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PEN AND SCISSORS.

Mr. Editor.—I see you have omitted in your last issue "Pen and Scissors." Whether this omission was occasioned because you had material you deemed more important, or because you had not time to use the "instruments," or because you intend to "take down this heading," I will not stop to inquire. But it seems to me a little innocent fun on suitable occasions is not out of place or taste. A good hearty laugh, over some little anecdote, (not of the vulgar sort,) does one good. And from this has grown that old adage, "Laugh and grow fat." And so if you deem the following worth the space and time it will cost, let your readers have it. It is a right down good illustration of "zeal without knowledge." I read it on a bit of newspaper, with which a book was covered, more than thirty years ago, and have never seen it in print since. At the close of a sermon during camp-meeting, the Elder who lead in prayer, was praying very earnestly that the power of the devil might be curtailed; an old negro, clapping his hands, responded very fervently—"Amen! Yes! Bless de Lord, cut his tail smack, smove off!"

A FORT WAYNE, gentleman recently threw out a lot of brandied cherries which had spoiled. His chickens ate them and apparently died. They were picked, and their bodies cast forth as worthless. The next morning he heard a loud crowing, and looking out saw every hen and rooster, young and old, grave and gay, marching round, eyeing each other with suspicion, many of them entirely naked, and only a few with wing and tail feathers. The cherries had made "poor chickens" dead—drunk.

HINTS ON HEALTH.—Children should be taught to use the left hand as well as the right.

Children should sleep in separate beds, and should not wear night caps.

Children under seven years of age should not be confined over six or seven hours in the house—and first time should be broken by frequent recesses.

From one to one pound and a half of solid food is sufficient for a person in the ordinary vocation of business. Persons in sedentary employments should drop one-third of their food, and they will escape dyspepsia.

Young persons should walk at least two hours a day in the open air.

Young ladies should be prevented from bandaging the chest. We have known of three cases of insanity, terminating in death, which began in this practice.

Every person, great and small, should wash all over in cold water every morning.

The more clothing we wear, other things being equal, the less food we need.

Sleeping-rooms should have a fire-lace, or some other mode of ventilation, besides the windows.

Young people and others cannot study much by lamp-light with impunity.

The best remedy for eyes weakened by night use, is a fine stream of cold water frequently applied to them.

HOW SMALL EXPENDITURES COUNT.—Five cents each morning. A mere trifle. Thirty five cents per week. Not much, yet it would buy coffee or sugar or a small family. \$18.20 a year. and his amount invested in a savings bank at the end of each year, and the interest thereon at six per cent, compounded annually, would amount in nine years to \$209.73, enough to purchase a beautiful farm one-fourth a mile square, 160 acres, from the government at 1.25 an acre. Is it not worth while to save and invest five cents a day for nine years?

Five cents before breakfast, dinner and supper; you'd hardly miss it, yet 'tis fifteen cents a day; \$1.05 per week, enough to buy wife or daughter a calico dress; \$4.60 a year—enough to buy a small library of books. Invest this as before, and in twenty years you would have \$2,000—quite enough to buy a good house and lot.

Ten cents each morning, hardly worth a second thought; yet with it you can buy a paper of pins or a spool of thread. Seventy cents per week; would buy several yards of muslin. \$8.40 in one year. Deposit this amount as before, and you would have \$1,360 in twenty years; quite a snug little fortune. Ten cents before each breakfast, dinner, and supper—thirty cents a day. It would buy a book for the children. \$2.10 a week—enough to pay for a year's subscription to a good newspaper. One hundred and five dollars and twenty cents per year. With it you could buy a good melodeon, on which your wife or daughter could produce sweet music to pleasant while away the evening hours. And his amount, invested as before, would in forty years, produce the desirable amount, \$12,000.

Boys learn a lesson. If you would be a happy youth, lead a sober life; and be a wealthy and influential man; instead of squandering your extra change, invest in a library or a savings bank. And yet remember that saving money is to be sought and saved, not as an end, but as a means. It is in order that we may do good with it whilst we live, or that others may waste it when we are gone, that we should be careful about our small, as well as our large, expenditures. Be economical, but remember to do good as you have opportunity.
