Iron Trade Review

Cleveland, Ohio, May 31—Iron Trade Review today says: A better feeling has characterized the iron and steel market during the past week and the recent tendency shown by both buyers and sellers towards uncertainty and distrust appears to have been definitely arrested. While inquiry has been better in spots, conservative policies of buying are strongly in effect and new business is held to a very limited volume. The view is generally held, however, that with improved sentiment, a resumption of new commitments on a substantial scale may be expected before many weeks since consumption, from all tests, is being maintained at high speed. Some signs of the expected seasonal letup in the automobile industry relate more to parts demand than to finished cars in which production is maintained at a record rate. Last half production schedules of some builders call for two-thirds of the first-half total. The smallest total in structural steel awards since last September is reported this week. It is only 7442 tons. April exports total 183,995 tons, the largest since June last year. Steel prices make a show of greater stability. One of the independent mills which recently sold a tonnage of black sheets \$2 under the Steel corporation schedule, has restored the latter level. Premiums continue to come off of the early plate and structural shape market. One independent mill is offering early steel bars at 2.50c. Pittsburgh and 2,000 tons were sold at prices at Chicago. Softness in pig iron has forced another slight recession \$47.25 in the single market opposite of Iron Trade Review's spring fourteen leading iron and steel products. The decline in the past three weeks is 46c ton. Settlement of the year's marketing agreement between the iron and the Amalgamated associations will give the tin mill and house workers an advance of 10 to 11 per cent. The sheet steel is unchanged. As consumption runs ahead heavily buyers in a slight way are showing more interest in third quarter pig iron. Sell it the Classified way.

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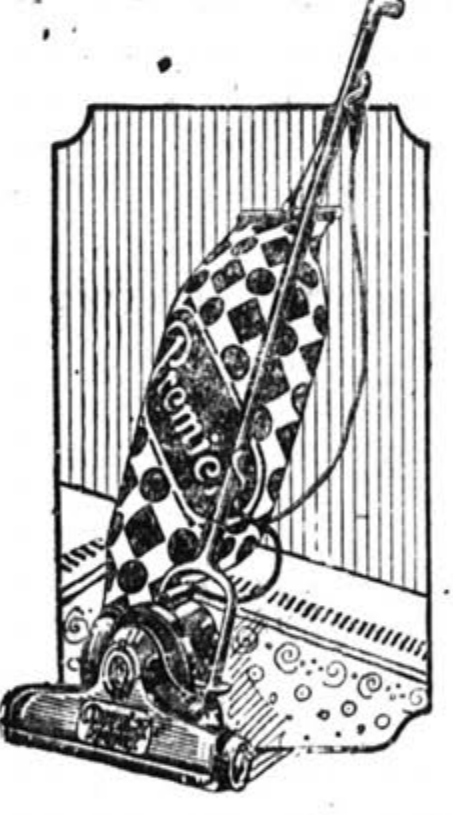
