As the government The bell rings, curtain rises, we make has about seventy millions of gold on lem to inquire whether, if the sale of eleven millions reduces the premium 3 per cent, the sale of seventy millions would not reduce it 19 per cent. An experiment which proves so successful on a moderate trial deserves to be more fully tried. No doubt the offer to sell gold would not so depress the premium were it not that the returns for our heavy exports of cotton and petroleum have tended to stop the export of gold. Of petroleum alone our export has risen to the enormous figure of 90,000,000 gallons, worth, probably, \$50,000,000. our cotton crop will net probably \$250,-000,000. With our other exports, these are rapidly reducing the demand for gold to satisfy our foreign balances. These facts, and our enormous excess of revenue over expenditures, supply the main causes for the decline in gold, of which the announcement of sales by the Secretary affords only the occasion.
