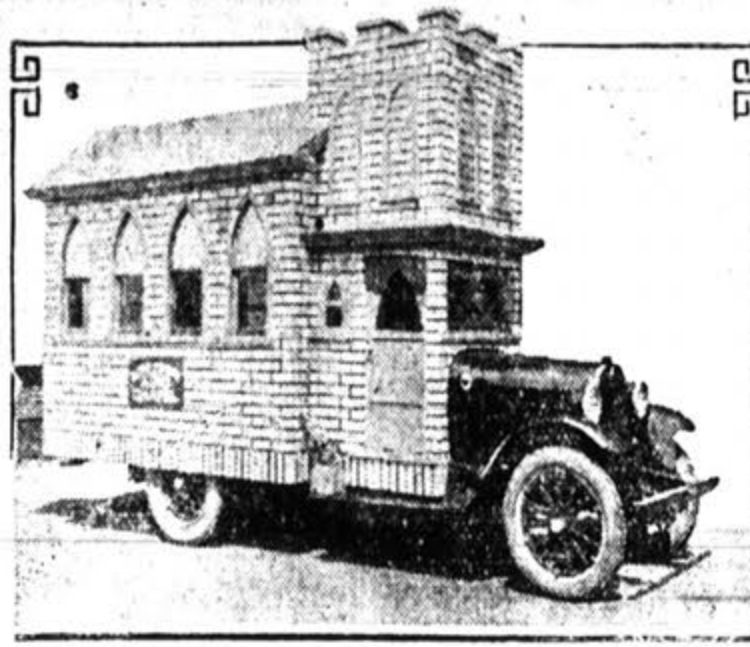

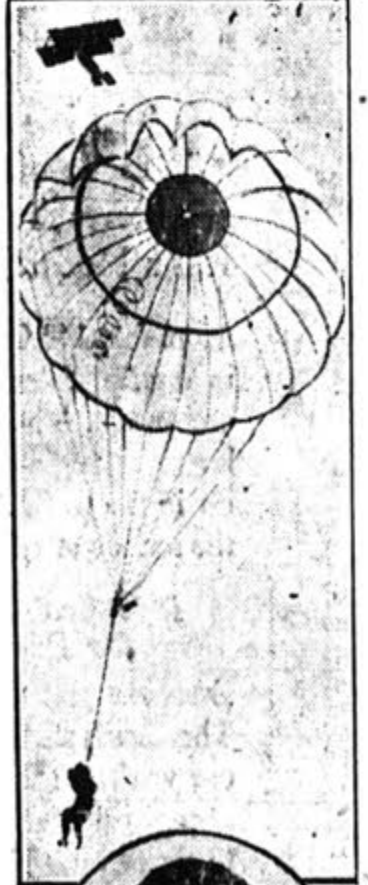

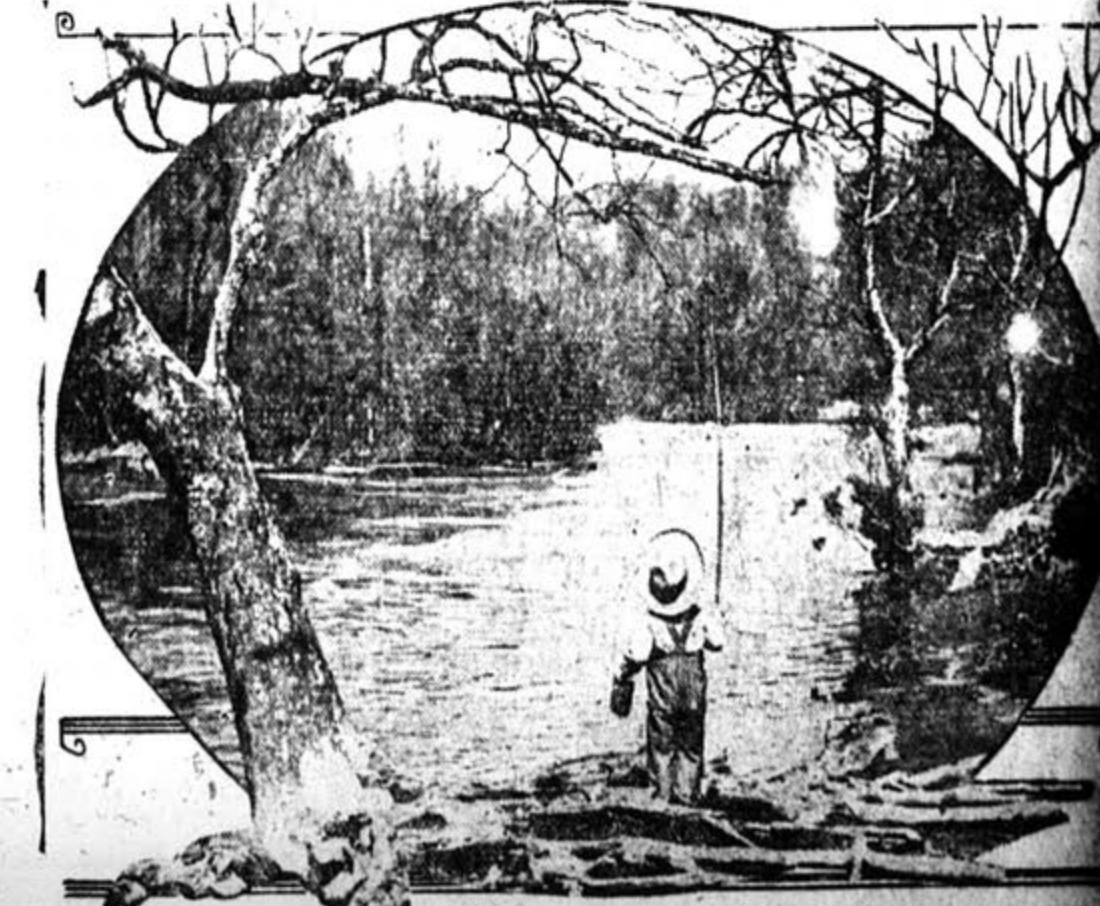

PAIGE WIZARD GIVES POINTERS ON MOTOR CARE

By G. CLARK MATHER
Chief Engineer, Paige-Detroit Motor Car Co.

A person's vacation period is more likely to provide greater relaxation as well as entertainment if sufficient preparatory work is completed. If the vacation is to be a long tour, involving mountain climbing as well as level driving, the motorist must have his automobile in the best of condition.

Those who prefer to do their own overhauling should bear in mind that if maximum performance is to be obtained, certain vital points must be given attention. We have found, in most instances where car owners complain of performance, that by giving small but vital points careful consideration the performance of the car is made perfectly acceptable and satisfactory to the owner.

For instance, on the models built by this company we usually find that in an effort to have a quiet valve action, the valve lifter or tappets have been set up close. Often we find they have the clearance on the Paige from .002 degrees to .004 degrees. Our cams are so designed that the valve clearance cannot be maintained closer than .006 degrees clearance

for the intake valve and .008 degrees clearance for exhaust valve.

Every motor of every producer has its own peculiarities but none will perform best if the valve clearance is too close.

If the driver likes to speed occasionally, or if he is going to drive under hard road conditions during hot weather, it is necessary that the engine be perfectly free.

Some owners have had pistons installed a little tighter than those fitted at the factory and quite frequently this is the cause of grief under harrowing circumstances.

It is also essential that the piston rings fit good in the grooves of the pistons. Rather than experiment with the many trick piston rings on the market, it is recommended that in all cases the car owner obtain standard piston rings direct from the factory service station.

Motor car manufacturers spend considerable sums yearly experimenting with piston rings alone. Any owner may rest assured that the type used in his car are best adapted to that particular motor or the maker would never have installed them.

While working on the motor, the steering apparatus should not be overlooked. It is very tiresome to drive a car that doesn't steer easily and to this end all movable parts of the front axle such as king pins, tie rod bolts, steering drag link, and the steering gear itself should be cleaned out and freshly oiled.
