with the internal telegraph distribution system of France and Great Britain as well as Germany and will cover the European continent in time with other connections. In America, it has affiliated itself with the Postal Telegraph company which forwards or distributes most of the radiograms received or sent to coast stations.

No Aliens Wanted. The fight for American control and operation of foreign communications had its reflex in the controversy over cables and it was not until certain British connections of the Western Union gave up monopolies which were said to have discriminated against American cable companies in South America, that official permission was given by the United States government for the landing of new cables on the Florida coast connecting this country and South America. Most of the cable lines of the world are British-owned or British-controlled. The radio business lends itself to foreign domination because of the natural connections that must be formed with various countries of the world but the step taken by General Harbord means that while the radio corporation will not discriminate against foreign countries, its operations from within will be entirely Americanized and no one who is not a citizen will be hired except by special permission from General Harbord himself.

SLAB AVERAGE SYSTEM ISN'T ALWAYS FAIR

Chicago.—Who gets credit for winning the ball game? That is the college yell of fandom any time some relief pitcher is sent into the game with an unusual situation existing and emerges the victor. Oftentimes it seems that the relief pitcher is credited with a win when the twirler he pitched for should get the credit.

In piling up a winning streak a pitcher often gets many breaks to help his record. Last year Eddie Rommel turned in one of the most remarkable pitching feats in the history of the sport, winning 27 games with a seventh place club.

In order to make such a record Rommel was favored with the breaks. He scored perhaps 10 wins in games in which he acted as relief pitcher, often pitching but an inning or two to get the credit for winning the game.

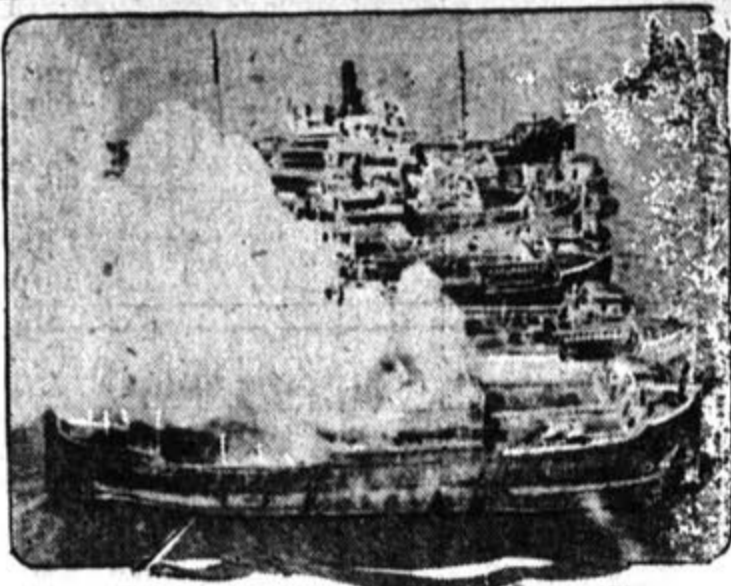
There is no intent to detract from Rommel's great work, simply a desire to show how easy a pitcher often wins to make up for some of his tough defeats.

It is questionable if any pitcher won a peculiar victory as did Cliff Markle of the Cincinnati club last season. He pitched only one ball, yet received credit for the victory.

The Standard Oil companies of New Jersey, New York, Louisiana and the Texas Company and Gulf Refining company announce the price changes. No announcement was made of charges of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana.

Aberdeen, S. D., April 27.—William Etcheon Gibsty, age 103, last February 18, reputed to be the oldest living man in the state and the oldest member of the Masonic order in the country, died at his home here tonight, after a short illness.

Oil Refining Plant Destroyed by Fire

Hammond, Ind., April 27.—The Martin Oil and Refining Company's plant just beyond the city limits was destroyed by fire today with an estimated loss of \$150,000. The blaze was caused by the explosion of gas in an oil furnace. No lives were lost.

Iron Trade Rev'ew

Cleveland, Ohio, April 27.—Iron Trade Review yesterday says: Another round of price advances in steel products the past week by leading producers has further marked the underlying strength of the situation and arises from the heavy accumulations of old business rather than from the force of new buying.

New business has continued to run in a quieter channel. The mills are as hard pressed as ever, however, to keep customers in needed supplies of steel.

Chicago reports operations of consumers are being held below what their business warrants by the lack of material. Actually, consumption is on the increase in that territory and a little gain in production the past week has been immediately absorbed.

Extended deliveries on steel are causing some contraction of the equipment market since the railroads find that cars placed now would not be available when most needed in the fall.

Outstanding among a revival of new inquiry and awards for plate work and tankage principally from oil companies, is the Hetch Hetchy pipe line and penstock at San Francisco involving 25,000 tons now up for bids.

A new high point was touched this week by Iron Trade Review composite of fourteen leading iron and steel products due to advances in finished steel while pig iron remained stationary.

A slow market persists in pig iron. Neither buyers or sellers are inclined to push third quarter business at this time. Prices are well maintained.

Lake ore operators and shippers will derive little benefit from the final settlement of the litigation brought against the readers for a reduction of the rates on iron ore from the Lake Superior mines to upper lake ports.
