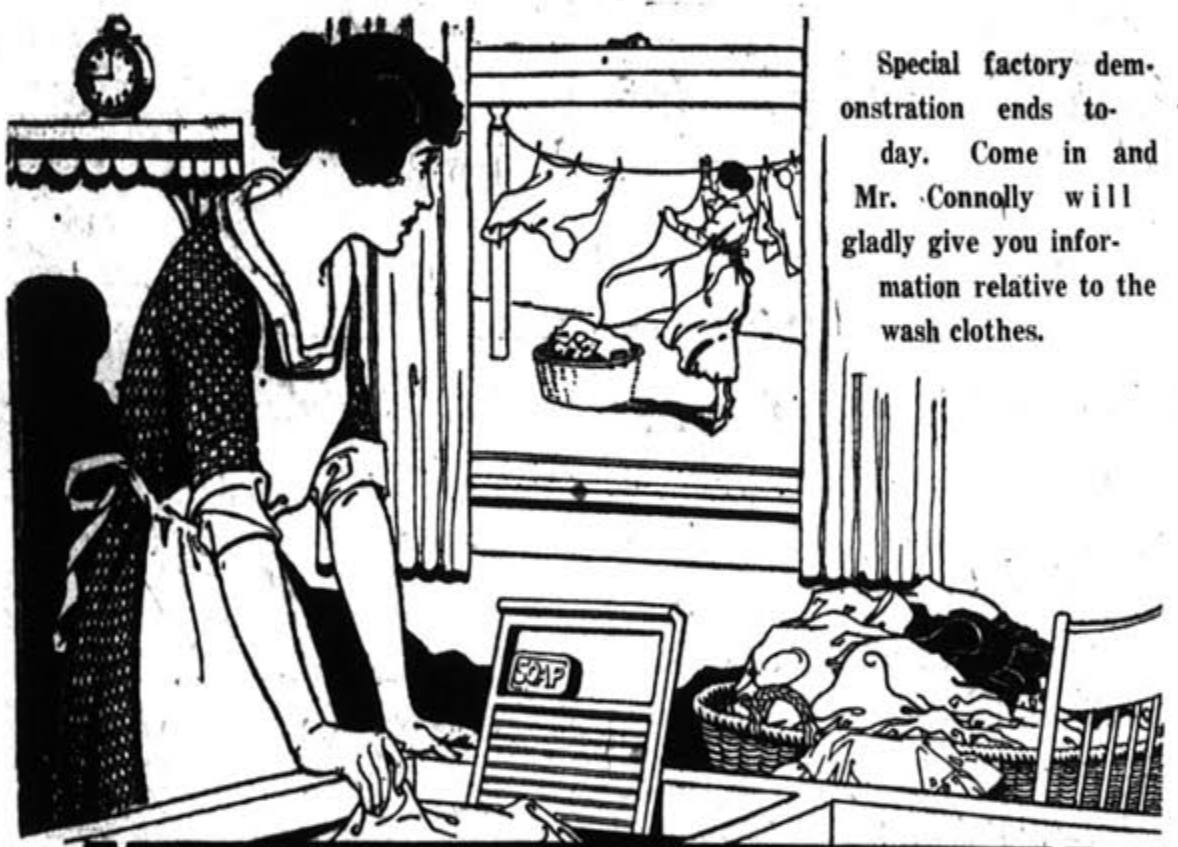
LUMBER MARKET IS FIRING UP

The approach of warmer weather, bringing an increase in outdoor activities, has resulted in a general firming up of the lumber market, says the American Lumberman, Chicago. The larger mills hold strongly to their lists and refuse the many offers of orders of lower prices now being made. The smaller mills, which recently shaded the market somewhat, are reported to be swinging into line. Good transit cars are selling readily and have strengthened in price. However, few transits offered on the present market contain desirable assortments of staples, their make up explaining the sacrifices which sometimes are made when the cars reach demurrage points. Country retailers are coming into the market on a larger scale, but trade with the city yards as a whole remains dull. One reason is that many of them are overloaded with stock, much of which is sold, to be delivered as soon as fair weather permits the different jobs to get under way. Unsold stock on hand is low nearly everywhere, and retailers admit that after they have begun delivering their sold material they will have to buy extensively for replenishment. Another reason is that many dealers have enough material for immediate needs and, while they realize that they will have to have much additional stock this spring, they do not expect lower nor materially higher prices and are therefore not in a hurry to buy at mill quotations. Meanwhile they are watching the market keenly among distributors is strong that a few days of better weather will cause a considerable spurt in retail demand. Industrial trade in softwoods is excellent, being featured by a big demand for railroad and oil well materials. Business in hardwoods is reported comparatively dull, but excepting some weakness in gum and oak the market remains very strong. Dry stocks are so scarce, and green lumber is so largely covered with orders for immediate or deferred

shipment, that there is no likelihood of a material weakening in the hardwood market even should demand be considerably reduced as compared with its volume during the early weeks of this year. Production of both southern pine and hardwoods continues to be restricted by heavy rains and ments in the case of the former are increasing. Output of Douglas fir remains heavy, but all efforts of the mill to increase it to the level of orders and shipments appear unavailing. 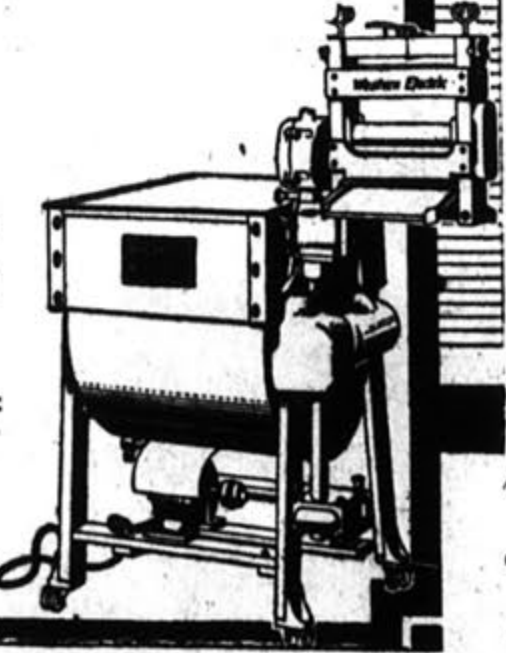
