California Wine Prospects.

The prospect of the cutting off of wine ers and consumers to turn their attention toward the prospect of our native wines for this year. Of the condition of the crops in California the San Francisco Bulletin

The crop of the Mission fruit was very

The crop of the Mission fruit was very short last year, and the wine was consequently of a very heavy quality. It is therefore doubtful that it will turn out a first-class wine. This year promises an extra abundant crop, and from all previous results in California, when such is the case, the wines are of a superior quality. In 1865 and 1868 the vines bore luxuriantly, and the wine was light and of a high class. Many of the foot hills and places where mining was formerly carried on are now Many of the foot hills and pisces where mining was formerly carried on are now for the most part largely planted with vines; therefore it is expected that the quantity of wine produced this year will be almost double that of last season. Most of the wine was also consumed in the quar-ters where it was grown, but latterly it is being transported to San Francisco. The amount of fruit to the vines will probably be not as large as in 1863, but the deficien-cy will be made up by the new vines com-ing into bearing. The Eastern market for California wines is also gradually increas-

'This evening came a dispated from Wissembourg announcing a Prusaian victory and the occupation of Wissembourg. I have obtained the following details: The King, on his arrival at Mayence, called a council of war and urged that the sconer the existing inaction ceased the better, and pressed an advance. His opinion was adopted, and orders were telegraphed to attack the French outposts in the neighborhood of Landan and Wissembourg. 


