

HARRIS HOLDS CONFERENCE IS CHICAGO PET

City Manager Not Impressed Favorably with Hammond Meeting.

That the Lake Michigan Drainage Commission, held at Hammond, Ind., last week, was but a

part of a Chicago plan to aid the Chicago drainage canal project in diverting a greater volume of water from Lake Michigan, was the conviction of Michigan and Wisconsin delegates who attended the conference, according to City Manager Fred R. Harris, who returned to the city yesterday morning. Approximately 25 cities of Michigan and Wisconsin located on Lake Michigan were represented at the conference and while the Chicago drainage canal project was not mentioned in the program of the conference, resolutions that were presented by a selected committee, endorsed the project. When the resolutions were presented to the

conference, Michigan and Wisconsin representatives, withdrew from the meeting. Escanaba Leads All. "Escanaba is the only city on Lake Michigan that both thoroughly purifies its water supply and disposes of its sewage, without dumping it into some bay or the lake and I made that fact plain at the Hammond conference," said Mr. Harris yesterday. "I was convinced soon after entering the meeting that it was part of a plan for aiding the city of Chicago to divert more water from Lake Michigan and all delegates from Michigan and Wisconsin became similarly convinced when the formal resolutions were not thrown.

presented. I invited the conference delegates to come to Escanaba and learn how this city, at great expense to itself, is meeting a situation over which the city of Chicago is raising such a furor. Michigan and Wisconsin's delegates were a unit in their conviction that Chicago can meet her problem in the same manner that Escanaba has done, when the sanitation board is finally convinced that authority will not be given to divert a greater volume of water from the lake, to carry away Chicago's sewage." 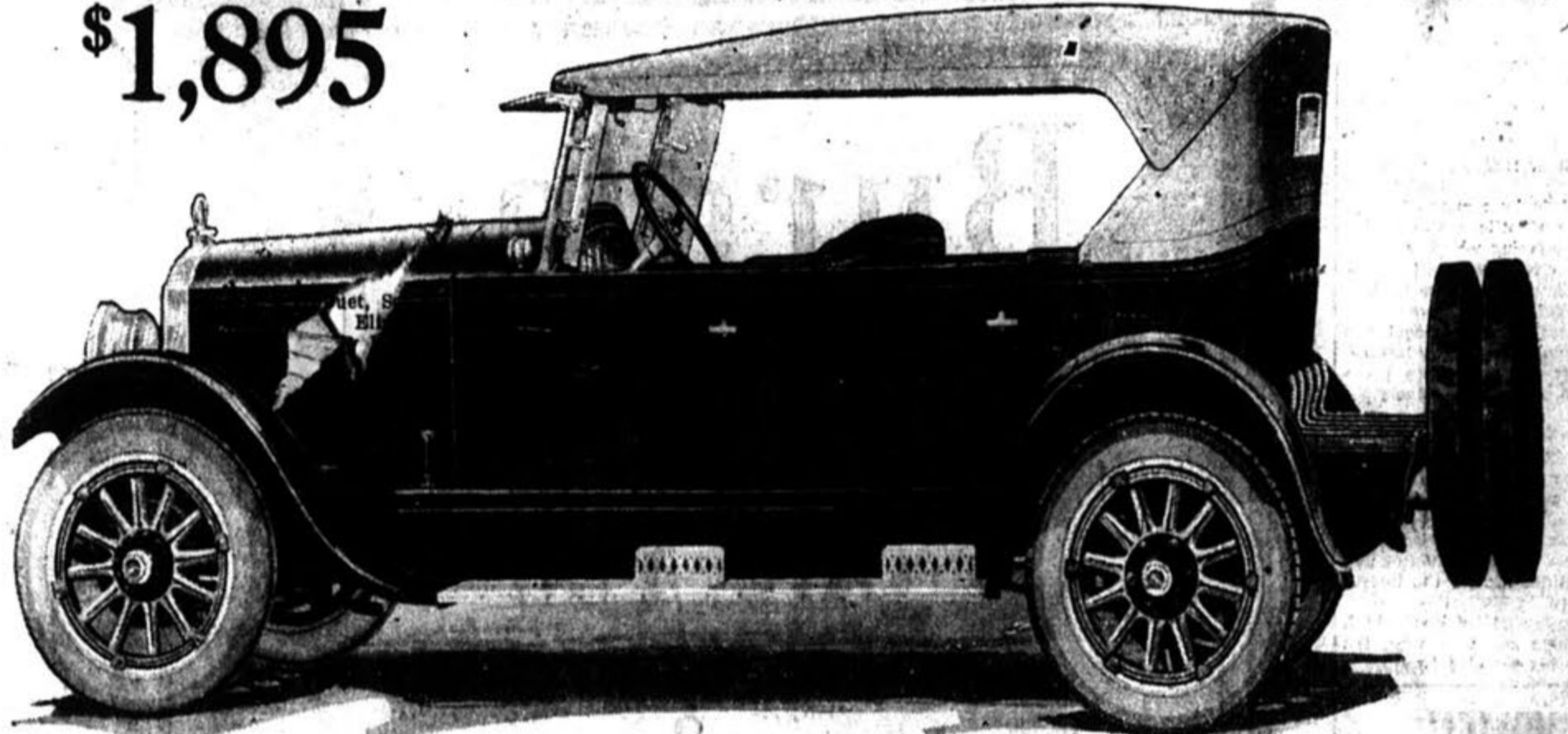
