### ESCANABA MAN OUT ON BONDS IN AUTO DEATH

Hearing has been set for Tuesday, Sept. 25, before Judge Barstow in Municipal court at Menominee in the case of Herman Fenske, Escanaba contractor, charged with negligent homicide as the result of an auto accident at Menominee early Saturday night when Miss Belle Lemieux of Menominee was run down and killed by a car driven by the Escanaba man.

The accident took place at Ogden avenue and Bridge street in Menominee early Saturday night. Miss Lemieux and Miss Lida Wright, a companion, were crossing the street when the Fenske machine swung onto Ogden avenue from Bridge street.

When overtaken, Fenske disclaimed all knowledge that there had been an accident. He surrendered to the police without protest, apparently hard hit by the shock of the death he had unwittingly caused. He was held and was released on Sunday upon furnishing the \$5,000 bond required for his appearance at the hearing.

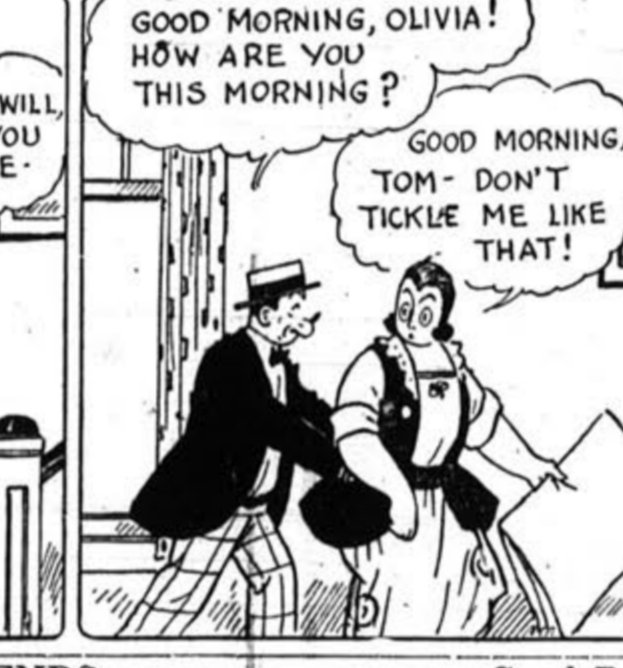
