



Miss Susan Lurie, university student and friend of Leopold's was called to the state's attorney's office for questioning today after she had told of a conversation of Leopold the day prior to his arrest, in which she suggested, jokingly that he confess to the slaving, and he acquiesced, remarking she could then collect the \$16,000 reward. Prosecutors said they gained little additional information from her.

The youths, according to their confession, selected young Franks as a victim because he happened along at an opportune moment, and the police today were investigating the statement of John Levinson, 11 years old. son of a wealthy attorney, and A. C. Seas, an instructor of the boy, that he may have been intended for their victim.

Young Leopold, son of Nathan Leopold, Sr., wealthy manufacturer, appeared nonchalant at the court hearing and inquest and had not forsworn his braggadocio attitude of yesterday when he boasted of his family's wealth and suggested that a few jurors might be fixed.
