When the American Indian Program was being established at Northern, the Indian Advisory Committee--which was helping in the planning--listed the projects and programs it thought should be given top priority.

At the head of the list was establishment of an Indian newspaper. For months, we tried to interest various governmental, church and private organizations in funding the paper. None would support it--other than with words. We then turned to the University and Dr. Jamrich--who supported the project. Since 1971, Northern has committed approximately \$35,000 to the support of The Nishnawbe News, not including the value of other services it provides the paper.

Now that the entire state of Michigan is becoming seriously pinched for funds, all state-supported functions are being cut back substantially. Of course, Northern is no exception. The University has not withdrawn its Nishnawbe News support for the next fiscal year. It is, however, asking that the newspaper make every effort to help solve its own financial needs through the remainder of the school year. This, we feel, is a reasonable request. However, we should make some tentative plans soon regarding publication of the upcoming issue.
