On Friday morning last, in company with Mr. B. Johnson, we launched our little craft, a little "skiff" 14 on the Escanaba River, above the Smith Mine, and proceeded to navigate that stream from that point to its mouth, a distance of about 60 miles. The river is a succession of falls, rapids, etc., the entire distance and abounds in playgrounds and delightful scenery, although there is little of the grand and majestic about it. The trip lasted three days, and we had a mean little cabin boat, which Mr. B. cooked to perfection. Although there were many places in which we had hair-breadth escapes, we did not have a single accident. The sensation of, counting down over those boiling chasms at the rate of 10 miles an hour is exhilarating in the extreme. We were three days making the trip which we expected to make in two and should have done had the river been a little higher.
