What The Boy Scout Movement Is And Means To The Nation

IS NOW IN ITS **SIXTEENTH YEAR** OF DOING GOOD

Begins in England in 1908 By Sir Baden-

Powell.

By NEA Service. Whahington --- Organized for the training of boys between 12 and 18 in self-reliance, manhood and good citizenship, the Boy Scout movement was begun in England in 1908 by General Sir Robert S. S. Baden-Powell.

Sir Robert was impressed by the fact, that 45 per cent of the boys in England were growing up without any knowledge of useful cupations. His idea of organizthese boys at once received popular support, and within two and one-half years after the movement started, 150,000 boys had been enrolled.

United States Joints.

At this time there were two organizations in the United States, both of which were founded for the general purpose of character-building among boys. One founded by Ernest Thomp-son Seton, was called Woodcraft Indians; the other, founded by Dan C. Beard, was named the Sons of Daniel Boone. In 1910 both merged under the title of Boy Scouts and were incorporated in this city.

The aim of the Boy Scouts is to supplement existing educational agencies and promote the ability of boys to do things for themselves and others. Each scout unit or body is known as a patrol and selects a leader from among its members. Several patrols form a troop, which is commanded by an appointed adult scoutmaster.

Three Classes.

Scouts are divided into three classes: Tenderfeet, second class and first class. A first-class scout must be able to swim 50 yards. must have at least \$2 in a savings banil, must be able to go on foot or row a boat well to a point seven miles away and return. He has to describe or show the proper means of saving life in various kinds of accidents, must be able to cook various dishes satisfactorily, use an ax and judge dissize and numb

Some THONG! Surprising how rapidly a thing can be produced from any old piece of leather (old shoe top or boot), a jackknife, and a piece of wood. Here's the way a backwoodsman in Maine demonstrated: Take a stick six inches long and about one inch wide.

Reduce one end in thickness to allow the leather to pass under it snugly when the other end is held firmly with a few tacks.

To start the operation, make an incision in the leather the desired width of the thong and pass this end under the stick. Be sure to have a razor-like edge to the knife. Jab the knife in place with the cutting edge close to the stick and hold it there. Take hold of the end of the leather and pull

at right angles to the stick. The leather, circular shape to start with, will, revolve of its own accord as you keep pulling out the thing. The thong's width is regulated between the perpendicular edgé of the notch and the cutting edge of the knife.

These "sure falls" are often damp and slippery and usually off level

It seems natural to land on these with the instep, a little slip to one side or the other and flip you lay. Hobs on the instep will act as non-skids on such surfaces.
